Two hours before this picture was taken the No 5 Sqn crews were engaged on their most difficult recovery operation — the recovery of the remains of 27 Australian servicemen and one RAAF nursing sister, killed when their RAAF Dakota crashed into a mountain in West Irian 25 years ago. Success meant negotiating almost inaccessible mountains rising 14,000 to 15,000 feet, freezing temperatures and, most hazardous of all, overcoming a considerable reduction in the supply of oxygen to helicopter crews flying at such heights.

Within three days of the start of the actual operation, the well-known Air Force sig-


nal, "Mission Successful", had been radioed to Canberra, and the RAAF party was on its way home again.

Two other members of the party, not shown, who played a prominent part in the recovery operation were Flt Lt John Gavey and Lt Mick Mummery.


The RAAF party received great support from Indonesian authorities and American missionary personnel stationed in the area.





 Ground staff assemble a helicopter at Biak.


