We have one good son left - (they were all so true & dutiful -) & in all the letters & cards of sympathy we have received - respect & love are voiced - for those gone before - & for us, who remain. We were all very concerned on receipt of the news of Gordon's death about the effect on Jack - he would seem so much alone & the brothers were so attached - but considering the short time between the death of each - Jack had probably not heard. Just before Douglas's death in action in Egypt - Jack was trying to get transferred to him, as Jack was under 21 - & his later letters & Gordon's - each were hopeful of getting Jack into the 5<sup>th</sup> Pioneer Batt<sup>n</sup>. We believe they are all together

now - They have been faithful unto death - God
