## King Island to benefit under Labor's Royal Flying Doctor policy

Shorten Labor Government will invest \$7 million into future-proofing the Royal Flying Doctor Service in Tasmania giving the King Island community the confidence the service will continue operating at an enhanced level, said Member for Braddon Justine Keay MP.

"Labor's investment will go towards the upgrade of the RFDS base at Launceston Airport – with improved facilities increasing the capacity of the RFDS to service Tasmania," said Ms Keay.

"The Liberals have cut health and hospitals in Tasmania – ripping \$35 million

out of Tasmanian hospitals and locking in huge future cuts.

"Labor is prioritising health – because we think Tasmania deserves better than the neglect of the Abbott-Turnbull-Morrison Government."

"This is a much-needed investment in a service that is integral to Tasmania. The current base was built by the RFDS just over 20 years ago, from donations and fundraising, and is critical for remote communities including those living on King Island who don't have easy access to hospital services," Ms Keay said.

Labor's investment will fund the con-

struction of a new base including:

A fully integrated helicopter, aeroplane and ambulance service.

A new ward of up to 12 beds able to hold patients in the event of a natural disaster, pandemic or infectious diseases outbreak.

Upgraded facilities to meet the national accreditation standards and the RFDS aero medical standards.

Facilities for the staff who are required to be on site 24/7.

This announcement builds on Labor's existing investments in health in Tasmania – including \$30 million to address elective

surgery waiting lists, a \$15 million mental health hub in Launceston and \$4.5 million to ensure regional and rural Tasmanians have better access to medical specialists.

"Labor will also restore the Tazreach program that supported health specialists to visit King Island, saving people the need to travel for some health related appointments," said Ms Keay.

"Tasmania is hurting under the impact of the Liberals' cuts - under State and Federal Liberal Governments the state's elective surgery waiting list has ballooned to more than 9,000 patients," she said.
