Background

Coinciding with the Centenary of Anzacs our incentive behind the series of biographical publications is the Adelaide University Football and Cricket Club's desire to honour our players who served in the Great War (1914 - 1918). These brave men put on hold their academic, professional and sporting careers for King and Country in the name of peace and freedom. The AUFC/AUCC WW1 Memorial Committee is endeavouring to identify every one of our players who served and prepare life stories on all. This is to ensure their sacrifices and further contributions to society will be recognised by future generations.

On Anzac Day 2015, the Centenary of the Gallipoli landing, a memorial plaque was unveiled on the Adelaide University Oval Pavilion and this was followed by the erection of a picket fence between the pavilion and the scoreboard with each picket bearing a plaque with the name of an AUFC/AUCC player who served.

The following documentation relates to the life of Richard Longford Thorold Grant. It is compilation of information and photographs collected from a variety of historical sources.

(Those men who enlisted, but either because of cessation of hostilities or other reasons did not serve overseas are still included in the list of AUFC & AUCC players recognised as serving their Country. Our men who enlisted later in 1918 were not to know that Germany would surrender on 11th November 1918 and so their courage and commitment to serve should still be recognised.)



Richard Longford Thorold Grant was born on 22nd of April 1894 at North Adelaide. He was the son of William Thorold Grant and Emily, nee Jefferson. His parents were pastoralists and his father became known as a writer of rural affairs for *The Australasian* under the pen name "Benlbey". His parents later moved to Victoria. Grant was educated at Queen's School North Adelaide. He had been in the Boy Scouts. His athletic abilities were cut short by renal tuberculosis necessitating a nephrectomy. He graduated from the University of Adelaide in 1918.

Grant enlisted on the 4th July 1918 when still a medical student. He had one year of school cadets and six years of citizen military forces experience. He was single and gave his address as 3 Brougham Place, North Adelaide. He was 5ft 7½ins tall, weighed 135lbs and of medium complexion, grey eyes and brown hair. His father was named as next of kin and his address given as 149 Kooyong Road, Toorak Victoria. He was not called up for service and discharged on 18th November 1918. He was appointed captain on 26th November 1918. The Principal Medical Officer recommended him for enlistment despite his blindness in his right eye. The appointment was terminated on 1st February 1919. He did not serve outside of Australia

Grant went to England after the war where he obtained his Membership of the Royal College of Physicians. He went on to be a founding Fellow of the Royal Australasian College of Physicians. He was appointed honorary assistant pathologist at the Adelaide Hospital in 1925 after the resignation of Dr Jose. He married Jane Nancy Lewis, daughter of Dr Brook Lewis, an ophthalmologist of Mount Lofty, on 23rd February 1927 at St Peters Cathedral.


The wedding was reported in the social pages of the Adelaide Advertiser and considered to be a 'fashionable wedding'. They had two sons. He served again in WW2 and was a consultant physician to the RAAF with the rank of squadron leader. He was later promoted to wing commander. At the Annual Meeting of the British Medical Association (South Australian Branch) in 1948 he was elected to Council. He had various senior positions following his return from the United Kingdom as Pathologist, Bacteriologist and later as Physician at the Adelaide Children's Hospital. He contracted a severe generalised dermatitis from chemicals in clothing which required long term treatment and instituted a long legal process eventually to the level of the Privy Council. During this time he was unable to work and his wife had to return to work. Grant eventually resumed his practice as a general physician with a particular interest in children's illnesses. Never very affluent he lived at Grange and also had honorary appointments at the Home for Incurables and Tennyson House. Despite his financial issues he maintained his membership of the Adelaide Club. Richard Longford Thorold Grant died on 29th March 1979. He was survived by his 2



World War 2


Richard had remained on the Reserve List after the end of WW1 and early in November 1939 he applied for a Commission in the RAAF.



As a consultant physician to the RAAF, Richard was granted a commission in January 1940 as a Flight Lieutenant (on probation) with the rank of Squadron Leader. By November 1942 he had risen to the rank of Wing Commander.



After WW2 ended, Richard was attached to the Citizens Air Force Active List and in 1951 was transferred to the RAAF Reserve as a part time consulting physician.



It is noted from the correspondence that Richard had for some years had private consulting rooms at 219 North Terrace Adelaide (Now a car park behind the old Coles store in Rundle Mall). This building was also the home of The English Speaking Union of SA, and organisation that the Thorold Grants were actively involved with.






Additional Biography

Family Origins and Early Years

Richard Longford Thorold Grant was born at North Adelaide on 22nd April 1894 to William and Emily Grant (nee Jefferson).







Richard's paternal and maternal family origins were both from England. Branches of the Grant Family had arrived and settled in both in South Australia and Western Australia around the late 1830s and obtained significant pastoral leases. Richard's wealthy great grandfather, Alexander William Thorold Grant, acquired significant property holdings in South Australia including an area that stretched between the South Para River and Gawler (One Tree Hill district).



Alexander William Thorold Grant (Date of Birth: 29 February 1820, Place of Birth: England)
Was one of the earliest settlers in the One Tree Hill district and represented one of the most prestigious families to come to South Australia at that time.

Born in England on the 29th February 1820, Grant was the son of Alexander (Sandy) Grant and Helen Thorold. His father was described as a "boon companion" of King William IV of England and was said to have played an active part in his sovereign's coronation. Alexander senior also resided for a time in France with his family who became proficient in several languages.

Alexander was keen to make his own way in life, however, and at the tender age of seventeen set out to make his mark in South Australia. He was influenced in this decision because his godfather, Lord Glenelg, was Secretary of State for the Colonies when South Australia was first settled in 1836. Before venturing to South Australia, however, he spent time in the Scottish highlands, gaining experience working with sheep.

He set sail from England on the "Hartley" in 1837 and arrived in South Australia that same year. He is reported to have come with a sum of £1,000.

By January 1840 Grant was squatting near the Little Para River. Assisted by F.W. Stokes, he acquired a Pastoral Lease which extended from the Little Para River to Gawler. He ran 1300 sheep which were looked after by shepherds who lived in bark humpies, as did he. There were no fences. The sheep were constantly on the move and in need of water, especially in the warmer months, and as Smith's Creek, Tenafeate Creek and the South Para River were the most likely sources of water, that is possibly how he became familiar with the areas of land he purchased in 1842 from the South Para River Survey. This land included Cornishmans Hill Road, One Tree Hill, which he named Tyeka (Sections 1678-1684 of Munno Para) and Tenafeate Creek, named Tenafeate, (Sections 1638, 1647-1649 etc. of Para Wirra). This land later became part of the Yattalunga property.

According to Jack Ifould, a well-known local resident, Grant also built a cottage at Yattalunga behind what later became the imposing Yattalunga homestead built by Philip Butler.

After improving his holdings at One Tree Hill, Grant and partner Stokes ventured north when seasons were good, and prospered on a pastoral lease at Kanyaka Station previously held by Hugh Proby son of the Earl of Carysfort. Proby had drowned while attempting to cross the flooded Willochra Creek.

To assist in running these newly acquired northern properties James, Grant's brother, who had served in the Royal Navy, set sail from England. He appears to have arrived in the early 1850's. Accompanied by a friend, he set out for Kanyaka Station. They were never to arrive. James Grant and friend became lost at some stage during their journey and both perished.

When their bodies were discovered some considerable time later, James' remains were brought back to Tyeka for burial in the garden. The site was said to be surrounded by a stone wall. There is a stone wall still there in the present day garden.

Helen Grant, mother of Alexander and James, with another son Frederick and his new bride Arabella, also arrived in South Australia about that time.

Helen is reputed to have brought cuttings from a willow tree on Napoleon's grave at St Helena. These cuttings were planted on the grave at Tyeka. It is also claimed that more cuttings were planted near a water hole at Starr's Gully, Yattalunga.

Helen visited the Kanyaka property where Mount Helen, a peak in the Horseshoe Range north of Coonatto, was named after her. During that time Alexander and Frederick Grant built Coonatto to what was described as "massive proportions."

Meanwhile the family interests around the One Tree Hill district were still being maintained by managers or partners. A partnership was formed with Philip Butler, uncle of Sir Richard Butler M.P. Butler was later to take over some of the Yattalunga property and build the imposing Yattalunga residence as it is known today.

According to a Mr Blackham's notes on the OTH district, at some period around this time other parts of Grant's OTH land were offered for sale. His shepherds were given first option to buy, at a reasonable price and on reasonable terms. This can be authenticated by the fact that in 1852 John MacKenzie, possibly one of his shepherds, purchased some of this land and added it to the South Para land he had already managed to acquire.

By 1858, Alexander was his mother's family's only surviving male heir. His Grandfather Thorold had no surviving male issue and although his mother was a younger daughter of her family, she had produced the only male heir. Alexander thus became heir to an estate worth at least 300,000 English pounds (a vast sum in those days). He journeyed back to England to prepare for his inheritance, leaving his brother Frederick and F. W. Stokes (whose name is still synonymous with land features in the district), to manage the family's South Australian interests.


After his return to England in 1858 Alexander married Anna Hamilton Stirling, daughter of Sir James Stirling – 1st Governor of Western Australia. They had five children.

Alexander Grant's grandfather died in 1865 and Alexander became successor to the Thorold estates.

He did not return to South Australia.

Later in 1852, after the owner had drowned crossing a flooded creek, he took over the lease of Coonatto Station in the lower Flinders' Ranges. The Grant family members were wealthy enough to spend much of their time between their homes in England and Australia. Richard's father William was born in 1862 during one of the families trips back to the mother country and was then educated in the UK at Eaton and Oxford before then spending most of his time in Australia. The following Obituary provides some more information.

The following article relates to Richard's grandfather Frederick Augustus Grant who took over Coonatto station from his father Alexander.

OBITUARY

The death is announced of Mr. William Thorold Grant, one of the most capable writers on pastoral subjects in Australia. For many years he contributed special articles on these topics to The Register, and was also esociated with The Advertiser before he joined the staff of The Australasian, Melbourne, in which his pen name of writings. under the "Bendleby," were eagerly read. judge of sheep he was a competent critic, and his stories of the early days of the pastoral industry in the backblocks would fill volumes. The deceased was born at Learnington, Warwickshire, and was a son of the late Mr. Frederick Augustus He was educated at Eton from Grant. 1876 to 1881, and finished at Christ Church College, Oxford (1882-4). The story of his life has been well told in many paragraphs previously published in connection with his newspaper contributions, recognised as the best of their kind in Australia. Summarized, Mr. Grant's record includes 10 years in pastoral pursuits, 10 years in mining, prospecting, and exploring, and 16 years in journalism (four years in Adelaide and the rest as "Bendleby," of The Australasian, Dr. Thorold Grant, of North terrace, is a son.

Obituary

WILLIAM THOROLD GRANT.

William Thorold Grant, journalist, for many years best known as "Bendlebury" of "The Australiasian," a writer known to sheep, eattle and lorse men throughout Australia, died at Bracside Hospital, Stanmore, Sydney, last Thoroday night

last Thursday night.

Mr. Grant was well known to nearly all Western graziers, level for his engaging and manly personality, and appreciated for the meticulous study he had given to stock, more particularly to sheep. He was in Dubbo only a few weeks ago, and was staying for a while at several of the stations in

the Trangie and Warren districts.
Thorold Grant was educated at E.ton and Oxford, and came to Australia in the early eighties to work for the Colonial Sugar Refining Company at Victoria plantation, on the Herbert River. In those early days he very quickly took place as the leading amateur steeplechase rider in Queenalaul. & consummate horseman (he had han ted in England from childhood), with the culmest judgment and an entire absence of fear, the mantle of Landsay Gordon descended very fitly upon him as far as Queensland was concerned. Later he took up the study that has mode his writing name famous. leaves a widow and grown-up family, and when he died was about 65 years

Primary and Secondary Education - Queen's School North Adelaide

Young Richard Grant was educated at Queen's School, Barton Terrace, North Adelaide. After finishing his Primary years, he completed his Junior Public Examinations in 1908 (equivalent to Intermediate) and was mentioned in the General Honor List. He passed in an exceptional nine subjects, with credits in Latin and French (Individual Subject Honor List). He was also mentioned in the General Honor List in 1909 after passing his Senior Public Examinations passing in eight subjects with five credits. He had received an individual subject Honor in Latin, Arithmetic/Algebra, Geometry, Physics and Inorganic Chemistry.

While at Queen's School he played in the cricket team and participated in the athletics carnivals, winning the half mile cup event in September 1909. For the following two years at the annual athletics carnival, held on Adelaide Oval, he won the School Cup two years in a row, by winning both the quarter and half mile events.

After a "year's interval" in 1910, he preceded to his final year at Queen's School in preparation for entrance to University. He passed four subjects in the Higher Public Examinations in 1911 (Equivalent to Leaving Honors) finishing 14th in the General Honor List.

The Queen's School athletic sports held on the Adelaide Oval, had attracted a large attendance, Howard I. winning the championship and Grant the school cun. school eleven had had a successful year, and nine of them were returning in 1911 Every boy in the school had played cricket regularly, and all but one, who was under the doctor's orders played football. head master concluded by reading the address of the late King Edward to the boys of Rugby, which he, as an old Rughesan himself, was proud to deliver to Queens' School boys to be the guidance of their future life at "Rugby beyond the seas." Unusually in 1913 while at University, he sat for a further Senior Public Examination subject (English Literature) studying under a private tutor. Again he passed with a credit and made the Special Honor List

In 1912, his first year at Adelaide University, Richard was required to complete some compulsory science subjects before he could be accepted into medicine. He gained a Division 1 pass in Physics (Distinction) and Division 2 pass in Biology (Credit)

Details of Australian medical students and graduates were recorded in the UK Register.

Entering the medical faculty in 1913, Richard would have an outstanding academic record. He topped 1st Year Medicine and was awarded the Elder Prize. In 1914 and 15 he passed (First Class - Distinction) in 2nd and 3rd Year, however in 1916 he had to defer his studies because of a serious kidney condition (renal tuberculosis) requiring a nephrectomy.


Returning to complete 4th Year in 1917 he passed (Second Class - top Credit). With more stamina in 1918 he passed his 5th and final year (First Class - equal top). Both he and Raphael West Cilento (later Sir Raphael and father of Film Star - Diane Cilento) were both awarded the Everard Scholarship (Thirty Pounds).

1918 Medical Graduates





Richard's broader interest in University life was demonstrated when in June 1914 he was on the organising committee for the annual University Ball. Generally he was very much part of the Adelaide social scene.





Adelaide University Sport

Richard was a very fit and athletic lad at Queen's School and he continued to play sport at Adelaide University. The first newspaper record of his participation at Adelaide University was rowing for the Science Faculty in the September 1912 Rowing Club Regatta. It appears to be his only try at rowing.




He only played one season of cricket and was unable to hold a regular place in the B Grade side during the 1913/14 season. The AUCC only had two teams, an A and B Grade side playing in the SACA competition.





It was as a middle distance runner for the Athletics Club that Richard excelled at University, continuing the form he had shown while at Queen's School. In the annual university athletics carnival in 1913, the 19 year old medical student won the one mile event in the very fine time of 4 minutes 29 seconds (The World Record at the time was 4 minutes 14 seconds). The following year he won the half mile event in 2 minutes 2 seconds.

Richard was a member of the 1914 Intervarsity Athletics Carnival held in Adelaide. He was also a member of the organising committee.





Richard also was a very good lacrosse player and a valuable member of the Adelaide University Lacrosse team in 1914 and 1915. During the War years all competitions were abandoned, however his health issues that struck him down in 1916, as well as impacting on his studies would have certainly curtailed his sporting ambitions too. It could be speculated that without the misfortune of War and illness Richard could have qualified and represented Australia in athletics at Olympic games level.

After the end of hostilities, local lacrosse matches resumed, as did the annual contest against Melbourne University. Richard was a member of the 1919 Intervarsity team that was defeated by Melbourne University in Melbourne. Although he had now completed his medical course, a concession was made, with 1918 graduates permitted to play in the contest.

He was a spectator at the Intervarsity match against Melbourne University held in Adelaide in February 1920. This was the first intervarsity cricket contest since 1910. 



After two years at The Adelaide Hospital Richard went to England for further experience and in 1921 he obtained his membership of the Royal College of Physicians.

In 1922 after returning from England, Richard was appointed as a Demonstrator in Pathology in the Pathology Department of the University of Adelaide headed by John Burton Cleland M.D. His research work on Graves' Disease (Hyperthyroidism) was published in the Medical Journal of Australia.






In 1926 he was appointed as an assistant physician at the Adelaide Children's Hospital and he held this role until promoted in 1937 to physician, holding this position until 1954.


In 1951, Richard was elected as President of the local branch of the British Medical Association. As BMA State President, Richard was facing the same sort of issues that have been faced by the profession and the community in more recent times, including bed shortages.





Other issues facing the BMA (SA Branch) in the early 1950s were questions of doctor shortages and the push for a government subsidised private health insurance scheme. The National Health Services and Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme were also being implemented and faced various teething problems for doctors. It was really quite a time of change.





With antibiotics now becoming more readily available for doctors to prescribe, Richard warned that they should be used only when absolutely indicated and advised that the Children's Hospital did not use them excessively.



There is little published information about his professional career after he finished as a consultant physician at the Adelaide Children's Hospital in 1954; however some of his other roles are covered in his published obituary at the end of his biography.

Personal Family and Social Life




During and after his University days Richard was very visible on the Adelaide social scene. He always remembered fondly his years at Queen's School and was a member of the committee that organised old scholars' events.

By 1925 Richard's sister Nancy was living in Melbourne, possibly to be with her father and mother who had moved to Victoria some years earlier.




Sadly the family faced the death of Richards's father in 1925 (see earlier obituary).

Happier times followed in 1927 when Richard married Nancy Lewis at St Peter's Cathedral.






After the marriage they lived in North Adelaide and then in November 1927 Richard and Nancy moved into their home at The Avenue, Medindie.



The Thorold Grant's first child (William John) was born in December 1927




A second son Richard "Dick" Thorold Grant was born in July 1929.

Richard was well known and highly regarded within the medical profession, but surprisingly, is probably just as well known by legal academics and profession world-wide. In 1933 he was involved in a landmark legal case that went all the way to the Privy Court in England which set a legal precedent.

The Dermatitis Case

Grant v Australian Knitting Mills, is a landmark case in consumer and negligence law from 1935, holding that where a manufacturer knows that a consumer may be injured if the manufacturer does not take reasonable care, the manufacturer owes a duty to the consumer to take that reasonable care. It continues to be cited as an authority in legal cases, and used as an example for students studying law. 19

After contracting a very severe and debilitating case of dermatitis following the purchase and wearing of undergarments contaminated with substances used in the manufacturing process. After winning a Supreme Court of SA judgment the manufacture won an appeal to the High Court of Australia. Richard's case was then taken to the Privy Council in London. The judgment overturned the High Court decision and the original judgment was reinstated. Costs of nearly £20,000 (about \$383,000 today) were to be paid by the Australian Knitting Mills. The case set precedence with regard to the negligence by manufacturers of goods that may cause personal harm and was thereafter cited in many similar legal cases that followed and continues in law practice today.

Although Dr Thorold Grant eventually received the original damages of £2450, the stress of the long running legal case and his debilitating affliction, disturbed significantly his professional career and family life (see more detail in his obituary).

Dr. Grant To Pay Costs

SYDNEY, August 18. The High Court, by a majority judgment, today allowed the appeal of the Australian Knitting Mills, manufacturers of woollen garments, and John Martin & Co., of Adelaide, retailers of garments from the factory, against the decision of the Chief Justice of South Australia (Sir George Murray), giving £2.450 damages to Dr. Richard Thorold Grant, of Adelaide who was alleged to have suffered from an attack of dermatitis as the result of wearing certain garments The judgment of the Supreme Court of South Australia was reversed, and an order to pay the costs of the original action and the appeal was made against Dr. Grant.

Reasons For Judgment

In his judgment today Mr. Justice Starke said it was plain enough that Dr. Grant knew that Martin & Co. was only a retailer and not the manufacturer of the garments. It would have been wholly unreasonable on Dr. Grant's part to expect from Martin and Co. an exact knowledge, not only of the sort of article he wanted, but also of the processes by which it was manufactured. Martin & Co. had no means of discovering the defects suggested in the garments, and even chemical analysis would have been ineffective, because the sulphur compounds were not evenly distributed over the garments. As a matter of fact he did not believe that Dr. Grant trusted Martin & Co.'s skill or its judgment that the goods were reasonably fit for wearing and free from irritant chemicals or other noxious substance. He saw the goods h mself and was satisfied with their appearance and price. In his opinion the appea, should be allowed, the judgment below reversed and judgment entered in favor of the Australian Knitting Mills and John Martin and Co.

DR. GRANT WILL APPEAL

Dermatitis Case To Continue

Dr. Richard Thorold Grant has decided to appeal to the judicidial committee of the Privy Council against the decision of the High Court in the dermatitis case.

The High Court in a judgment given resterday reversed the decision of the Chief Justice (Sir George Murray) that John Martin & Co., Ltd., of Adelaide, and the Australian Knitting Mills, of Victoria, should pay £2,450 damages and costs following the alleged contraction by Dr. Grant of dermatitis from garments bought from John Martin's.

It will be necessary for the solicitors of Dr. Grant to appeal to the Privy Council for leave to bring on the appeal. A petition asking for this will take some time to prepare.

The Privy Council is the Supreme Court of the British Empire, and there is no appeal from its decisions. It is composed of members of the House of Lords.

Mr. E. E Cleland. K.C., is senior counsel for Dr. Grant. He will probably arrange for the petition to be forwarded to an agent in London.



in respect of an attack of dermatitis
alleged to have been suffered by him as a result of the presence of irritants in certain underclothing manulactured by the mills and sold to him by Mortin's. Dr. Grant began his action in April, 1932, a leging that about nine hours after first wearing the garments he developed symptoms of dermatitis. The mills admitted that the garments contained small quantities of sulphur dioxide, but said they were too small to cause dermatitis. The Chief Jus-tice (Sir George Murray), after a trial lasting 20 days, awarded Dr. Grant £2,450 damages and costs, holding that the disease was caused by an irritant in the garments, the presence of which was due to the negligence of the mills. He also found that in selling the clothes. Martin's had committed a breach of warranties contained in their advertisements. The companies appealed to the High Court of Australia which allowed the appeal. Dr Grant obtained special leave to appeal to the Privy Council, and also filed a petition for leave to call further evidence. The appeal and petition were heard together by the Privy Council, which allowed the appeal, affirming Sir George Murray's judgment, and dismissed the petition. Costs in the Privy Council and in the lower courts were allowed Dr. Grant, but the petition was dismissed without costs.1

In 1941 the Thorold Grant's home at Grange had been broken into by a boy who had escaped from the Magill Reformatory. Richard had disturbed him during the act and nothing was stolen, however he escaped in a stolen vehicle which was later spotted by police. A high-speed pursuit followed with the thief eventually crashing and then arrested.....nothing has changed!

When arrested defendant admitted having earlier in the night broken into Dr. Grant' house.

Sadly in August 1945 Richard's Mother (Emily Jane *née* Jefferson) passed away aged 81, in Melbourne.

Richard Thorold Grant was born in North Adelaide, the only son of William Thorold and Emily (nee Jefferson). His forebears had been pioneer pastoralists in South Australia, but his father had become better-known as a writer on rural affairs for The Australasian under the pen-name "Bendleby". During his medical course, which he started in 1913, Dick won trophies as a middle distance runner and played inter-varsity lacrosse for South Australia. Then renal tuberculosis necessitated a nephrectomy but he was still able to graduate at the end of the First World War and to achieve Membership of the Royal College of Physicians in London in 1921. After his return to Australia in 1922, he eschewed the idea of any preliminary period in general practice and commenced at once in Adelaide as a specialist physician. He then started his long association with the Adelaide Children's Hospital in various honorary appointments, at first as a pathologist and bacteriologist from 1923 to 1925; then as an assistant physician from 1926 to 1937; and finally as a physician from 1937 to 1954.

Dick married Nancy Lewis, daughter of an Adelaide ophthalmologist, on 23 February 1927 and two sons were born to the marriage. However, disaster struck in 1929 when he contracted severe generalised dermatitis as a result of wearing newly-purchased woollen underwear which apparently contained a bleach or some such chemical substance to which he was sensitive. This long illness, and the protracted litigation that followed (ultimately ending at Privy Council level) inevitably greatly disturbed his career and his family. His wife had to enter the work force and his children had to be cared for by a grandmother until he recovered. In any case, when Dick resumed his practice after those difficult years, the comparatively modest income to be derived as a general physician (with a particular interest in children) in that era meant that he was never very affluent. He lived quietly for the rest of his life at The Grange, then a less-frequented seaside suburb of Adelaide, but managed to maintain his membership of the Adelaide Club where mixing with kindred spirits was his main relaxation. Other pleasures were beachcombing along the shores of St Vincent's Gulf and seabathing near his home. He was also a keen follower of first class cricket.

He is remembered by his two sons with deep affection for his fatherly kindness and by surviving colleagues as a gentle, rather reserved, man who comported himself with dignity in his professional activities. These activities included (in addition to his consultant and teaching responsibilities at the Adelaide Children's Hospital) an appointment as visiting medical officer to the Home for Incurables (now the Julia Farr Centre); a long term as visiting physician to Estcourt House, an institution on the seafront at Tennyson where children with rheumatic heart damage spent their long convalescence; and service in South Australia during the Second World War as a consultant physician to the RAAF with the rank of wing commander. Life was never easy for Dick Grant but in spite of several major setbacks he continued in his quiet way to serve his profession and the community to the best of his ability all his days.






Richard "Dick" Thorold Grant




Richard also played football and cricket for the College.

After graduation Richard travelled to Africa and identified a hardy breed of cattle which would be ideally suited to outback Australia.





It seems incredulous that Richard was not given the credit for identifying this breed of cattle and credit is only given to a CSIRO team in the 1980s. It took until 1990 before they were actually introduced into Australia.

"A team from CSIRO in Rockhampton, led by Dr John Frisch, recognised the value of introducing a tropically adapted breed into Australia that was unrelated to the Brahman. From their research they identified the Boran as having the characteristics required."









The Boran in Australia

In 1980 Australian researchers visited Africa to identify a breed of cattle that had exceptional fertility and beef quality, and would adapt well to Australian climatic and environmental conditions. They found the African Boran. Described as *God's gift to cattlemen*, the Boran had these qualities and more. They were hardy, had a calm, friendly disposition and resistance to pests and disease. Since their arrival in Australia in 1990, the Boran's unique and appealing traits have made it the ideal choice for the hobby farmer, cattle breeder and organic beef producer.
