August 1916, Private MADDERN was sent back on two occasions through a heavy barrage fire with messages to Battalion Headquarters. On two later occasions he was sent back again with important messages and although badly wounded on the last occasion, he did not fail to deliver his message safely. 	28th. Battalion A.I.F.	555	C.S.M. Karl AHNALL.	Although badly wounded in the attack on POZIERES RIDGE on 28/29th July 1916, he remained throughout with his Company and in the face of heavy shell and machine gun fire, directed and assisted wounded men to Dressing Stations. 	28th. Battalion A.I.F.	384	Private Leonard Charles TRENORDEN.	On the night of attack on POZIERES RIDGE, 4/5th August 1916, he was placed in charge of a Lewis Gun and after reinforcing the front line and remaining there some time under fire, he returned with his Company and brought the Gun safely back. He then volunteered to carry through the barrage rations and water to the gunners in the captured trenches, and seeing that his Sergeant was very short of men (4 men only for 4 guns) he asked to be allowed to stay there until relieved.
