Background

Coinciding with the Centenary of Anzacs our incentive behind the series of biographical publications is the Adelaide University Football and Cricket Club's desire to honour our players who served in the Great War (1914 - 1918). These brave men put on hold their academic, professional and sporting careers for King and Country in the name of peace and freedom. The AUFC/AUCC WW1 Memorial Committee is endeavouring to identify every one of our players who served and prepare life stories on all. This is to ensure their sacrifices and further contributions to society will be recognised by future generations.

On Anzac Day 2015, the Centenary of the Gallipoli landing, a memorial plaque was unveiled on the Adelaide University Oval Pavilion and this was followed by the erection of a picket fence between the pavilion and the scoreboard with each picket bearing a plaque with the name of an AUFC/AUCC player who served.

The following documentation relates to the life of Colin Gurner. It is compilation of information and photographs collected from a variety of historical sources.

Colin Gurner was born on 25th May 1896 the second son of Walter and Hannah, nee Fry and brought up in Marryatville, SA. His great grandfather had migrated from England in 1849 eventually settling in Riverton, South Australia. He was educated at Prince Alfred College and studied medicine at the University of Adelaide where he graduated MB BS in 1918. He played football and tennis for the university eventually captaining both teams and being awarded a Blue for each.

During his medical course he had joined the Citizens Military Force and after his graduation was appointed captain in the AAMC on 26th November 1918. This appointment was terminated on 17th December 1919. His brother Leonard, a lieutenant in the infantry, was killed in action in July 1918.

Gurner entered general practice with Ernest and Lincoln Borthwick in the Payneham and Marryatville areas. He joined the radiology practice of Stanley Verco in 1930 and, with his wife and two sons, he left Adelaide to study radiology in Vienna, London and the United States in 1931. Not long after his return to South Australia and partnership with Dr Verco in Verco Buildings on North Terrace he was appointed honorary assistant radiologist and radiotherapist at the Adelaide Hospital and the Adelaide Children's Hospital. He became a member of the SA State Committee of the Australian and New Zealand Association of Radiologists in 1938 and remained a member until 1950.

Gurner joined the AAMC in October 1939 and was posted to 2 AGH. Joining Leonard Charles Edward Lindon and Edmond Britten-Jones at Puckapunyal they found the circumstances offered at the Menzies Hotel in Melbourne more desirable than a shared tent and became known as the 'MX contingent (the Menzies Expeditionary Force)'. Gurner embarked for the Middle East in 1940 and set up at Kantara on the Suez Canal. He returned to Australia in March 1942 and Gurner was to take a number of military posts around Adelaide and did not go overseas again. The Gurner home became an unofficial 'officers mess' for officers billeted all over Adelaide.

He returned to his work at Adelaide and Adelaide Children's Hospitals and the Verco, Gurner and Smeaton radiological practice much to the relief of Bronte Smeaton who had had the lion's share of the work as his partners were engaged in their military duties. After Smeaton's death the practice was joined firstly by Peter Verco, Stanley Verco's son and later Gurner's son, Colin. Gurner was a heavy smoker and was showing signs of vascular degeneration. When his son joined the regular army in 1960 he retired from practice. Colin Gurner died on 15th February 1962. His wife, Jessie, died a few weeks later. He was survived by his children including Colin who later became Major General Gurner AO CBE ED QHP, DGMS.





Additional Biography

Schooling

Colin's early schooling was at Norwood public School however in 1910 he won a scholarship which enabled him to study at Adelaide High School in 1910 and 1911. He passed his Junior and Senior Examinations while at Adelaide High School and was a member of the 1st XI Cricket Team. Colin spent his final school years (1912 & 1913) at Prince Alfred's College. At PAC Colin was a school Prefect in 1913. He was the 1912 & 1913 Tennis Champion, played football, cricket and athletics in Intercollegiate and in weekly competitions.



Colin represented the University at Intervarsity Football in 1914 & 1919 and at Intervarsity Tennis in 1914 & 1919, 1920 (Captain) and Intervarsity Athleticsⁱⁱⁱ. Colin was awarded Blues for Football (1915) and Tennis (1918).



WW1

When Colin enlisted in the AAMC on 17 June 1918 he was described as 5-foot 11¾ inches, 160 lbs, with a fair complexion, grey eyes and light brown hair.

Marriage

Colin married Jessie Gwyndolyn Marshall, the daughter of James Marshall, at the Methodist Church at Kent Town on the 18th December 1918. Sons, Colin Marshall and Walter James Lincoln were born in 1919 and 1924 respectively.

Tennis

Colin competed in the South Australian Tennis Championships in 1919, 1920, 1921, 1923, 1924 & 1925, reaching the Quarter Finals of the Singles in 1920 and 1921. In 1920 Colin competed in the Australian Open and was defeated in the Quarter Finals Quarterfinals by Horace Michael Rice (6-2 6-2). vi

Colin also played squash and golf (becoming a member of Royal Adelaide). vii

Other Interests

Colin and Jessie enjoyed several overseas trips including visits to Great Britain, the Continent, and the United States of America (1931), England by way of America (1935) and the UK and Norway (1950).

Family Tradition

Colin and Jesse's elder son Colin Marshall Gurner also attended Adelaide University qualifying MBBS (1942), playing cricket for the University from 1937/38 (Blue in 1938) until 1942/1943 when the competition was suspended. He joined the AAMC (1943) where he rose to the rank of Major General and was awarded the AO, CBE, KStJ, ED & QHP.

Radiologist Surgeon-General taking up civilian career When Major-General Colin Gurner retires on Wednesday it will mark the end of a military career that began when he joined the School Cadet Corps in 1935. Colin Marshall Gurner graduated a surgeon from the University of Adelaide in 1942, then joined the Australian Army Medical Corps and served in the AIF until 1946, reaching the rank of captain. After World War II, he served in the Citizen Military Force, from 1948 to 1960, rising to the rank of colonel in the Medical Corps. In 1960 he joined the Australian Regular Army as a colonel and was promoted to major general in 1967. General Gurner retires as Surgeon General of the Defence Force, a position he has held since 1977. During his military career General Gurner served in Papua New Guinea, Singapore, Malaysia, Thailand, Vietnam, Britain, Canada, the US and Germany. He was appointed an honorary physician to the Queen in 1967 and was awarded the honour of Commander of the Order of the British Empire in 1969. Though his military service ends on Wednesday, General Gurner's medical career will continue as he will be working in his speciality, radiology, in Canberra. After graduating from university as a Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery, he specialised in radiology, becoming a Member of the American College of Radiology in 1952,

Fellow of the College of Radiologists of Australia in 1957, and a Fellow of the Royal College of Radiologists in 1975. General Gurner had also become a Fellow of the Royal Australian College of Surgeons, and of the Royal Australian College of Physicians in 1969. He is president of the ACT Corps of the St John Ambulance Brigade, and chairman of the ACT Medical Board.

He joined the militia (CMF) in 1939 and completed his internship at Royal Adelaide Hospital (RAH) before entering army service in 1943 as a Captain. He served in various Camp Hospitals in both Australia and New Guinea, including AGH 101 near Adelaide where his father was the radiologist. When war ended Colin trained in the radiology department at RAH, acting also as radium officer. After obtaining RACP Membership in 1950 he spent a year as Fellow in Radiation Therapy at Memorial Cancer Centre, New York, obtaining the Diploma of the American Board of Radiology (Radiation Therapy). On returning he joined the long-established radiological practice in North Terrace of Victor Stanley Verco and his father as a junior partner. He maintained honorary appointments to RAH and Adelaide Children's Hospital while continuing his involvement with the CMF, holding a senior appointment and commanding two medical units. In 1960 following the retirement of Major General William Refshauge as DGMS to become Commonwealth Director of Health, Colin accepted the offer to join the Regular Army as deputy DGMS. He was promoted to Brigadier in 1961 and Major General in 1967 when appointed DGMS. It was a time of National Service in Australia and involvement in the Vietnam War. Colin made regular trips to Singapore, Malaysia and New Guinea where troops were stationed. To be readily available to the Chief of the General Staff and Ministers for the Army, successively Malcolm Fraser, Philip Lynch and Andrew Peacock, Colin moved to Canberra. He was appointed Physician to the Queen in 1967 and Commander of the British Empire in 1969 in recognition of the contribution of the Medical Corps in Vietnam. Colin Gurner was President of the Royal Australasian College of Radiologists at the time of the First Asian-Oceanian Congress of Radiology held in Melbourne in 1971. He was appointed the first Surgeon General of the Defence Forces in 1977 and Officer in the Order of Australia in 1978. Following compulsory retirement at 60, Colin became director of the Australian Kidney Foundation and returned to radiology working in the Health Department and private practice. He was Chairman of the ACT Medical Board from 1979 to 1984. Always keen on sport and the outdoors, Colin gained blues in football and cricket at Adelaide University and played district cricket. He once admitted to dropping Don Bradman off a friend's bowling! In his seventies, he completed a diploma of journalism. In 2003 he published The Royal Australian Army Medical Corps, 1945-1975, described by a reviewer as 'a precious document'. Among many other awards he received Honorary Fellowships from the Royal College of Radiologists (London), Royal Australasian College of Physicians and the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons, delivering the Rupert Downes Memorial Lecture in 1979. He was a Knight in the Order of St John of Jerusalem. Colin's main interests during his Army days included malarial control, innovative means of evacuating those wounded and the effects of chemical, biological and radioactive weapons. He also successfully promoted the introduction to the medical defence services of part-time specialist expertise. Colin was survived by his wife Cynthia, nee Miller, a physiotherapist, three children, five grand-children and one great-grandson. Second son, Walter James Lincoln "Jim" Gurner, completed his schooling at Prince Alfred College in Adelaide in 1940. Records of the speech night on 19th December 1940 states he was Sixth Form (A) Dux and won the Geoff Robin Memorial Prize.

Later records note that "Cadet W. J. L. Gurner, gained 100 per cent, proficiency in the recent Air Training Corps tests. B Flight of No. 70 Squadron of the Air Training 12 Sept 1942" Jim Gurner served in the RAAF ending as a Warrant Officer in 1945 with 101 Squadron.
