Background

Coinciding with the Centenary of Anzacs our incentive behind the series of biographical publications is the Adelaide University Football and Cricket Club's desire to honour our players who served in the Great War (1914 - 1918). These brave men put on hold their academic, professional and sporting careers for King and Country in the name of peace and freedom. The AUFC/AUCC WW1 Memorial Committee is endeavouring to identify every one of our players who served and prepare life stories on all. This is to ensure their sacrifices and further contributions to society will be recognised by future generations.

On Anzac Day 2015, the Centenary of the Gallipoli landing, a memorial plaque was unveiled on the Adelaide University Oval Pavilion and this was followed by the erection of a picket fence between the pavilion and the scoreboard with each picket bearing a plaque with the name of an AUFC/AUCC player who served.

Blood Sweat and Fears: Medical Practitioners and Medical Students of South Australian who Served in World War 1, C Verco, A Summers, T Swain & M Jelly. July 1924



Harry Carew Nott was born on the 1st August 1888 at Walkerville SA, the only child of Albert Edward Nott, the manager of the South Australian Brewing Company, and Harriett Augusta, nee Taylor. He was educated at St Peter's College where he was a senior lieutenant in the cadets. He studied medicine at the University of Adelaide, excelling in cricket, tennis and lacrosse and graduating in 1913.

Nott enlisted in the AIF on 4th August 1914, the day that war was declared. He was described as 26 years of age, single, and 5ft 10ins tall and weighed 158lbs. He had normal vision and was commissioned as captain in August 1914, and posted as RMO of 10 Bn at Morphetville South Australia. His father was named as his next of kin and they lived at St. Georges, Lower Mitcham SA. Nott left for Egypt on the Ascanius on 2nd November 1914 which was the first troop ship to leave from Adelaide for the war. Nott later landed at Gallipoli on 25th April 1915. Nott lost touch with his Bn on the beach through stopping to dress the wounded. He recalled, "All my knowledge of medical arrangements came out of the RAMC Training Manual. This looked easy enough on paper, but I soon found out in the landing that in practice it wasn't so simple'. The Bn moved up to Victoria Gully in May then White Gully, close to Capt Goldsmith's 12 Bn RAP. Here they withstood the fierce Turkish attack of 19th May. This was followed on 24th May by an armistice to collect the dead and wounded. 'It was a gruesome sight, as the bodies were all blown up and swarming with maggots; and the stench was horrible. We moved the bodies by rolling them on stretchers with the aid of shovels'. By June dysentery had taken hold of the Australians and Harry Nott was involved in the reserve sanitary squad. Sanitary conditions were very poor and dysentery was a major problem; about 45% were affected in varying degrees, and they were being admitted to hospital at the rate of 10 per day. Nott was re-infected, and transferred to 1 ASH Lemnos then Alexandria then back to Australia for three months. Whilst back in Australia he married Marjorie Lowe

on the 22nd February 1916 before being sent to England. He was attached to 3 Trg Bn, and promoted major in November. He was posted to 2 FdAmb in January 1917, He remained with the FdAmb until July 1918, During the summer he was attached to 10 Bn and to 1 ACCS then to 2 FdAmb,. In July 1918 he was promoted temporary lieutenant colonel and posted to 1 AGH at Rouen. Nott was then posted SMO of the Australian Base at Le Havre. He remained there until June 1919. Nott applied for discharge in England to further his studies in radiology at Kings College Hospital in London. He returned to Australia in 1920 and appointment in the AIF was terminated on 18th December 1920. He remained in the CMF until 1925. He was issued with the 1914-15 Star, the British War Medal and the Victory Medal.

He was an early full time radiologist in Adelaide and conducted a private practice from his home in Hutt St, (now the Naval, Military and Air Force Club) and in 1921 he was appointed as Honorary Radiologist at the Adelaide Hospital and later at the Repatriation Hospital. He was Radiologist with 2/2 AGH in WW2. In 1941 he was also appointed consultant radiologist to the AIF. Nott was discharged in January 1946. He was a more than competent golfer, won trophies at the Royal Adelaide Golf Club and on one occasion qualified and played in the British Open. He married twice and lived in Palm Beach, NSW with his second wife and, about 1969, returned to Adelaide. Harry Carew Nott died on the 3rd January 1973. He was survived by his second wife, two daughters from the first marriage and a son from the second.

Early Life

Harry Carew Nott was born on the 1st of August 1888, the son of Albert Edward Nott and Harriet Augusta Taylor. Albert Nott was for many years the manager of the SA Brewing Co.

Schooling

Harry attended St Peter's College, Adelaide from 1901 – 1907. He passed his Primary Examinations in 1903, Senior Examinations in 1905 and Higher Examinations in 1906 and 1907. While at St Peter's, Harry was in the Commonwealth Cadet Corps.



Harry Nott played Cricket for St Peter's College in the SACA B Grade Competition in both the 1906/07 and 1907/08 seasons.




Cricket

Harry played cricket for the University from the 1908/09 season through to the 1911/12 season. His first season was in the A Grade which had just been admitted to the SACA District Competition. He had batting statistics of 6 innings, one not out, for a total of 42 runs, a high score of 18 and an average of 8.4. Harry played his remaining seasons for the Blacks in the B Grade. In a letter from the front in 1917, written by a fellow Adelaide University Cricketer, Harry was described as the 'joker' in the side.

Tennis

Harry participated in many of the SA Lawn Tennis and East Torrens Winter Tennis Tournaments. He first represented the University at Tennis in the 1911 Intervarsity Tennis competition.






Back Row: H.C.Nott, M.Giles, Inset G.P.Goode.

Lacrosse

Harry played A Grade Lacrosse for the University from 1909 to 1912. In 1909, he represented the SA Association in an interstate match versus Tasmania. In 1910 and 1911, Harry was the Secretary of the University Lacrosse Club. He played in the premiership match which University lost in 1911. Harry represented the University in Intervarsity Lacrosse in 1911 and 1912 (Adelaide won on both occasions). Harry was awarded a Blue for Lacrosse in 1911 making him a Double Blue.

Early Career


Harry became a registered Medical Practitioner in December 1913 and was appointed a House Surgeon at the Adelaide Hospital. He continued to play tennis and golf and was involved in the Adelaide social scene.

World War I

Harry enlisted on the 4th of August 1914, notably on the day the War was declared. His WWI war service is well documented in the 'Blood, Sweat and Tears' biography above. Notably, Harry landed with the covering party at ANZAC Cove on the 25th of April 1915.

Extracts from the Gallipoli Landing by Harry Carew Nott

...On Thursday morning (29-4-15) we marched down to the beach and round to the right, and bivouacked in a small gully just off the beach on our right flank (subsequently know as Shell Green)... Most of us went for a swim but the Turks began shelling the beach, and stopped our ablutions. 15-5-15 moved our HQ into white Gully and the regimental pioneers dug some good dugouts, and covered them with timber...24-5-15 armistice arranged from 7.30 am to 4pm to bury the dead between the trenches...It was a gruesome sight as the bodies were all blown up and swarming with maggots: the stench was horrible. We moved the bodies by rolling them on to stretchers with the aid of shovels...carried across to a neutral zone where they were handed over to some Turks who buried them, after taking any equipment off that was useful - boots were especially rushed!!

.. The flies, which became a plague after a few weeks, no doubt spread infection very considerably among men who were already in a poor state of health. Disease was also spread by the water, which was obtained almost universally from a contaminated source... for the first few days on the Peninsula, all the rules of sanitation were disregarded. It was the usual thing for men to use the nearest bush or gully for a latrine, without even troubling to dig a hole or cover up the deposit. So that from the start, all the gullies, from which water could be obtained, were grossly contaminated with faeces and urine....There are many lessons to be learned from the early days of the AIF and I think they have been learned and acted upon: but it is just as well to keep the original faults in mind to prevent their occurrence.

LACROSSE IN EGYPT.

ADELAIDE TO THE FORE.

Mr. H. W. Hodgetts (chairman of the S.A. Lacrosse Association) received by the fast mail the following letter from Mr. R. White, a late member of the Holdfast Bay A grade lacrosse team, and now a member of the First S.A. Expeditionary Force, stationed at Cairo:—

Mena Camp, February 20, 1915.

I know I can interest you and a few more of our fellow-lacrosseurs by what I am going to tell you, and only loope noone else gets in before me. On the evening of Thursday, February 18, a meeting of those interested in the game of lacrosse was convened by Sgt. J. Gordon and Roy White. This was a result of a confabulation amongst several of us who read in the previous week's Egyptian "Times" of a match played by two Manchester regiments at Heliopohs. Ptc. Roy White had in the meantime written to the secretary of the 6th Manchesters, and had received an answer, with which we were most pleased.

Eut to the meeting. Punctually at 7 p.m. Dr. H. C. Nott was voted to the chair (the form, I should say) in the mess shed of A company, and business was begun immediately. About 16 men were present, including the following:—Dr. H. C. Nott, Sgt. Gordon; Ptes. Sandiland, J. Gower (still living up to his sugar basin reputation). Roy White, T. A. Whyte, R. Fordham, A. D. Blackburn, A. Edwards, Ey, Mitchell, and one or two more. Resume of business:—Officers:—Patron, Col. Weir, V.D.; president, Dr. Nott; vice-presidents, Mir. Hurcombe and Licut. Eric Talbot Smith: captain, T. A. Whyte; vice-captain, Sgt. J. R. Gordon; secretary and treasurer, Roy White; committee, captain, vice-captain, secretary. Pte. J. L. Gower and Lance-Cpl. Sandiland; selection committee, Sgt. J. Gordon, Lance-Cpl. Rhodes, and Capt. T. A. Whyte. Subscription, 5 p.t. (1/). I may state that the sub. is not due till February 24 (pay day).

Siaden, of 6th Manchester lacrosse team, on behalf of his club, was willing to lend to us 24 sticks, &c., for a week or two for practice purposes, as his regiment included about 60 lacrosseurs, who had joined in a body, and, as he said, it included practically an all-England team, he wished us to, if possible, pick an "all-Australia" lacrosse team and play them. Well, we have got so far towards doing this in that we have arranged a match with the 9th (Queensland) to-morrow, and I will stop here now and write particulars later of the match, &c. Our side, the first lacrosse team from South Australia to play in Egypt, is as follows:—Backs—A. J. Edwards (Port Pirie): goal, R. L. Rhodes (North Adeiaide), E. Kent (Sturt), A. S. Blackburn ('Varsity): defences—R. White (H. Bay), Sandiland (N.A.), T. A. Whyte (N.A.); centre—Attacks, R. White (H. Bay), J. L. Gower (E. Torrens), forwards, H. J. Edwards (Port Pirie), J. Gordon (Sturt), H. C. Nott ('Varsity). Emergencies—R. Fordham (E. Torrens), and Everett.

Well, we had a game to-day (Sunday, February 21) and I must say that considering the circumstances it was a distinct success, specially from the 10th point of view. At about 3.30 p.m. about a quarter of a mile from the Pyramid of Cheops we started a scratch game with 15 sticks, the total number we could borrow. Of this I will say little save that men like H. C. Nott, T. A. Whyte, Sandiland, R. Rhodes, Gower, and Roy White displayed, after a short while, much of their old form: the Queenslanders were very weak. At about 4.20 two of the 6th Manchester turned up with nine more sticks, and we then started a dinkum game. A point of great interest, no doubt, is that our old pal Max Hubbe kept goal for the Queenslanders in this game. As time was now limited two terms of 15 minutes each were agreed upon, and at 4.30 the draw off resulted in the ball being quickly taken into our opponents territory, where J. Gordon, H. C. Nott, and Roy White were easily able to put one in per medium of J. Gordon. During this term the South Australian boys easily showed their superiority, and it was only through the goalkeeping of Hubbe for the 9th that more goals were not procured. H. Edwards, of Pirie, and Gower (who all through displayed absolutely his old "never say die" powers) also got a goal each, and a good half ended 2 to nil.

You will, of course, not need me to tell you that the opponents of T. A. Whyte, Sandland, and Rhodes, like those who were on Gordon, Nott., and Gewer, were outclassed. Roy and Hurtle White also played great games, and H. Edwards was good, except for stickwork, which, of course, was hard to pick up on account of the strange sticks.

The second half was again absolutely in favour of South Australia, who put on 8 more goals—T. A. Whyte 3, J. Gordon 2, R. White 2, and Sandland 1. You will be surprised that D. Nott got no goals—he played an unselfish game, and was instrumental in getting at least half. The Queenslanders were not up to the standard of our A grade men. Lieut. Fortesque, of Toowoomba, may be known to some of those who journeyed to Brisbane in 1908 or 1910, I am not sure of the year. (1908 and 1912 were the years—Ed.) He showed fair form, but averaging their team it was only, I think, up to B grade form. Rhodes kindly lent his camera, and a couple of snaps were taken, of which I hope, in the event of their being successful, to send you the prints. They may be of interest to lacrosseurs. Do not hesitate to use them. We played on ground length 100 yards. The goals were brigade marker flags and four oil sheets, two each end laced together. The team as played:

—Goal, A. J. Edwards: point, R. O. Fordham: cover, G. Kent: third man, R. A. Rhodes: defences, A. C. Sandiland, H. H. White: centre, T. A. Whyte; attacks, J. L. Gower, R. H. White, H. C. Nott, J. R. Gordon, H. J. Edwards."

Pte. Guy Fisher (the well-known Varsity and interstate tennis player) added a note to the effect that D. T. DuRieu, T. A. Whyte, and himself were flourishing, and desired to be remembered to all friends. While serving at Gallipoli, Harry was taken ill and evacuated to Egypt and then returned to Australia for medical treatment on the 23rd of June 1916.

While back in Adelaide, Harry married Marjorie Lowe, the only daughter of Mr. W. Lowe of North Adelaide (formerly of Perth).

He arrived back in England on the 1st of February 1917 and served on the Western Front with the 2nd Australian Field Ambulance, the 1st Australian Casualty Clearing Station and the 10th Battalion. On the 7th of July 1917, Harry was present at a reunion of the Reds and Blues held in Amiens, in northern France.

Distinguished Conduct Archai, REDS AND BLUES AT THE FRONT. Monday's deliveries of soldiers' letters brought many interesting epistles from the western battle front. One from an old Prince Alfred College boy contained news that will be of interest to many friends and relatives of collegians. An extract from the letter reads:—"The event old Saints and Princes in Amieus on the night of July 7. We cangut business motors, places. Some came in ambulance motors, down to dinner at the Grand Salon Godbert, in Rue des Jacobins, at 6.30. The menu shows that the spread was a good one, but of course that is only a detail compared with the pleasure of meeting old pals, and of exchanging reminiscences for three or four hours. Harry was promoted to Major on the 14th of November 1917 and to Lieutenant Colonel on the 25th of July 1918.

Harry's wife was able to join him in England and their first child a daughter, Dorothy, was born on the 4th of December 1918, at The Priory, Totness, Devonshire, England. The family returned to Australia on the 14th of September 1920.

Between the Wars

On the 10th February 1922, Harry and Marjorie had a second daughter, Pamela Carew, but tragically, Pamela passed away 10 days later. In 1926, daughter Patricia was born. Between the Wars, Harry career flourished, but he was most often in the newspapers for his sporting exploits. Harry was among the top ten tennis players and golfers in South Australia for at least 10 years after the WW1. Harry also became a qualified pilot and was involved in amateur dramatics.

Golf

In 1924, he motored to Melbourne to take part in the Victorian Golf Championships and in 1927, he was part of the South Australian golf team at an interstate carnival. Harry won the Seaton Cup in 1931 and competed regularly in the AIF Cup competition.



Harry gained his pilot's licence in January 1929 and was part of the S.A. Aero Club crew who flew in competitions and displays. In 1930, Harry won the Inter-Club Pilot's race in Melbourne. It was not all winning for Harry, in December 1930 he was forced to bring his plane down in rough country when the fuel supply failed. In 1936, Harry qualified to fly the Miles Hawk solo.



In 1939, Harry and Marjorie separated and on the 1st of January 1940, Harry enlisted in the AIF. Harry embarked on the 4th of April 1940. He served in Palestine and the Middle East before returning to Australia on the 10th of March 1942. He then served in the North of Australia. Harry suffered ill health during the latter half of WWI as he had a tumour on his palate. Harry and Marjorie gained a divorce in June 1945. He served with the 2nd Australian General Hospital until the 7th of January 1946.

Post WWII

After WWII, Harry moved to Sydney and married Jean Marie Grant Walsh (born 1920, Norwood, SA) in Sydney, NSW in 1945. He was living at 105 Macleay Regis, Potts Point in January 1946 and then later moved to Palm Beach.

Harry's eldest daughter, Dorothy, married Robert Berrick, the son of Mr. and Mrs. B.R. Berrick, of Victoria, British Columbia, Canada, in Guernsey, Channel Islands in February 1947. The couple intended making a home in England. In March 1949, Patricia married Tom Legoe, son of Mr. and Mrs. R.J. Legoe of Lucindale, SA.

Harry and Jean travelled to London in 1950. On the 29th of December 1953, Harry and Jean, had a son, Charles, who was christened at Avalon in March 1954. The family were living at Palm Beach, NSW.

Death

Harry passed away in Adelaide, South Australia, on the 23rd of January 1973, aged 84 years and is buried at Enfield Memorial Cemetery. He was survived by wife, Jean, and his daughters, Dorothy and Pat and son Charles.
