Background

Coinciding with the Centenary of Anzacs our incentive behind the series of biographical publications is the Adelaide University Football and Cricket Club's desire to honour our players who served in the Great War (1914 - 1918). These brave men put on hold their academic, professional and sporting careers for King and Country in the name of peace and freedom. The AUFC/AUCC WW1 Memorial Committee is endeavouring to identify every one of our players who served and prepare life stories on all. This is to ensure their sacrifices and further contributions to society will be recognised by future generations.

On Anzac Day 2015, the Centenary of the Gallipoli landing, a memorial plaque was unveiled on the Adelaide University Oval Pavilion and this was followed by the erection of a picket fence between the pavilion and the scoreboard with each picket bearing a plaque with the name of an AUFC/AUCC player who served.

No. - Lietenant S. Howard, 4th Flying Corps Squadron.

Our Commissioners have now confirmed by letter their cable to us concerning the above soldier and we forward same to you for your further information.

They advise that Lieutenant Howard who was admitted to the 8th Red Cross Hospital, Boulogne, on the 20th August last, suffering from gunshot wounds in the left leg - severe, was transferred to the R.A.F. Officer's Hospital three days later, after which, as was indicated in our revious letter to you, he was transferred to the Hillington Hall Hospital, Norfolk, on the 14th September, being reported to be six days later up and walking about also playing tennis, he being then very well and cheerful.

Biography


Early Life

Stanford Howard was born on 8th July 1898, near Ballarat, Victoria. He was the son of Rev Henry Howard and Sarah Jane (Jean) Reynolds. His brothers were Norman (1886), Arthur Ewing (1891) and Egbert Percy (1893) and his sister Winifred Jane (1895). The family moved to Kent Terrace, Kent Town, Adelaide, in 1903 when the Rev Henry Howard took on his ministry from the Pirie Street, Methodist Church.

Schooling

Stanford attended the Sturt Street School then Adelaide High School where in 1912 he passed his Primary Examinations and won a scholarship to attend Prince Alfred's College (PAC). Stanford passed his Junior Examinations in 1912, followed by his Senior Examinations in 1913 and his Higher Public Examinations in 1915 and 1916. While at PAC, Stanford won numerous prizes and scholarships, he participated in the intercollegiate sports and was Captain of the PAC team in 1916; he rose to be Captain of both the PAC football and cricket teams and vice-captain of the tennis team. In addition to sporting achievements, Stanford was Captain of the School, a successful Cadet, secretary of the Christian Union, and manager of the Chronicle (PAC Magazine).


1914 PAC Cadet team




Stanford – seated on chair – Far Right




1916 PAC Intercollegiate Tennis Team



1916 PAC Prefects




1916 PAC Intercollegiate Football Team

World War I

Stanford enlisted on 26th January 1917 in Melbourne, Victoria. Some of his service records show the Service Number 1493 however the main number used was SN 1511. When he enlisted he was described as 6'2', 163 lb, with a medium complexion, blue eyes and brown hair. After attending A.F.C. Camp at Laverton, Stanford embarked from Melbourne on board the HMAT A9 *Shropshire* on 11th May 1917 and disembarked in Plymouth, England on 19th July 1919. On the journey to England the convoy had an encounter with a U-boat, which Stanford described in a letter to his father.

TRANSPORTS AND SUBMARINES. It was light at 3 o'clock, and we swoke to see the Eddystone ahead and about 15 destroyers careering round us. We felt much relieved, and soon afterwards learnt the full strength of Wednesday's manoeuter the full

Stanford was a depot wireless operator at Wendover, England before commencing pilot training. On the 10th May 1918 Stanford was appointed a Flying Officer, 2nd Lieutenant (pilot) in the A.F.C. and was posted to France. On 10 August 1918 Stanford was promoted to Lieutenant with the 4th Squadron. Ten days later, while engaged in a flying mission, Stanford received gunshot wound in left leg. His Achilles tendon was almost divided and had to be repaired. While in hospital Stanford also had an operation to remove his tonsils. Stanford's leg injury had been described as severe; however, his Red Cross record (above) shows that by the 20th September 1918, Stanford was up and playing tennis.

Sadly, for Stanford, his mother died in July 1918. However, on a happier note, Stanford was in London in December 1918 and met with his brother Arthur E Howard. Arthur had been a student at Oxford in 1914. He was on holidays in Germany at the outbreak of WWI and was an interned prisoner in the Ruhleben Camp, ten kilometres west of Berlin, for the duration of the war.


In 1919, Stanford was appointed official interpreter of German to the Cologne representatives of the Armistice Commission. Stanford returned to Australia on 6 May 1919 onboard the 'Kaiser-I- Hind' and his appointment was terminated on the 14th July 1919.

Adelaide University and Sport

On his return to Adelaide, Stanford commenced studying at Adelaide University and gained a Division I pass in Biology in December 1919. In October 1919 Stanford was awarded the 1919 Rhodes Scholarship.

Stanford was a member of the 1919 Adelaide University Intervarsity Football team (2nd ruck) and may have played for the University in Adelaide Football Association games. A fine all-round cricketer at PAC, he resumed his cricketing career and was named in the Adelaide University A Grade Team for the first match in the 1919/20 Season. He was only able to play until the end of December.

INTER-VARSITY FOOTBALL. The assual football match between the Melbourne and Adelside universities will be played on the Melbourne University Oval on August 20. The inter-varsity contents have not been played during the war, the last having been contested in 1914, when Melbourne was victorious. The Adelside 'Varsity has had a successful season in the Adelside 'Football Association, having suffered only one defeat, and having an average score of 2) goals a match for 11 matches. The team will be greatly handicapped by the absence of G E. Jone (vice-captain), G, M. Hone (cuch), L. V. Pellew, and C. Kneebone (forward), who are unable to make the trip. Melbourne is reguted to have a strong side, and a keen, exciting struggle is expected. The Adelside team will leave for Melbourne by the express on Friday. RHODES SCHOLAR

MR. S. HOWARD APPOINTED.

SON OF THE REV. H. HOWARD

The Rhodes Scholarship selection committee for South Australia met at Government House at 11 a.m. on Monday. There were present: His Excellency the Governor (chairman), the Chief Justice (Sir George Murray), Sir Joseph Verco, Mr. J. P. Fawler, Professor Naylor, Professor denderson, and the honorary secretary (Mr. C. R. Hodge). The applications of eight candidates were considered, and each entrant was interviewed by the committee, Finally the committee unanimously selected Mr. Stanford Howard as the Rhodes Scholar for 1919. Mr. Howard, who is a son of the Rev. H. Howard, was born on July 8, 1898. In 1908-9-10 he won 10 class prizes at Sturt-street State school, and in 1910 was dux of Sturt-street school. In 1911 he passed the primary examination from the Adelaide High School, and in 1912 won a junior entrance subclarship at Prince Akred College. He passed the junior examination in 1912, and the senior examination in the following year, while in 1914 he passed the higher public examnation, and was awarded the Colton Scholarship for languages. In 1915, in the examination for senior cadet officers, he took first place. In the higher public ex-amination be was twentieth on honors list, with second credit for English literalist, with second credit for English litera-ture; and at Prince Alfred College he won the school recitation prize, the Scripture prize, and the headmaster's house prize. In 1916, in the higher public examination, he took third place, with first credit in English literature, the Tennyson Medal, first credit in modern history, a Govern-ment bursary, and the Old Collegians Scholarship. He was dux of school, and won the headmaster's prize for captain of won the headmaster's prize for captain of Prince Alfred College. In 1917 be entered No. 2 School Military Aeronautics at Orford, and passed the ground course for pilots with honors. Athlet's Sports.—He took part in the intercollegists sports in five successive years, and won the junior high jump in 1912 and 1913, the under 16 hurdles in 1914, the senior high jump, the mile, and second in the long jump in 1915, and in 1916, as captain of the P.A.C. team, he won the mile, and was second in the high jump, steeplechase, and hurdles. In the P.A.C. sports he won the College Cup, with record time for the helf-mile. In football he was vice-captain of the college team, and won the Counter Medal for most consistent play during the season. In 1818 he was captain of the 4th Squadron A.F.C. tram. In cricket he was vice-cap-tain, and won the Governor's but for bowling and the Old Collegian Fielding Trophy in 1916.

In temms he was interrollegiate representative, and in abooting in 1916 he was top of 78B Senior Cade:s and won the marksmanship badge efition to being esptain of football and ericket teams at college, he was serretary of the Christian Upson and School Chron-icle Commisce, and sergeans in corests. In 1916 he was captain of the school, head or house, captain of the athletic sports team, vice-captain of the football team, vice-captain of tennia, vice-captain cricket, general sports, committee secretary, president of the Christian Union, manager of Chronicle, lieutenant of cadets, and on the literary society com-mittee. In 1917 he went on active service, and was depo; wireless translator, Wendover, England In 1918 he obtained a commission in the Australian Flying Corpe, was patrol leader on active service, president of the 4th Squadron mess committee, captain of the 4th Squadron foothall team, and billeting officer for equad-ron. In 1919 he was appointed official interpreter of German to the Colorne representatives of the Armstice Commission. He was president of the squadron mess committee, messing officer for the 2nd Wing, Royal Air Force, squadrom sports committee, and sports officer for men on transport returning to Australia.

Life in the United Kingdom

Stanford was given a farewell lunch by the PAC Old Collegiate Association and in late May 1920 he departed Adelaide on the Melbourne Express en route to England. According to shipping records, he departed from Sydney, Australia on 3 June 1920 aboard the ss Makura arriving in the port of Vancouver, BC, Canada on 29 June 1920, then in Washington State, USA on 3 July 1920 where he arrived by C.P.R train, he was headed for London, England. Stanford studied at Christ Church, Oxford

During his time at Oxford, Stanford visited Munich on vacation and encountered a German officer who had been injured during Stanford's single-handed raid on the Armentieres railway station. Stanford graduated, Bachelor of Arts, in October 1922, in the same ceremony his brother Arthur was awarded his Master of Arts. Rev Henry Howard was in Oxford to witness the ceremony.

Stanford Howard, a South Rhodes scholar, as an airman made an attack on the Armentieres railway station in July, 1918, but after bombing and machine-gunning the depot was wounded, and so was unable to ascertain the damage he had done. Recently, on vacation, he went to Munich, and in the train met a German officer, who, in chatting about the war, told Howard how he was wounded by an airman who, singlebanled, raided the Armentieres station, destroyed two troop trains, and blew up scores of soldiers. The Fritz himself was so badly hurt that he was out of action for the rest of the war. On comparing dates, etc., Howard found it was bis attack. The German saw that the Australian received every attention, and introduced him all round as a friend of mine.



On completion of his Arts Degree, Stanford commenced studying for his medical degree in England and was listed in the 1923 Medical and Dental Students Register. He was visited by his father and sister in August 1923. In September 1923, Stanford became engaged to Miss Thelma Lee, daughter of Dr. & Mrs Robert Lee of Harley Street, formerly of Melbourne.

Stanford was awarded his BM BCH (Medicinae Baccalaureus, Baccalaureus Chirurgiae, the equivalent of the Australian MB SC) from Oxford in 1925.

Stanford and Thelma were married in the Hinde Street Wesleyan Church, Manchester Square on 24 March 1926. The ceremony was conducted by Stanford's brother, Rev Arthur Howard. The parish record of his marriage is below.

In 1928 Stanford became a MRCS (Membership of the Royal Colleges of Surgeons, postgraduate diploma for surgeons) and a LRCP (Licentiate of the Royal College of Physicians), followed by a FRCS (Fellowship of the Royal Colleges of Surgeons, a professional qualification to practise as a senior surgeon) in 1929.

By 1931 Stanford had a medical practice in London and his father had moved to New York, where he was minister at the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church. In October 1932 Stanford and Thelma travelled to New York departed from Southampton, England, on 8 October 1932 aboard the Berengaria and arriving in New York on 14 October 1932. While in New York the couple attended the wedding of Stanford's sister, Winifred. Winifred's father, Rev Henry Howard, officiated and Stanford Howard gave the bride away. Stanford and Thelma returned to Liverpool, England on 20 November 1932, having departed from New York, aboard the Scythia.

In 1927, 1928, and 1929 Stanford was listed in the London Telephone Book as "Howard Dr. Stanford, 77 Clifton Ct N.W.8"; and in 1930, as "Howard Stanford, F.R.C.S., Denby, Gordon Av". From 1931-1934 Stanford had Professional Rooms listed as "Howard Stanford, F.R.C.S., 43 Queen Anne St W1". During the period 1931-1946, Stanford and Thelma were living at Denby, Gordon Av, Stanmore".

On the 28th June 1933, the Rev Henry Howard arrived in London with his daughter, Winifred, two days later he died at a London nursing home aged 74 years. His funeral was held at Stanmore, the home of his son Stanford Howard.

In 1935 Stanford was described as an ardent cricket enthusiast. He was attached to the London Hospital and honorary surgeon to the Battersea General Hospital. Stanford had devised a new transfusion needle and was known for his writing on empyema (usually caused by an infection which spreads from the lungs).

Before passing on to the physicists again, I must refer to three other Adelaide medical men who have done good work in England. Stanford Howard is attached to the London Hospital, and is honorary surgeon to the Battersea General Hospital. He has devised a new transfusion needle, and has written on empyema. His unfailing cheerful disposition and pleasant manner have made him a particular favorite at the London Hospital.

The Medical Directory 1935 described Stanford as follows "HOWARD, Stanford",


From 1936-1938, Stanford's professional Offices were listed in the Telephone Books as "Howard Stanford, F.R.C.S., 8 Harley St W1, Langham" and from 1938-1959 he was at 49 Wimpole St W1. In 1942 Stanford was one of the chief medical executives in London and a distinguished surgeon. In 1946 Stanford successfully operated on fellow South Australian Jim Edwards, using a comparitavely new technique in appendix operations.

PATIENT, LONDON. Saturday .in surgeon and patient 211 appendicitis operation here this week were Adelaide men who have made good abroad. The ratient was Mr Jim Edwards, formerly works manager at "The News" and "The Mail," Adelaide, and now a big engineering executive here. He had the operation four day go. Today he said: They wi have to strap me down tonight." He was sitting up and taking nourishment "in a big way" the second night after the operation, and was out of bed on the fourth day. The miracle worker was a Prince Alfred College boy and Rhodes Scholar, Dr. Stanford Howard, who is recognised here as one of the world's leading surgeons. He works on a comparatively new technique in appendicitis cases—a technique in which the nitial incision is very tiny and the effects of the operation clear up in an amazingly short time. Dr. Howard has an ext Harley Street practice.

In 1942, Stanford had an article published in the Post-Graduate Medical Journal entitled "Rare Appearance of Clonorchis Sinensis in England" (Chinese Liver Fluke - a parasite) . He also had many articles published in the Lancet.

1947 edition of Who's Who In Australia summarised Stanford's achievements and interests as follows:



In 1948 Stanford's was organising the PAC Old Collegiate Association Dinner at the Savoy, London for the nominal last day of the fifth cricket test. Stanford organised the annual dinner from 1946 to at least 1953.

In 1949 and 1950, there are telephone listings for "Howard Stanford, F.R.C.S., Dalbrack Gordon av Stanmore, Grimsdyk 380".

Between 1951 and 1969, the Telephone Books listing is "Howard Stanford, FRCS, Conslt Surg, Stoneclough, Scott Park, Burnley 23338" (Lancashire). In 1961 to 1967 period Stanford's also had Professional Rooms listed in the Telephone Books as "Howard Stanford, FRCS, 148 Harley St W1, Welback 1207".

Death

Stanford died in early 1969, aged 70. The registration district for his death was Burnley, Lancashire. He left his wife, Thelma and a son and a daughter.

Details

Born on 8 July 1898 at Ballarat, Victoria, Australia. Educated at the Prince Alfred College, Adelaide, and at Adelaide University. The first world war interrupted his studies, and he joined the Royal Flying Corps and flew in France as a pilot on operations. When he was demobilized he returned to Australia and to Adelaide University. He was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship and went up to Christ Church, Oxford. At Oxford he gained an honours degree in physiology and proceed to the London Hospital where he qualified BM BCh in 1925. He took the Conjoint Diploma in 1928 and the Final Fellowship in 1929. He held various resident appointments at the London Hospital and became surgical first assistant and registrar to Russell Howard and Neligan. During the second world war he worked at the Orsett Hospital in Essex. He was appointed to the Poplar and other hospitals in the London area, but at the inception of the National Health Service some of these hospitals were reorganized, and in 1950 he was appointed consultant surgeon to the Burnley and District group of hospitals.

He was a sound and dextrous surgeon, an able diagnostician, and in his later years was particularly interested in thyroid surgery. He was interested in sports and was a good golfer. After retiring from his hospital at the age of 65 he joined a practice at Nelson and had a few years in busy general practice in which he very soon made his mark.
