Background

Coinciding with the Centenary of Anzacs our incentive behind the series of biographical publications is the Adelaide University Football and Cricket Club's desire to honour our players who served in the Great War (1914 - 1918). These brave men put on hold their academic, professional and sporting careers for King and Country in the name of peace and freedom. The AUFC/AUCC WW1 Memorial Committee is endeavouring to identify every one of our players who served and prepare life stories on all. This is to ensure their sacrifices and further contributions to society will be recognised by future generations.

On Anzac Day 2015, the Centenary of the Gallipoli landing, a memorial plaque was unveiled on the Adelaide University Oval Pavilion and this was followed by the erection of a picket fence between the pavilion and the scoreboard with each picket bearing a plaque with the name of an AUFC/AUCC player who served.

Villers-Bretonneux is a village about 15 km east of Amiens. The Memorial stands on the high ground ('Hill 104') behind the Villers-Bretonneux Military Cemetery, Fouilloy, which is about 2 km north of Villers-Bretonneux on the east side of the

road to Fouillov.

The Australian National Memorial, Villers-Bretonneux is approached through the Military Cemetery, at the end of which is an open grass lawn which leads into a three-sided court. The two pavilions on the left and right are linked by the north and south walls to the back (east) wall, from which rises the focal point of the Memorial, a 105 foot tall tower, of fine ashlar. A staircase leads to an observation platform, 64 feet above the ground, from which further staircases lead to an observation room. This room contains a circular stone tablet with bronze pointers indicating the Somme villages whose names have become synonymous with battles of the Great War; other battle fields in France and Belgium in which Australians fought; and far beyond, Gallipoli and Canberra. On the three walls, which are faced with Portland stone, are the names of

10,885 Australians who were killed in France and who have no known grave. The 'blocking course' above them bears the names of the Australian Battle Honours.

After the war an appeal in Australia raised £22,700, of which £12,500 came from Victorian school children, with the request that the majority of the funds be used to build a new school in Villers-Bretonneux. The boys' school opened in May 1927, and contains an inscription stating that the school was the gift of Victorian schoolchildren, twelve hundred of whose fathers are buried in the Villers-Bretonneux cemetery, with the names of many more recorded on the Memorial. Villers-Bretonneux is now twinned with Robinvale, Victoria, which has in its main square a memorial to the links between the two towns.


Biography

Early Life

Charles William Hooper was born at Kenton Valley (near Gumeracha), South Australia on the 13th April 1884, the second son of John Hooper and Elizabeth (Bessie) Lillecrapp.

His siblings were Mary (b 1878 - d 1959), Bessie (b 1878 - d 1968), Isabelle Brakenridge (b 1880 - d 1956), John (b 1882 - d 1953), Alice (b 1883 - d 1943), Andrew (b 1885 - d 1956), Margaret (b 1885 - 1952), Samuel (b 1887 - d 1887), Samuel (b 1889 - d 1889), Alexander (b 1891 - d 1892) and David (b 1893 - d 1893).

Charles' father was a horse breeder at Gumeracha and later a storekeeper at Norwood.




Schooling

In September 1897 Charles was attending school at Norwood. He passed the Preliminary Examinations and in December 1897 he was awarded a three year state scholarship to attend one of the colleges.

From 1898 to 1901 Charles attended Prince Alfred College, Adelaide where he passed four subjects in the Junior Public Examinations in 1898 (English, Latin, Mathematics and elementary chemistry), six subjects in the Senior Public Examinations in 1900 (English (credit), Latin, German, Pure Mathematics, Chemistry (credit) and Experimental Physics) and five subjects in the Higher Public Examinations in 1901 (Latin, German, Pure Mathematics, Physics and Inorganic Chemistry (credit)).

Charles was a member of the PAC football team in 1901, playing in the Inter-collegiate match against St Peter's College in June 1901.



THE ROYAL COLLEGE FOOTBALL MATCH.

The annual contest between St. Peter's and Prince Alfred colleges will be played to-day on the Adelaide Oval in the presence of their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall. This will be the only outdoor function the Royal party will attend to-day. The game will begin at 2,30 p.m., and half-time will be 3.25 p.m., when afternoon tea will be partaken of. Their Royal Highnesses will arrive at the oval at 3.45 p.m. They will drive into the playing ground over the breyele track and around the south end of the oval to the members' stand, where they will be received by Lord and Lady Tennyson, the Bishop of Adelaide, Right Roy. Dr. Harmer, and Mrs. Harmer, the visitor of St. Peter's College; the Rev. T. Piper, president of Prince Alfred College; the Rev. H. Girdlestone, M.A., beadmaster of St. Peter's College; and Mrs. Girdlestone; and Mr. W. R. Bayly, acting headmaster of Prince Alfred College, and Mrs. Bayly. The cadets from the two schools will form a guard of honor. The Duke will then advance to a small table about 30 pages from the bicycle track, where he will present each boy taking part in the match with a token. The Royal party will then proceed to the Governor's box in the members' pavilion, and stay till the game is over. They will leave the oval by walking in front of the stand northwards past the smokers' stand and tennis court to a carriage awaiting them on the drive. All occupants of the members' stand will be expected to remain seated while the Royal party pass. Eastern Suburban Band will be in attendance. To prevent the crush at the gates there will be 19 turnstiles available, and patrons are requested to give the exact amount at the turnstiles to prevent confusion. Children will obtain tickers at the change window and pass in by a separate gate. Patrons of the public reserve will be able to obtain afternoon tea in a marquee crected on the tennis courte at the back of the pavilson. Tea will be available from I p.m., both in the public reserve and the members' reserve.





Charles represented the PAC Old Boys in a match against present players in 1902.

He played four games of senior football with the Norwood Football Club in the South Australian Football Association competition in May 1903.



In July 1904 Charles played in the intra-varsity schools football competition for the Art/Science Schools in matches against the Law School and the Medical School. He also competed in a match between University and a combined Colleges side. The games were used as trial/selection matches for the upcoming Intervarsity football match against Melbourne University.

The second match between the schools of the University was played on the Adelaide Oval last Thursday, when the Law School was opposed to a combined team chosen from the Art and Science School. The 'Varsity ought to be able to turn out a fine representative team to meet the Melbourne University next month. The first half of the game was evenly contested, and at half-time scores were — Law School, 3 goals 5 behinds; Science, 4 goals 1 behind. After the interval the law students forced the game and carried all be-The final scores were-Law School, fore them. 9 goals 8 behinds; Science School, 6 goals 2 be-The most prominent players for the Law School were Jessop, Homburg, Dowdy, Reid.
Haslam, Latty, and Muirhead, while Science was
well represented by Cudmore, Moore, Cowan (2),
Reynell, Campbell, and Hooper. The goalkickers for the law were Edmunds, Jessop, and Haslam (2 each), Murray, Penny, and Reid (1 each), while Bowen (8), L. Cowan, Dudell, and Hooper were responsible for the losers' goals.

UNIVERSITY VERSUS COLLEGES.

A match between teams representing the Adelaide University and the combined forces of the Prince Alfred and St. Peter's Colleges was played on the Adelaide Oval on Tuesday afternoon. The Prince Alfred and St. Peter's Colleges was played on the Adelaide Oval on Tuesday afternoon. The game was arranged principally with the object of giving the University men an opportunity of practising in view of the approaching visit of the Melbourne University team on August 27. This teams were composed as follow:—University—Angwin, D. Cowan, L. Cowan, Catchlove, Codmore, Dawson (captain), Dempeter, Donnelly, Doudy, Drew, Goode, Haslam, Hoeper, Moore, Muirhead, Newland, Reid, and Reynell. Colleges—Prince Alfred—G. Bateman, J. L. Davidson, G. P. Goode, A. V. King, R. Middleton, S. W. G. Parrell, Pl. Pope, H. W. D. Stoddart. St Peters—V Cresdee, J. Forrest, L. W. Gill, H. B. James, L. A. Lawis (captain). A. F. Pincombe, A. V. Stephen, W. H. Stevenson, E. P. Turner, W. R. Warren.

The colors of the University team were black and white and of the combined team those of their respective colleges. The scoring-board began registering goals when Dempster marked prettily about 40 yards from goal. This was succeeded by goals by Moore and Dawson, and another by Dempster, who was playing centre forward. Dempster three away several chances of goals for minors in the early part of the game, but he more than atoned for it at a later stage. The University team had the best of the encounter during this quarter, and really had the Collegians at their mercy. In the second quarter the state of affairs was much the same, but Pincombe relieved the monotony just


econd quarter the state of affairs was much the ame, but Pincombe relieved the monotony just

before the interval by kicking the first goal for his side. When the second half of the play commenced the black and whites had apparently determined to allow their opponents to make up leeway. The play consequently was much looser than before, but in the last quarter the 'Varsity boys' tightened rein and added goals to the tally in quick succession. In the last two quarters Dempster kicked five goals, Drew two, Newland one and Moore one, while Pincombe kicked three for the Collegians, Stevenson two, and King one. On the whole the undergrads, excelled by their adoption of superior tactics. Their play was rafer and surer than that of the combined team, particularly in regard to passing and shepherding. The combined teams played well together, and passed ad. in regard to passing and shepherding. The com-bined teams played well together, and passed ad-mirably at times, and did some capital runs, but they were outclassed when the blacks cared to exert themselves. Conspicuous among the players were Haslam, Newland, Moore, Doudy, Reynell, Angwin, and Dempster, of the University, and Davidson, Warren, Lewis, Pincombe, and Stevenson of the combined. Scores:—

Colleges, 5 goals 4 behinds. Final. University, 13 goals 19 brhinds. Colleges, 7 goals 6 behinds. As a result of the matches Charles was selected as the reserve back for the 1904 Intervarsity (the first Intervarsity football match played between Adelaide University and Melbourne University).



By November 1911, Charles and Muriel had moved to Wallaroo, SA where Charles had secured a job in the assay office of the Wallaroo and Moonta Mining and Smelting Company.

Charles played cricket for Wallaroo in November and December 1911. He was actively involved in the military forces from at least April 1912, becoming a provisional Lieutenant in the Senior Cadets at that date. In December 1912 he became a provisional second lieutenant in the Citizens Forces, 81st Infantry (Wakefield Battalion).

MILITARY ITEMS,-The annual inspection of the local units of the 81st Infantry was held on Saturday last at Moonia. There was a good muster and a useful days' work was the result. The band and A Coy (Moonta) paraded at 3 o'clock, and, after the equipment , etc, had been inspected, moved to the railway station, where they were joined by the machine gun section and signallers (Wallaroo) and B Coy (Kadins). The whole then marched to the rifle range, where under direction of the officers and instructional staff the various exercises were carried out. Major C. H. Brand (General S.aff Officer) was the inspecting officer, and there were also present Lieut-Colonel W. L Raws (C.O. 81st Infantry), Capt A. E. Clayton (Army Medical Corps), Lieut G. E. Gill (adjusant), Lieut A. A. Heinicke (A Coy) and Lieut C. W. Hooper (B Coy). The troops returned to the town at about 9 o'clock, in time for the Kadina and Wallsroo units to catch the late train .-The parades for the coming week are :- A Coy, 81st Infantry, alternative half-day, Saturday, 20th inst, B Coy, Senior Cadets-voluntary, this (Friday) evening; statutory half-day, Saturday (to-morrow); statutory night, Thursday, 18 h inst. U Coy, Senior Cadets - voluntary, this (Friday) evening.


In December 1913 'The Express and Telegraph' newspaper reported that Charles had been awarded a Bachelor of Engineering 'in lieu of surrender degree of bachelor of science', however the University of Adelaide Calendar continued to show Charles as holding a B.Sc..

In March 1914 Charles was promoted to a lieutenant in the Citizens Forces and he was on the committee to organise the Military and Cadets Sports at Moonta in June 1914.

Charles and Muriel's only child, a son, Peter Lawrence (sometimes recorded as Laurence) Hooper was born at Wallaroo on the 6th March 1914.

On the 29th August 1914, Charles was at Port Pirie with A and B Companies from Wallaroo and Moonta to relieve the Port Pirie Company who had been encamped since the 6th August 1914.

World War I

After a farewell from the staff of the Smelting Works, Charles left Wallaroo in April 1915.

OFF TO THE WAR—On Wednesday evening, at the Smelting Works laboratory, the members of the staff met to wish good-bye and to tender good wishes to Lieutenant W. C. Hooper, who volunteered for the war and left for Adelaide on Thursday. A presentation of a case of silver-mounted pipes was made, and the hope expressed that he would be given an opportunity to prove his qualities as a soldier, and that he would return safely to Wallareo. Regret is felt at the departure of Lieut. Hooper, as he has just completed arrangements for establishing a social club and gymnasium in connection with the Military Forces. It is hoped that someone will volunteer to corry on the work he has so successfully performed in connection with the local forces.

W. Hooper. Lientenant "Glorious 10th Regiment," was received He said he was proud with loud cheers. to belong to the "Glorious 10th." He realised that he and those of his company would have a great advantage in joining experienced troops. He thanked them for the splendid reception they had given him. He wished to say that there were some very undesirable men in camp-some who were not fit to wear the King's uniform, but he was proud to say that there was not a P.A.C. boy or a St. Peter's boy (Loud cheers.) amongst them.

Charles was one of the Old PAC Boys entertained at a function in May 1915 and said he was proud to belong to the "Glorious 10th".

On the 17th May 1915 he applied for a commission in the Australian Imperial Forces. Charles was 31 years old, 5'8½" tall and weighed 10 stone.

The Virtual War Memorial Australia records the following extract from Michael Coligan's *Norwood Men Who Served*, 2015.

"Charles Hooper embarked from Adelaide aboard HMAT A30 Borda on June 23, 1915, with team-mates Leslie Bryant and Clifford Cope. He then embarked from HMTS Berrima on August 1, 1915, for the Dardenelles, Alexandria and was General Officer Commanding (GOC) 1st Australian Division at Gallipoli until September 4, which was then absorbed into the 6th Reinforcements/10th Battalion at Gallipoli until September 18, 1915. On March 27, 1916, he proceeded from Alexandria to join the BEF embarking on the Laseonis for France and disembarking at Marseilles on 3 April. Charles Hooper was killed in action in the field near Poziers, France on July 25, 1916, and is buried between Poziers and Bazentin – Le Petit, about 5 miles north-east of Albert. His memorial cross is erected at Poziers British Cemetery."

Charles had a camera with him for at least the first six months of his service overseas and his collection of photographs taken in Egypt, at Gallipoli and on Lemnos are now held by the State Library of South Australia (see https://collections.slsa.sa.gov.au/resource/PRG+546/1-61). By 1st December 1915 Charles was on Lenmos, a Greek Island in the Aegean Sea. From there he returned to Egypt. He was promoted to Captain on 12th March 1916 at Serapeum, Egypt. On the 27th March 1916 he was on a transport ship from Alexandrina, Egypt and he disembarked on the 3rd April 1916 at Marseilles, France. He then fought on the Somme.

Death

Charles was killed in action on 25th July 1917 at the Battle of Pozieres. His grave was finally lost due to battle and shell fire and his name is now recorded on the wall of the memorial at Villiers Bretonneux.

FOR KING AND COUNTRY.—We regret to state that Captain Chas. W. Hooper has fallen in action in the service of his king and Country. He was only 32 years of age, and had a promising career before him when he left the service of the Wallarco and Moonta Mining and Smelting Co. to enlist. While at Wallarco he had charge of the local militis, and was a great favorite with the cadets. Just prior to his enlistment he was instrumental in forming the Military Club. Capt. Hooper saw service in Egypt, at Gallipoli, and in France. On Friday the flags at Wallarco were at half-mast out of respect to the late soldier, and general regret is felt in the town at his untimely demise. Capt Hooper leaves a widow and one son.





Chas. W. Hooper entered the school in 1898 as the holder of a Government exhibition. After a creditable course at school, he won a University scholarship, which enabled him to proceed to the Bachelor of Science degree. When war broke out he was engaged in the assay office of the Wallaroo Smelting Company. His strong sense of duty impelled him to break up his home, and to leave his little son, at his country's call. He left our shores as Lieutenant in command of reinforcements to the 10th Battalion, with Lieut. Murray Fowler as second in command, and has been on active service since June, 1915, in Gallipoli, Egypt, and France. He was promoted to Captain, and has recently been killed in action in France. We cherish his memory as a soldier whom the school bonours for his devoted, courageous service and sacrifice on her behalf.

Charles was survived by his widow Muriel and their two year old son Peter. He left an estate valued at £983. His personal effects were returned to Australia onboard the 'Wiltshire'.






