Alexander John Phillips

Private (Pte) 6063 Alexander John Phillips enlisted in the 7th Infantry Battalion in the 2nd Infantry Brigade of the 1st Australian Division in Melbourne on 15 March 1916.

He embarked overseas on 28 July and disembarked at Plymouth, England on 11 September.

After two months training with the 2nd (Brigade) Training Battalion, he sailed for France on 12 November, where he was taken on strength of the 7th Battalion on 25 November.

The battalion moved into the front line at Gueudecourt on the night of 14 December, and it was here two days later that Pte Phillips was killed in action by German artillery fire.

His body was never recovered, and he has no known grave.
