#### **Enlistment in the Australian Imperial Force (AIF)**

Oskar's Father name was also Oskar and he was a sea Captain in the Merchant Service, and resided at 24 Nelvin Street Hernosand Sweden. There is no mention of Oskar's mother, or any other siblings.

On 29<sup>th</sup> October 1917, Oskar, being a Sailor attempted to join the Royal Australian Navy. The Naval Secretary certified and notified The OIC Recruiting Depot Town Hall Melbourne that: "Oscar Olsen is not required for service in the Royal Australian Navy, and there is no objection in this Department to his enlistment in the A.I.F."

On the same day he enlisted for service in the AIF, a form completed by Oskar showed "no fixed address."

The article published in the Melbourne press on the 30<sup>th</sup>, October 1917 "A Much-Travelled Swede seeks to be in the fight," (see page 3) is the same date that an initialed handwritten notation on Oskar's Army file shows 'Left Sweden on 5<sup>th</sup> April 1905 not naturalised".

On 29.10.1910 He completed the Attestation Paper of Persons Enlisted For Service Abroad. In regards, to

Q3. to Oskar. Are you a natural born British Subject or a Naturalised British Subject? (N.B.- If the latter papers to be shown.)

A. to Q3. Oskar declared SWEDISH SUBJECT (bold lettering).

The first address that Oskar had on Army file was c/o Park Road, Small Heath, Birmingham, England. Is his future wife Caroline White's address. (Born: 10.03.1898 Bristol England – Died: 21.05.1978. Bankstown NSW. Oskar and Caroline had five children).

## A much-travelled Swede seeks to be in the fight.

Born at Hernosand Sweden, Oskar Olsen a sailor who enlisted at the Town Hall yesterday, went to sea at 14 and claims to have been in every large port in the world.

His first trip was on a timber barque trading between \*Christiania and \*\*Hull. Then he was on the fruit trade boats from the West Indies. Later, on a five-masted barque he traded between Philadelphia and Japan, Vancouver, the South Sea Islands and Australia.

In 1905 he was on a schooner which was wrecked off the South American Coast whilst carrying saltpetre to New York. The crew members manned the lifeboats and after great hardship reached Rio Janeiro. Afterwards he shipped on a German ship carrying petroleum to Japan. The discipline was so severe and the food so bad that the crew conspired to mutiny. This, however, was quelled before any damage was done. When the ship berthed at Yokohama, Olsen and nine of his shipmates ran away and walked to Tokio in search of work in the hope of finding a ship there to sign on with.

At Yokohama they were arrested and placed in a goal, from which they escaped by cutting away with jack-knives the mortar from between the bricks, making a hole in the wall large enough to squeeze through. Their liberty was short, however, and they were all taken aboard the ship. The same night acting in collusion with the guard, Olsen and two of his men slipped quietly overboard and swam ashore, escaping this time permanently.

Subsequently Olsen came to Australia, and has been on the coastal trade for five years. He claims that the British and Australian masters are the best. When asked by the enlisting officer to specify a unit he replied. "I want to be where the fighting is"!
