## **Alexander Milne**

Gunner (Gnr) Alexander Milne enlisted in the  $3^{rd}$  Field Artillery Brigade (FAB) in the  $1^{st}$  Australian Division in Sydney on 12 February 1917. He embarked overseas on 5 November and disembarked in Egypt on 12 December, where he spent a week in hospital at Suez with influenza from 14 - 21 December.

He departed Egypt on 2 January 1918 and disembarked in Taranto, Italy on 13 January, where he entrained for Cherbourg, France. From there he sailed across the English Channel and arrived in Southampton on 24 January, where he joined the Reserve Brigade Australian Artillery later the same day.

At the completion of his training, he left England on 8 April and landed in France the next day, where he was taken on strength of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Field Artillery Brigade, in the field at Franvillers, on 14 April 1918. While there, they provided fire support for the 6<sup>th</sup> Brigade's capture on Ville sur Ancre on 19 May for the loss of two wounded.

The 1<sup>st</sup> Division moved south in early August in preparation for the Amiens offensive, which began with a massive artillery bombardment and involved all the Australian field brigades. The attack was a success and as the infantry moved eastwards, the field artillery brigades followed in support. By 10 August the brigade was in Harbonnieres and fired in support of the Australian capture of Lihons the next day.

On 2 September the brigade provided fire support for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Division's attack on Mont St Quentin, then supported the 1<sup>st</sup> Division's assault on the Hindenburg Outpost Line on 18 September.

Gnr Milne contracted influenza on 27 September and was evacuated to le Havre, where he was hospitalised at the  $2^{nd}$  General Hospital from 29 September – 2 October. He spent a month at a convalescent depot from 3 October – 5 November and rejoined his unit on 15 November.

He was granted leave in England between 24 March - 12 April 1919, after which he sailed from France for the last time on 5 May and embarked for Australia on 20 June.

Gunner 36644 Alexander Milne disembarked in Melbourne on 6 August, where he was discharged from the AIF on 29 August 1919.
