I very deeply regret to inform you of the death of your gallant son, No 1126 Private Aubrey Edward Griffiths. He was wounded in battle near Bonchavesnes on August 31st, and died at No 61 Casualty Clearing Station on September 1st. He was buried in the military cemetery at DAOURS, (map reference: France, Sheet 62^D, N. 6. a. 4. 2.) and his grave has been registered by the Graves Registration Unit.

Of your son's service with the Battalion a period of nearly three years I can speak only in the highest terms. He proved himself a most excellent soldier, a cheerful and willing worker, and a staunch and unselfish comrade. In action he was both courageous and determined. He misses him greatly and deeply mourns his death.

Officers, non-commissioned-officers & men all join me in offering you and your family most heartfelt sympathy in this your very sad bereavement.

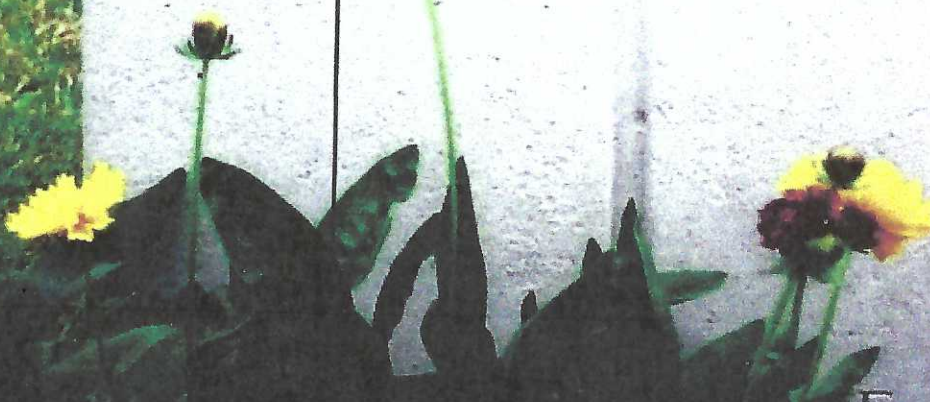

GRIFFITHS, Aubrey Edward. No 1126, Private, "D" Company. Born about 1894. Occupation miner. Single, of Emmaville. Next of kin Mrs M. Griffiths, mother, of Paddington. Religion Methodist. Enlisted on 5/1/1916. Embarked on the "Marathon" for England on 4/5/1916. Wounded at Villers-Bretonneux (reference: Routine Order dated 6/4/1918. Wounded on the final assault on Mont St Quentin and the Hindenburg Line (reference: Routine Order dated early September 1918. Died of wounds on 1/9/1918.
