# **Background**

Coinciding with the Centenary of Anzacs our incentive behind the series of biographical publications is the Adelaide University Football and Cricket Club's desire to honour our players who served in the Great War (1914 - 1918). These brave men put on hold their academic, professional and sporting careers for King and Country in the name of peace and freedom. The AUFC/AUCC WW1 Memorial Committee is endeavouring to identify every one of our players who served and prepare life stories on all. This is to ensure their sacrifices and further contributions to society will be recognised by future generations.

On Anzac Day 2015, the Centenary of the Gallipoli landing, a memorial plaque was unveiled on the Adelaide University Oval Pavilion and this was followed by the erection of a picket fence between the pavilion and the scoreboard with each picket bearing a plaque with the name of an AUFC/AUCC player who served.

#### **Biography**

#### **Early Life**

Charles Vincent Rice North was born in Rockhampton, Queensland in 1897, the son of James Frank North and Bridget Rice (Qld Birth Registration C10147). Charles was one of four children; his siblings were Clair Frank Rice North (born 1985), Cecil Joseph Rice North (born 1899) and Clara.

James F North moved the family from Queensland to South Australia and became licensee of the Metropolitan Hotel, Grote Street in June 1899 and was later the licensee of the Crown and Sceptre Hotel in King William Street.

#### **Schooling**


Charles attended Christian Brothers College, Adelaide and passed his Junior Examinations in December 1911 and has Senior Examinations in December 1913.

Charles played football and cricket for CBC in both 1911-1913 and competed in the CBS Sports.

#### FOOTBALL.

Christian Brothers' College Matches.

C.B.C. 1st eighteen played the Police F.C. on the East Parklands on Thursday, May 15. The police nave got together a formidable eighteen, some of them being League or ex-League players. In their ranks was noticed Bob Cottin, the champion runner. The Police skipper, Pendler, won the toss, and immediately Mr. B. Coleman bounced the sphere. The "Defenders of the Peace" scored the first minor. The game was a very fast and hard one throughout. The College boys excelled in combination and speed. Bower at centre was particularly good, and outstripped all comers. O'Leary following was a powerful factor to C.B.C., also J. McCormack. B. Fitzgerald on the wing played a good game; it was a treat to see him get the ball, because he always did the proper thing with it. Baaner kicked very well, scoring five goals. Chas. North was a shining light either roving or forward. His kicking was superb. Final scores: C.B.C., 6 goals 14 behinds; Police, 3 goals 4 behinds. Goal-kickers, C.B.C., Baaner 5, McCarthy 1.







#### **Adelaide University**

Charles commenced studying law at Adelaide University in 1914 and passed examinations in 1914 and 1915. In January 1916 Charles enlisted and served in WWI, he recommenced University studies in 1918 having been discharged as medically unfit after overseas service. Charles gained his LLB in 1918.

#### **University Sport**

#### Football

Charles played football for Adelaide University A Grade football team in 1915.

#### Cricket

Charles played cricket for Adelaide University in the 1915/16 season.

#### World War I

Charles enlisted as a Private in the 11th Field Ambulance on the 24<sup>th</sup> of January 1916 (SN 12652). He was an articled clerk, 18 years and 3 months old, 5'9¾", 148 lbs, with a fresh complexion, blue eyes and brown hair. His mother, Bridget was named as his next of kin on one of his attestation papers and his father James Frank on another copy of the papers; both were of Watson Street, Rose Park. Charles had been a Cadet in the 78<sup>th</sup> Area for four years and in the Citizens Forces for 6 months. He was entrained on the 28<sup>th</sup> of June 1916 and embarked onboard the *HMAT Berrimg* from Melbourne.

Charles was taken on strength on the 28<sup>th</sup> of August 1916 and preceded to France via Southampton on the 26<sup>th</sup> of November 1916. On the 19<sup>th</sup> of April 1917 Charles was admitted to the Grove Military Hospital suffering from Adenitis neck. An operation was performed on Charles' neck and after the wounds healed Charles was considered medically unfit for service. He returned to Australia on the 25<sup>th</sup> of August 1917 and was discharged on 30<sup>th</sup> November 1917.

The following was published in the C.B.C. Annual (1914-16), 'Personal Pars'

Private Charlie North when last heard of was in Salisbury Plains. Writing to Mr. J. O'Hare he said that there had been quite a reunion of old C.B.C. boys at the Lark Hill Camp on the night of September 6th. Amongst those present were Sergeant Neville Heenan, Quarter raster-Sergeant Jim Dowling and Garnet O'Connell. In Charlie's company there are about a dozen old C.B.C. boys. He met another old College mate in the person of J. Goodfellow, who is attached to the Army Service.

Charles' diary, documenting the sea voyage from Melbourne on the transport ship *SS Berrima*, dated the 4<sup>th</sup> of July 27 August 1916 and his discharge certificate, dated 30<sup>th</sup> of November 1917 are held at the Australian War Memorial.

Both Charles' brothers served in WWI. Elder brother Clair Frank Rice North (SN 35214) was a Gunner in the Field Artillery. Younger brother, Cecil Joseph Rice North (SN 7530) enlisted in the 26<sup>th</sup> reinforcement of the 10<sup>th</sup> Battalion and was tragically killed in action on the 4<sup>th</sup> of June 1918 (aged 19) and is buried in the Borre British Cemetery, France.

#### **Career & Family Life**

Charles was admitted to the bar in April 1919, he was referred to as C.V. Rice North for all legal related matters.

Mr. C. V. Rice North was among the many young men who were admitted to the Bar last week as barristers, solicitors, attorneys, and proctors. Educated at Christian Brothers, his career at the University has been very creditable. He has also been connected with the Law Debating Society, and during 1918 was a member of the com-A clear, forceful, and at times mittee. eloquent, speaker, there is every pro-bability of a successful career before him in his profession. He has served his articles with Mr. A. J. McLachlan, and has made use of the many opportunities of getting a good practical training in the legal work . A member of the A.I.F., he has been on active service for some time, but returned at the end of 1917, and completed his course at the University last year.

Charles was actively involved in the CBC Old Collegians Association and was a Vice president from 1919.

CHRISTIAN BROTHERS' OLD COLLEGIANS ASSOCIATION.

The annual meeting of the Christian Brothers Old Collegians' Association was held at the college, Wakefield street, Adelaide, on Monday evening. The President (Capt. S. A. White) occupied the chair. There was a large attendance of members. The report, which was adopted stated that during the ensuing year the golden jubilee of the Christian Brothers would be celebrated, and that an appeal was being made throughout Amstralia for funds to clear off the debt of £15,000 on the Novitiate and Training College at Strathfield. Officers elected:—President, Col. J. C. F. Slane, D.S.O., V.D.; Vice-Presidents, Messre. A. von der Borch, D. F. Brazel, P. E. O'Leary, and C. V. R. North; Secretary, Mr. J. J. Sullivan; Treasurer, Mr. H. P. O'Brien; Committee, Messre. J. O'Loughlin, R. Kelly, T. Gason, J. J. O'Neill, F. Doherty, C. McHugh, F. Smith, J. Power, and F. Molloy.

From September 1919 to 1924, Charles practiced at Yorketown on Southern Yorke Peninsula. In December 1919 he purchased a 22.5 Ford. While at Yorketown Charles played cricket for the local team. He was a member of the Yorketown Branch of the Liberal Union, President of the S.Y.P. Jockey Club (1920) and involved in the RSL. Charles was involved in fundraising to ensure the deficit relating to the Yorketown Soldiers' Memorial Oval was cleared. Charles was also appointed to the Yorketown Repatriation Committee.


On the 12<sup>th</sup> of May 1920, Charles married Margaret Mary (Rita) Breheny (SA Marriage Registration 283/698).

NORTH-BREHENY.—On the 12th May, at St. Lawrence's Church, North Adeleide, by the Rev. Pather M. Doyle, O.P., Charles Vincent Rice, second a.m of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. North, Watsom avenue, Rose Park, to Margabet Mary (Rita), Breheny, second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ja.J. Breheny, Banabool, North Adelaide.

On the 31<sup>st</sup> of March 1921, Charles and Rita's son Charles Leo (Charles Leo Rice) North was born followed by their daughter Rita Bridget Rice (Biddy) North on the 16<sup>th</sup> of August 1923.

From January 1922 until June 1923 Charles was in partnership with William Raymond Kelly at Yorketown.





Charles and his family returned to Adelaide and Charles practised at Kither's Building, King William Street.

In April 1926 the right to nominate a scholar to be entitled to the Old Collegians' Scholarship was secured by Mr. C. V. R. North.

Charles' father died in 1926 aged 66 years.

Charles maintained a connection with Yorketown and sometimes visited to attend the Yorketown Races. In March 1927 he acted as a Judge at the S.Y.P Racing Club meeting.

#### Death

Tragically Charles died on the 20<sup>th</sup> of May 1928 aged 30 years; he was buried at the West Terrace Cemetery Catholic Section. He left his widow and two children. His estate was valued at £1,304.

NORTH.—On May 20, at 55 Boston avenue. Rose Park, Charles Vincent Rice, dearly beloved husband of Margaret Mary North and second son of Mrs. B. and the late Mr. J. F. North. Aged 30 years. Requiescat in pace.

Mr. C. V. R. North, whose death occurred on Sunday after a fortnight's illness, was a native of Queensland, but was brought to this State while he was a small child. He was educated at the Caristian Brothers' College and the Adelaide University. He joined the 11th Field Ambulance and went to the war in June, 1915, and returned wounded late in 1917. He was admitted to the bar in April, 1919, and began practice at Yorketown the same year. In 1921 he entered into partnership with Mr. R. W. Kelly, now S.M., at Yorketown. The following year he came to Adelaide and took up the practice of his profession. He had a wide circle of friends, and at the time of his death was a vice-president of the Christian-Brothers' Old Collegians' Association, Mr. North, who was 31 years of age leaves a widow and two children—a boy aged eight years and a girl aged five.

#### Legacy

Charles and Rita's son Charles Leo Rice North attended CBC and completed his Leaving Examinations in 1937. He then commenced studying for the priesthood. Charles passed away in Fitzroy, Victoria in 1960, aged 39.

Charles North, son of Mrs. C. V. R. North, of 55 Watson Avenue, Rose Park, entered the Novitiate of the Christian Brothers at Strathfield in December. L. Murphy, of Semaphore, will shortly join him. D. O'Donoghue, of Thebarton, and a former pupil of C.B.C., Wakefield Street, has also gone

to Strathfield.

Charles and Rita's daughter Biddy attended Loreto College and Adelaide University. Biddy gained her LLB in 1945. She was actively involved in Aquinas College fundraising events.


Biddy and her mother went on pilgrimage in 1948 (they were living at 11 Barton Terrace, North Adelaide).

After Rome the party will go to Florence (staying two nights), Nice (two nights), Lourdes (five nights), Lisbon (five nights, including a two-day stay at Fatima, the Portuguese Lourdes), and London (10 days). The pilgrimage concludes in London on July 29.

After that private groups have booked with Thomas Cook & Son, who organised the pilgrimage in conjunction with the Pontifical Mission Aid Society, to visit Oberammergau, in Bavaria, for the famous Passion Play, which is presented from May to September every 10 years.

Biddy became engaged to Brian Moroney in December 1951.

In February 1953 Mrs M.M. North and her daughter Biddy moved from Glenelg to Mills Terrace, North Adelaide.
