Background

Coinciding with the Centenary of Anzacs our incentive behind the series of biographical publications is the Adelaide University Football and Cricket Club's desire to honour our players who served in the Great War (1914 - 1918). These brave men put on hold their academic, professional and sporting careers for King and Country in the name of peace and freedom. On Anzac Day 2015, the Centenary of the Gallipoli landing, a memorial plaque was unveiled on the Adelaide University Oval Pavilion and this was followed by the erection of a picket fence between the pavilion and the scoreboard with each picket bearing a plaque with the name of an AUFC/AUCC player who served.

Biography - Sir Robert Ross McDonald

Sir Robert Ross McDonald (1888-1964), lawyer and politician, was born on 25 January 1888 at Albany, Western Australia, son of Angus McDonald, bank manager, and his wife Mary Jane, née Elder. Ross was educated at Fremantle School, Scotch College, Perth, and the University of Adelaide (LL.B., 1913). After passing Barristers' Board examinations, he was admitted to the Western Australian Bar on 15 March 1910 and in 1912 formed a partnership with L. W. Lohrman. On 15 February 1916 McDonald was commissioned in the Australian Imperial Force. He served with the 4th Division Artillery on the Western Front in 1918 and his appointment terminated on 2 November 1919.

Back in Perth, McDonald joined Robinson, Cox, Jackson & Wheatley and became a partner in 1921. His reputation in commercial law was recognized by his appointment in 1923 to the royal commission inquiring into the Kendenup land schemes of C. J. De Garis. A founding member (1928) of the Law Society of Western Australia, he lectured part time at the university in 1928-31. He took silk on 10 February 1936.

One of Perth's most eligible bachelors, McDonald chose not to marry. He was honorary aide-de-camp (1925-31) to the governor Sir William Campion, a foundation member of Perth Rotary Club (president 1929-30), and president (for twenty years) of the local branch of the Victoria League. Elected to the Legislative Assembly as the Nationalist member for West Perth on 8 April 1933, he became party leader and deputy-leader of the Opposition in April 1938. McDonald was a polite and constructive antagonist to moderate Labor governments. In 1945 he oversaw the incorporation of the Western Australian Nationalists into the Liberal Party. Believing that the new party required rural leadership, he offered to stand down as leader early in 1946 but was persuaded to remain until replaced by (Sir) Ross McLarty in December.

On 1 April 1947 the Liberal-Country Party coalition took office. McLarty appointed McDonald attorney-general, minister for police and minister for native affairs; in January 1948 he exchanged the two former portfolios for housing and forests. As attorney-general, he opposed what many Western Australians saw as the encroachments of the Federal Labor government. In his other ministries he was a force for reform, showing a lively concern for the living standards of timber workers, and infusing fresh vigour into Aboriginal policy with the appointment of the Papua-trained S. G. Middleton as commissioner for native affairs. Resigning from cabinet in October 1949, and from parliament in March 1950, he was knighted in the following June.

Well liked and respected, but marked by a gentlemanly reticence, McDonald was a trustee (1950-58) of the Public Library, Museum and Art Gallery of Western Australia, a member (1950-61) of the senate of the University of Western Australia, and chairman (1954-56) of St Catherine's, the first women's college at the university. He was also a director of numerous companies, chairman (1956-60) of the Royal Perth Hospital board and a foundation member of the State branch of the National Trust of Australia. Sir Ross died on 25 March 1964 in Perth and was buried in Karrakatta cemetery with Presbyterian forms. His estate was sworn for probate at £48,773.




Robert Ross McDonald's life and WWI service are well documented in the biographies above and the Who's Who in Australia (1938) and Scotch College Obituary below.



Schooling

Ross McDonald completed his secondary education at Scotch College, Perth. He passed his Junior Public Examinations in 1902 (6 subjects / 1 Credit/equal 16th in the Special Honour List) and his Senior Public Examination in 1903 (7 subjects / 1 Credit/ 11th in the Special Honour List). Perth secondary school student's examinations were conducted by the University of Adelaide, so Honour Lists included students from both Western Australia and South Australia.

Photograph of Ross McDonald published in the Scotch College, Perth, Recorder in 1912.





Following completion of his secondary education, Ross wanted to be a lawyer. In Western Australia, the only way at that time in which lawyers could qualify for admission to practice was by undergoing a period of practical training and service of 5 years in articles with a practising lawyer. In 1910, at 22 years of age, Ross had completed the necessary practical experience with a law firm and was finally admitted to the Western Australian Bar. He further desired to complete study towards a law degree (LLB), however the University of Western Australia (founded in 1911) did not have a Law School until 1927. Like many other legal practitioners from W.A. had done before him, Ross enrolled at the University of Adelaide to complete. While some reports suggest that Ross completed the bulk of his studies remotely from Perth, WA, however he came across to Adelaide on some occasions.

In 1912, Ross was a prominent member of the Young Liberals' Society and was becoming known in W.A. political circles.



Ross completed his Law Degree from 1911 to 1913 and at the Annual Commemoration ceremony for admission to the Law Degree it was noted that he achieved this without the advantage of attending lectures.



University Sport

In 1911 on one of his visits to Adelaide, he represented Adelaide University in the Intervarsity Football Match against Melbourne University in Melbourne.




World War I

Ross enlisted on the 15th of February 1916 in the 119 Howitzer Brigade and was described as 5' 8¾", 115 lbs, with a medium complexion, grey eyes and black hair. In September 1916 he became a 2nd Lieutenant and his unit embarked from Melbourne, Victoria, on board HMAT A60 *Aeneas* on 3 October 1916. Ross was promoted to Lieutenant on the 1st of August 1917. On 18th January 1918 he proceeded to France. He returned to Australia on the 'Orsova' on 18 July 1919.



Australia for appointments outside the public service to be recommended by the

Citief Justice and for those making the service to be recommended by the Crown. Mr. Collier expressed gratification in being associated with the appointments.
"Mr. McDonald is one of nature's gentle-men," he said, "and Mr. Wolff as a Crown men," he said, "and Mr. Wolff as a Crown
officer has displayed a quality of intellect
which should carry him far in his profession. I feel sure that both appointees
will eminerity adorn the high office to
which they have been called."

Mr. Robert Boss McDonald was born at Albany and was educated at Scotch College. He studied law at the Univer-sity of Adelaids, where he obtained the LLB. degree, and was admitted to the West Australian Bur in 1910. During the way he spilleded as a private and 1910. During a private and the war he enlisted as served with the Field Artillery in Prance and Reighm. On his return to Perth in and Reighm. On his return to Perth in 1919 he became a puriner in the legal firm of Robinson, Cox and Wheatley. In 1923 Mr. McDonald was appointed by the Mitchell Government as a Royal Com-sulusioner to investigate the affairs of the Kandenup Fruit Packing Co., Ltd., and the De Garis (W.A.) Development Co., Ltd., and subsequently was largely instru-mental in the rehabilitation of that settlement.

Mr. McDonald was for several years a manning of the council of the Law Society, and was one of the first lectures in the Law School of the University of Western

Australia. He is a member of the Board of Governors of Scotch College, a mem-ber and past president of the Parth Rotary Club and was for several years vice-chalman of the finance committee of the Boy Scouts' Association. After the war Mr. McDonald was interested in Citizen Porce training and for years commanded the 8th battery of the Field Artillery with the rank of captain.

In April, 1983, he was selected to repre-aent West Perth in the Legislative As-sembly in succession to the late Mr. T. A. L. Davy, K.C. He was re-slected for the same sest in Pebruary last and since 1933 has been deputy-leader of the Parlia-mentary Entional Party.



PERSONALITIES

The Minister for Housing, Forests and Native Affairs (Mr. Rosa McDonaid) was 60 years of age last Sunday. He was born at Albany on January 25, 1888, and was educated at Scotch

College. Studying law at the University of Adelaide he obtained the LL.B. degree, and was admitted to the West Australian Bar in 1910. He was appointed King's Counsel in 1936.

Finlisting as a private with the A.I.F. in World War I, he served in France and Belgium as an artillery lieutenant. After the war he was for 10 years a member of the A.M.F., during which he commanded

the Eighth Battery Field Artillery.


In 1933 Mr. McDonnid entered the Legislative Assembly as member for West Perth and has retained the seat since. From 1937 to 1946 he was Parliamentary leader of the National Party (which subsequently became the Liberal Party). When the McLarty-Watta Government in office on April 1, 1947, he became Atterney General, Minister for Police and Native Affairs. Early this month when portfolios were re-allocated he retinquished those of Attorney-General and Police accepting in their stead Housing and Forests.

Last June he toured the North West as far as Wyndham by air, making general inquiries on behalf of the Government. In August he attended a huilding materials conference in Canberra, and also assisted the Pramier (Mr. McLarty) at the Premiers Conference and the Loan Council.

As Attorney-General by carried out a heavy task during the last session of Parliament when 104 Bids (a record number) were introduced.

He is a member, and an ex-president, of the Penh Rotary Club.

Their appointment and the terms of reference are expected to be announced after the next meeting of the Executive Council.

The intention of the Government to appoint the Royal Commission was announced last week.

The Minister for Education (Mr. Watts) then said that the Government desired to obtain a thoroughly informed report on preschool education and the operations of the Kindergarten Union.

The desire of the Government primarily was to see some extension of preschol education within the reasonable future, within the ability of the State.

Death

Sir Ross died on 25 March 1964 in Perth and was buried in Karrakatta cemetery. The following Obituary appeared Scotch College (Perth) Recorder (1964):

SIR ROSS McDONALD

Western Australia joined with Scotch College to mourn the passing of one of the School's most illustrious Old Boys on March 25: Sir Ross McDonald was a man of exceptional qualities.

Born in Albany on January 25, 1888, Sir Ross came to Scotch before the turn of the century, two years after the School's foundation and at a time when the College assembled in the Shearer Memorial Hall in Beaufort Street, Perth. He distinguished himself early in his College career, winning prizes for English Literature and Latin.

He left Scotch at the end of 1904 to study Law at the University of Adelaide. He was a foundation member of the Old Scotch Collegians' Association, and those few Old Boys who have survived him still remember him as an outstanding speaker at the first annual Old Boy's Dinner of 1908.

He was admitted to the W.A. Bar in 1910 and later became one of the first lecturers at the Law School of the University of W.A. At the outbreak of World War I, he enlisted as a private in the Field Artillary and rose to the rank of Lieutenant, serving in France and Belgium. Even after the war, when he returned to Perth and became a partner in a Perth legal firm, he maintained his interest in military affairs and, as a member of the A.M.F., commanded the Eighth Field Artillary.

From 1925 to 1931, he was honorary A.D.C. to the Governor, Sir James Mitchell. He was appointed King's Counsel in 1936 and the following year he became Parliamentary Leader of the National Party (later, the Liberal Party), a position which he held until 1946. As Native Welfare Minister in 1948, he was largely responsible for the

initiation of the movement for improved conditions for aborigines. His work as a Housing Minister concerned with the problems of post-war reconstruction was also outstanding, and during his term as Attorney-General he was responsible for the introduction of a far-reaching Bill concerning the distribution of Legislative Assembly seats.

He served on the College Council and became an honorary life member. He was also a past-president of the Perth Rotary Club. In 1950, a knighthood was conferred on him in recognition of his services to W.A.

Upon his death, 'The West Australian' said: "Sir Ross McDonald brought to public life a cultivated mind, a detachment allied to high principles and a natural courtesy that gave him a special and influential place in the State's affairs."

His enormous energy, his sympathy and his dedication to the ideal of service will remain as an example to his fellow Scotch Collegians,
