			Sanitary condition of the area very bad - numbers of dead lie burked unburied between the lines or are buried in the parapets. Closed latrines are scattered everywhere and for those in use there is no means of protecting them from flies. The usual type of latrine is a 10 or 13 ft trench about 12 feet long and provided with a bar. It is generally a mass of flies. The flies over the whole area are a veritable plague. Diarrhoes and dysentery are becoming prevalent.
