Albert Skinner



Private (Pte) 6080 Albert Skinner enlisted in the 7th Infantry Battalion at Maldon on 17 April 1916. He embarked overseas on 28 July and disembarked in Plymouth on 11 September, where he joined the 2nd (Brigade) Training Battalion at Perham Downs Camp.

He sailed for France on 2 November, where he was subsequently transferred and taken on strength of the 59th Infantry Battalion in the 15th Infantry Brigade of the 5th Australian Division, in the field at Dernancourt, on 17 November 1916.

After a period in the front line trenches near Flers from late November, where the winter conditions were atrocious, Pte Skinner contracted bronchitis on 30 December. He was evacuated to the Anzac Corps Rest Station the same day, and then to the 1st Australian General Hospital at Rouen on 10 January 1917. His condition did not improve so he was transferred via hospital ship to England on 15 January, where he was admitted to the Beaufort War Hospital in Bristol the next day.

After six weeks there, he was transferred to the 3^{rd} Auxiliary Hospital at Dartford on 27 February, then granted leave in England from 16-31 March upon his full recovery. He spent the next four months regaining his fitness and conditioning, before he embarked again for France on 23 July, where he rejoined the 59^{th} Battalion at Sercus on 11 August 1917.

By 25 September the battalion had moved to Westhoek Ridge and then, at 5.50am on 26 September they successfully participated in the 4th and 5th Division attacks on Polygon Wood. The 59th Battalion suffered 268 casualties in the attack, including 68 men killed or missing, one of whom was Pte Skinner, who was killed in action by German artillery during the attack.

His body was never recovered, and he has no known grave.

Private 6080 Albert Skinner is remembered on Panel 29 of the Menin Gate Memorial, Ypres, Belgium.
