## **Background**

Coinciding with the Centenary of Anzacs our incentive behind the series of biographical publications is the Adelaide University Football and Cricket Club's desire to honour our players who served in the Great War (1914 - 1918). These brave men put on hold their academic, professional and sporting careers for King and Country in the name of peace and freedom. The AUFC/AUCC WW1 Memorial Committee is endeavouring to identify every one of our players who served and prepare life stories on all. This is to ensure their sacrifices and further contributions to society will be recognised by future generations.

On Anzac Day 2015, the Centenary of the Gallipoli landing, a memorial plaque was unveiled on the Adelaide University Oval Pavilion and this was followed by the erection of a picket fence between the pavilion and the scoreboard with each picket bearing a plaque with the name of an AUFC/AUCC player who served.

#### **Biography**

Patrick Andreas Ohlstrom enlisted in the Australian Imperial force on 5 July 1915 at the age of twenty-four and a half. Born at Warooka on the Yorke Peninsula in South Australia, Ohlstrom was working as a clerk at the time of his enlistment, a profession to which he returned on his discharge in 1919.

Serving with the 32nd Australian Infantry Battalion, Ohlstrom was promoted to corporal in August of 1915. Embarking for the Middle East in November, Ohlstrom spent his first Christmas at war in the trenches, guarding the eastern side of the Suez Canal from Ottoman advances. The next few months were spent in similar duties, with occasional diversions such as dysentry and camel riding, which Ohlstrom thought "weird". The 32nd also had the opportunity of sightseeing at their post at Tel el Kebir, complete with "gruesome sights" and bones from the battle of 1882, when the British and Indian armies under the command of General Wolseley subjugated Egypt for the Empire.

In June, they shipped out to France and witnessed their first air raid on 29 June, the day after a surprise visit from General Birdwood described by Ohlstrom in his diary as the "Soul of Anzac". July saw heavy shelling, exhaustion and the "honors of going over the Top first." After 19 and 20 July, the horror of European trench warfare hit home to Ohlstrom.

Have passed through a night of Hell on earth. It was awful the noise and the sights of dead & dying men. The boys took three lines of German trenches, easily but after hanging on all night were compelled to let go and fall back on our own line. Every devilish invention was used against us including liquid fire and gas. I never want to go through another dose of it. Our casualties were very heavy but no worse than theirs.<sup>5</sup>

An infection saw Ohlstrom out of commission and hospitalised in England from August until the end of the year, although that seemed to do little to stop him from thoroughly enjoying himself. He returned to serve at the No. 2 Officers Cadet battalion at Cambridge in August 1917 before being hospitalised again in November.

In January 1918, Ohlstrom finally returned to the 32nd battalion to be severely wounded in a gas attack on 14 May 1918. Two days later was promoted to second lieutenant. He returned to hospital, where he spent the remainder of the conflict before rejoining his unit at the end of November 1918 and returning to Australia in February 1919, having been promoted to full lieutenant on 25 June 1918.

Once back home, Ohlstrom returned to law, first clerking and later becoming a partner in the firm Jessop, Ward and Ohlstrom. Also remembered as a prominent baseball player and cricketer, Patrick Andreas Ohlstrom died in 1940 at the age of 49.<sup>6</sup>

#### **Additional Biography**

#### **Early Life**

Patrick Andreas Ohlstrom was born on the 16<sup>th</sup> of December 1890 to Pohl Ohlstrom and Margaret (née Purtle) at Warooka on Southern Yorke Peninsula. He was the youngest of 10 children and the only son<sup>i</sup>. Patrick's father Pohl was a farmer and labourer while at Warooka and a fisherman and mason when at Edithburgh. His mother Margaret was a midwife. Patrick's birth name was registered as Patrick Andreas Paul Ohlstrom; however, his third name does not appear to have been used from that point onward and he was known as Pat.

#### **Schooling**

Patrick commenced primary school at Warooka on the 6<sup>th</sup> of April 1896, aged 5 years and 4 months, but a mere 20 days later moved to the Edithburgh Primary School, where he was a Junior in 1896-98, then 1899 Grade I, 1900 Grade II, 1901 Grade III, 1902 Grade IV, 1903 Grade IV and 1904 Grade V. It is unclear why Pat spent two years in Grade IV, however more than one student at Edithburgh in the early 1900's spent two years in Grade IV. He left the school in December 1904, aged 14 years.

The first mention of Pat in the newspapers was for giving a recitation at his school concert in 1900, aged 10 years. Other early mentions of Pat Ohlstrom relate to sporting achievements as Pat competed in Sports Days and Aquatic Competitions. He won the Neatest Dive, under 15 years, in the Christmas Day Sports at Edithburgh in 1903, the boys swimming race at the Stansbury Aquatic Sports in 1904 and coming second in several boys' flat races at Yorketown and Edithburgh. Pat played cricket for Edithburgh from the 1903/04 to 1907/08.

From 1908, Pat attended Howard's Commercial and Correspondence College. He played Cricket for the College team in the Adelaide and Suburban Association in the 1908/09 season and in a match against Christian Brother's College in February 1909. He played football for Athelstone in 1908 and represented the "Present" scholars in the College's annual Past v Present football match in September 1909.

#### The Pre-War Years

The story of Pat's life after leaving Commercial College and before the commencement of WWI can mainly be trace through post War newspaper reports and through the sporting pages.

#### Cricket

Pat played the 1908/09 season for Glynde and the 1909/10 season for Warwick (at Walkerville) in the Metropolitan Association – Section B. In 1910/11 and 1911/12, Pat played for Anchor and won the Bowling honours in the 1911/12 season. Pat again played for Anchor in the 1914/15 season and in at least one game in the 15/16 season. His friends from the Anchor Club gave him a farewell party when he joined up for military service.

A newspaper article published in 1924, states that Pat played a season for Athelstone and a season for Glynde before playing in the Metropolitan Association and that in the 1911/12 season he played a game in Wellington, New Zealand. However, in relation to that article, the profiler has only been able to locate evidence for Pat playing Football for Athelstone and Cricket for Glynde.

#### Baseball

Pat played baseball for the Freemason Ramblers in the 1915 season (winter), the team were minor premiers however they failed both attempts to win the grand final (under the rules in place at the time if the minor premiers lost the grand final they could challenge the winning team to a re-match to decide the premiership).

#### **Employment**

Pat worked as a special clerk for Josiah Symons, solicitor, however it is unclear when he commenced in this role.

Pat's early interest in the law can be seen from a letter he wrote in 1915 regarding exploitation of workers during difficult economic times.

#### WORK WITHOUT PAY.

From P. A. Ohlstrom, Glenclg:-It has often been rumored (with more or less ac curacy) that a large number of firms are taking advantage of the prevailing had times by asking their employes to take a week's holiday out of every six, or ar-rangements to that effect. Employes as a rule are always willing to meet their employers half way, and in these somewhat strendous times make no objections to an enforced holiday, but the case to which I wish to draw attention is one which for barefaced trading on the prevailing con-ditions and the good nature of his emplayes I think it would be hard to beat. The acts are as follow: - A lew days ago the assistants of an establishment at Gleneig received a slip of paper asking them whe-ther they would work one week without their salary. They were to reply to the question by writing "Yes" or "No" on the note and return same to the other. Of course they well knew that the alternative would be dismissal if they answered in the negative, and how many people can at present afford to court dismissal? No one No one has so far heard of the employer having distributed his goods tree of charge to his continues during the week of his "freecustomers during the week of his "free-labor" carmival. I think the sooner tookind of trading is very severely dealt with the better.

#### World War I

Patrick Andreas Ohlstrom enlisted on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of June 1915. He was then a 24½ years old clerk, 5'3", weighing 119 lbs, with a fair complexion, blue eyes and fair hair. His mother Margaret Ann Ohlstrom of Edithburgh was named as his next-of-kin (his father Pohl had passed away aged 78 in 1915).




Group portrait taken at Mitcham Camp, Adelaide, July 1915 Patrick Andreas Ohlstrom – Middle Row – Second from Left



#### LIEUTENANT PATRICK OHLSTROM

20/7/16

Have passed through a night of hell on earth. It was awful, the noise and sights of attacking and dying men. The boys took three lines of German trenches easily, but after hanging on all night, were compelled to let go and fall back to our own line. Every devilish invention was used against us including liquid fire and gas. I never want to go through another dose of it.

#### 21/7/16

Back in our billets again. It is like heaven, but shells when they drop near, which they still are doing, make us jump out of our boots. We are a very sad few. All our pals are gone. It is damnable.

### LIEUTENANT PATRICK OHLSTROM

We were given gas helmets and goggles, and had to go through a test with gas. Had to put the helmets on while the gas was liberated from drums. Also, had to march through 'weeping gas' without covering over our eyes, which made us weep very much. This is similar gas to what the Germans are using, although neither of these were as powerful as what we will experience at the front. It was only an experiment so as to educate us for the 'real McCoy'.

#### 25/12/16

Xmas day. This morning indulged in my first snow fight. It was the best fun I have had for years. Xmas dinner a huge success. Quite like home. Had a quaint experience tonight. A pal and self-making ourselves known to a family because we could not find a restaurant open and we were hungry. People thought it a huge joke and gave us a royal time. Altogether this Xmas has been one of the best.

### ABOUT SOLDIERS.

News has been received by Mrs. Ohlstrom, of Edithburgh, that her son, Lieut.
P. A. Ohlstrom, of the 32nd Battalion,
had been admitted to a hospital in France
suffering from the effects of gas poisoning. Prior to enlisting Lieut. Ohlstrom
was a special clerk in Sir Josiah Symon's
office, and he left Adelaide, having had
no previous military experience, as a corperal. He went to Egypt, and thence to
England and France, where he occupied
a position in the paymaster's office. His
promotion to a lieutenancy is pleasing to
his friends and employer. Sir Josiah Symon described him "as a good little chap,"
and had frequently written him letters.

Pat arrived back in Australia on the 28<sup>th</sup> of February 1919 and was given a welcome home by the people of Edithburgh in April 1919.

## WELCOME HOME.

### Edithburgh.

Military homecomings have been of frequent occurrence lately, but the enthusiasm of residents is not abating the least bit, as was evidenced on Saturday last when Lieutenant Ohlstrom arrived. The Lieut enlisted as a private and left with the 32nd Battalion three and a half years ago. They landed in Egypt and were detailed for service on Gallipoli, when news of the evacuation was received. were then sent on to France, and later Pte- Ohlstrom became casualty through mustard gas. On his partial recovery he went to Cambridge, where he gained his commission. He rejoined his Battalion and was once more gassed, and was for some time in hospital before being sent back to Australia. The Cheer-up Society entertained tne Lieutenant in the Institute on Easter Monday night. The Mayor and the President of the Cheer-up welcomed the guest, who suitably responded. The following submitted the musical items:—Misses Bramley, George, and Verrier, and Messrs. Christoffasen, Jury, and Offe.

#### Post WWI

On his return from the War, Pat was articled to Mr. C.A. Edmunds, solicitor. He recommenced his baseball career in the winter of 1919, rejoining his old team, the Freemason Ramblers and played for them in the 1919 to 1921 seasons. In 1921 he played in an exhibition match which was the pre-game to a SA versus Victoria match. He played cricket for Bankville in the Adelaide and Suburban Association competition in the 1919/20.

Pat commenced studying again, passing the Senior Public Examinations in Modern History in December 1919 and English Literature in the Special February Seniors (1920).

A SPLENDID RESULT.

Muecke secured the only credit given.

Pat was one of the officers in charge of the infantry at the 1920 ANZAC Day commemorations and in June 1920, he was part of the guard of honour when Lieut. Stanley Wood, late of the 27<sup>th</sup> Battalion married.

#### Marriage

Pat became engaged to Leonore Haynes, the youngest daughter of Mrs. A. Haynes, of North Adelaide in September 1921, the couple married on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of December 1921. Pat was 30 and Leonore 24 years of age.

## Wedding Bells

A smart military wedding was celebrated at St. Francis Xavier's Cathedrai, Wakefield Street, by the Very V.G., when Rev Monsignor Hurley, Lieut. Patrick A. Ohlstrom, of St. married Leonore. to Peters. was youngest daughter of Mrs. A. Hynes, The bride, who was given Glenehg. away by her brother, Mr. W. P. Hynes, was daintily clad in georgette and satin, and carried a beautiful sheaf of flowers with the white and gold ribbons of the 32nd Battalion. She was supported by her sister, Miss Dorothy Hynes, as bridesmaid, who wore a charming frock of maize georgette with bouquet to match. Lieut, Godfrey Wakelin was best man, and among those present was the Rev. Father Yorketown, ex-military Murphy, of An effective note was chaplain, A.I.F. the guard of honour formed by the officers present, through which the bride and bridegroom passed on leaving the Cathedral. After the ceremony Mrs. Hynes held the reception at the Grand Central Hotel, followed by lun-Mr. and Mrs. Ohlstrom left cheon. in the afternoon by the Melbourne express en route for the South-East.

#### **Adelaide University**

P.A. ("Paddy") Ohlstrom commenced studying Law at Adelaide University in 1920. He was Secretary of the Procession Committee in 1922. It is unclear when he picked up the nickname "Paddy" however he was certainly known by that name from 1923 and will be referred as Paddy in the remainder of this profile. He was an active member of the Law Student's Society.

#### **University Sport**

#### Cricket

Paddy commenced playing cricket for the Adelaide University in the B Grade in the 1920/21 season and he captained the B Grade in the 1921/22 season. He was named as 12<sup>th</sup> man for the Intervarsity Match in December 1922. He then played A Grade in 1922/23-1924/25 seasons and was vice-captain of the side. Paddy was vice-captain of the 1923 Intervarsity side and was awarded a Blue for Cricket in 1924.

The following newspaper articles were published in October and November 1923. Paddy was made a member of the State practice squad.

### OHLSTROM'S ACCURACY

#### Batsman Puzzled

P. A. Ohlstrom, the University bowler, has made remarkable improvement in both bowling and batting since last year. His accuracy with the ball is well known, and he can also make the leather swing in on the wicket at times. Mixing his deliveries well on Saturday he had P. K. Lee, the Norwood footballer and East Torrens cricketer puzzled. The ball appeared to be coming wide of the sticks and Lee stepped forward. To his surprise the ball swung right in on to the wicket without the patsmen attempting to play it.

There was no more astonished player than Lee. "The ball swung right round behind me," he said as he came out.

Ohlstrom finished with an average of wickets for 44.

## P. A. OHLSTROM

#### All-Round Athlete

P. A. Ohlstrom, the University trundler, whose magnificent performance in securing 8 wickets for 15 runs was the cause of Glenelg's sensational collapase this afternoon on a batsman's wicket, is one of the smallest A grade cricketers playing.

Ohlstrom is a comparatively newcomer to senior company. Last year he was a prominent performer for University B, until his consistent success with the ball won him promotion.

Ohlstrom is a bundle of energy, and a first-class all-round athlete. He shines as a baseballer, and is a particularly tricky goalsneak on the football field.

INTERSTATE PRACTICE TEAM.

The State selectors (Messrs. C. Hill, V. Y. Richardson, and J. F. Travers) have chosen the following 16 players to practise for the match with New South Wales, to begin on the Adelaide Oval on December 14:—A. J. Richardson, N. A. Walsh (Colta), L. Bowley, J. W. Rymill (Kensington), D. E. Pritchard, N. L. Williams (Port Adelaide), J. T. Murray (East Torrens), W. J. Whitty (Glenelg), A. Ambler, H. M. Fisher (North Adelaide), V. Y. Richardson, F. Gould, R. J. B. Townsend (Sturt), C. E. Seager (Adelaide), C. E. Dolling (West Torrens), P. A. Ohlstrom (University). The selectors have invited G. Whiting (Sturt) and W. Wiles (Glenelg) to offer their services as extra bowlers at the practice of the 16. If any other players show promise before the 11 is chosen the selectors have power to include them in the practice team.

# OHLSTROM'S SENSATIONAL BOWLING.

Taking eight wickets at a cost of only 15 runs against a side which has shown itself capable of making runs is a feat which has not been equalled for many years in A grade cricket at Adelaide. P. A. Ohistrom, of University, who was responsible for this sensational performance on Saturday against Gionely, put his team in a winning position. He is relatively now to A grade cricket, although he has had a long record as a bowler with a number of other teams. When Chistrem was still a primary school boy he signalised his entry into the Edithburgh town team by taking two wichets for 8. Later he played with the old Anchor team until he entisted, and towards the end of the war was a wards the end of the war was a member of the Tidworth team. which eventually developed into the famous A.I.F. team. Oblstrom meanwhile had gone to Emmanuel College, of which he became cricket captain, and was the only Australian there. With Emmanuel he took six wickets for 35 on one oceasion against a first-rate tourn. and finished up by taking 50 wickets in two months. On his return he played with the Adelaide and Seberban Association, and was for two seasons with University B. and was in A and B teams last year, taking tourtoon wickets for an average of about 14 in A grade, and 30 wickets for an average of 10 in B grade. He has also been responsible for some good scores, and made 96 in the final match for the University test seeson. During the winter he kept in his cricketing "cye" playing baseball, at which game he is captain and pitcher for the University and a leading inter-State player. Favored by a wicket which was rather faster than usual. Ohistrom sent up a selendid variety of bowling on Saturday. He is a right arm bowler, and kept a good length. with mostly off-break deliveries, interspersed with an occasional leg-break. He also varied his pace, and at times flighted the ball a No wonder he had the batamen fied up!

### VARIED CAREER

### Ohlstrom's Success





#### **State Cricket**

While playing for Adelaide University, Paddy was selected to play for South Australia, however, was only awarded one first class game. Paddy played against NSW on Adelaide Oval in December 1923. Bowling right arm off breaks he took 1/25 and batting left-handed, he scored 4 runs over two innings, one not out and a high score of 3 with an average of 4. In the 1923/24 season, Paddy topped the A Grade District bowling taking 47 wickets in total.

They would defeat Sturt the following year to take out the Club's first SACA premiership, however Paddy had graduated and was ironically playing at Kensington in the 1925/26 season.





#### "Body-line" in Court

After leaving University Paddy played A Grade District Cricket for Kensington for the 1925/26 to 1930/31 seasons, winning an A Grade Premiership in the 1927/28 season.

Paddy also played in the Lawyers versus Law Students matches in 1928-1933 period. In December 1936 Paddy was chosen to represent South Australia in an A.I.F team to play against Victoria.

The following article on Paddy was published in the 'News' in February 1926 and provides more details of some of Paddy's cricket exploits while in England during WWI.

## LAWYER AND CRICKETER

### Ohlstrom, of Kensington

P. A. Ohistrom, a Kensington bowler, has been performing consistently. In batting he has also shown style and initiative.

His first game of cricket was as a schoolboy at Edithburgh, when he played with the local team again Sunbury. He secured five wickets for eight runs. He played one season with Athelstone, and then a season with filvade. Playing with the latter side in a match against Modbury, he bowled right through an innings, and took seven wickets for 27 runs.

In 1919-1211 he played in the Metropolitist Association and took 76 wickets at an average of 5.80 runs. In the next senson he played in a game at Wellington (New Zealand), where he took eight wickets for 23 runs, and made 63 with the but.

Ca his return to Adelaide in 1914 he played with the Anchor Cricket Club. E. Dollman, a well-known Norwood supporter, was captain of the team. From him Ohistorn learned most of his cricket.

When the war came Oblstrem went on active service with the 32nd Battalon in November, 1915. While going through a training school for officers in 1917 at Kandahar Barracks, Tidworth (England), he played with Eric Barbour's team, which included C. G. Macartney, A. W. Lampard, and J. T. Matthews. When Macartney left for another theatre of the war Oblstrem secured his boots and trousers, which fitted him better than those which he had been wearing. He says that this was the nearest he ever got to "Jumping into C. G.'s boots."

Oblistrom then went to Emmanuel College at Cambridge as a cadet, Every college had its cricket team, matches being played on Wednesdays and Saturdays. He was chosen as captain of his

useful Kensington bowler, who has been showing good form with the ball.

college team. With his third ball in one game he bowled G. T. S. Stevens, a youth who was looked on in England as a certainty for international honors. Oblished as a six as it was the president mo-

ment of his life when he got that wicked Returning from the war in 1919, he went to the University of Adelaile to take up his law studies. He played with the H feam for two years, and with the A team for a similar period. In 1923 he headed the aggregate for the highest number of wickets in A grade. Some of his performances were:—Eight for 15 and six for 18 against Glenelg, four for 43 against East Torreps, seven for 83 against Sturt, seven for 190 against Port Adelaide, and four for 29 against Kensington. Playing for South Australia against New South Wales he secured one for 25 in seven overs.

He was awarded his 'varsite blue for cricket in the 1925-1924 season, and took 6; wickets. His test performance was name Kensington in the semi-final, when he took seven for 46 and six for 45.

He was captain of the University baseball team for four years, and is joint secretary of the South Australian Baseball League. He is also secretary of the Can't Hattalion Association. He is in practice as a solicitor in Adelaide,













#### Knocked The Queen Down

LIKE Oscar Witcomb, who played tennis at Glamis Castle with our present Queen of England, Mr P A Ohlstrom had that privilege, and on several occasions!

"I think I can claim, to be one up on my friend Oscar on another matter concerning the Queen and tennis, for I had the honor of knocking her down." he confided to me the other day.

"It happened this way Having played all the afternoon at Glamis with lots of guests and visitors somebody suggested that the day would not be complete unless an 'eightsome were played.

"This meant four on each side of the net. Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon (as the Queen was then) and I were ordered to the net, under penalty for refusal of a night in the dungeons

"I was all for the dungeons Lady Elizabeth wasn't, and so we played net. The game was fast and quite mad.

"All went well until we collided in mid-air or somewhere, and under the net went the future Queen of England, much to the joy of our opponents.

"She came up all smiles and apologies for her (alleged) clumsiness. That was in August. 1918. Time brings many changes."

#### Death

Paddy and Leonore were living at 38 Pridmore Avenue, Woodley (now Glen Osmond) in 1939. Tragically Paddy passed away on the 10<sup>th</sup> of June 1940, aged 49, after a short illness and is buried West Terrace Cemetery, Adelaide.

Margaret Agnes (Grannie) Ohlstrom, Paddy's mother, passed away on the 8<sup>th</sup> of March 1941, aged 96 years.

Many returned soldiers, municipalists, solicitors, and sportsmen attended the funeral today of Cr. P. A. Ohlstrom, of Glen Osmond, in the A.I.F. section of the West Terrace Cemetery, where the Rev. Father O'Sullivan officiated.

The Burnside Council was represented by the mayor (Lieut-Col. W. C. N. Waite) and members, while the Adelaide City Council, Kensington Cricket and Baseball Clubs, the 32nd Battalion A.I.F. Club, and the legal profession were also strongly represented. The casket was draped with the Union Jack.

The late Cr. Ohlstrom, who served as a lieutenant in the war, was a solicitor. He was a member of the Burnside Council and was also a former interstate baseballer.

# Tackling Housing Problem For Salisbury Munition Workers

THE problem of housing women munition workers, many of whom are from the country or otherwise without a city home, is a very serious one. It has already arisen among the Hendon workers, and will be partly met by the YWCA hostel plans which will cater for 450 women and girls; but the problem for the Salisbury explosives factory is one which is giving the authorities grave concern.

The first batch of women workers has already begun work at Salisbury, but its number will be increased a hundredfold when the factory is in full working order Although it is hoped that in the future hostel accommodation will overcome some of the housing need, it has been decided to tackle the immediate problem by an accommodation register conducted through the Corporations of Adelaide; Gawler, and Prospect, and the District Councils of Enfield, Salisbury, and Walkerwills, All of these bodies have an ville. All of these bodies have ap-proved of the scheme and agreed to co-operate, and forms for applica-tion for registration of accommodation will be distributed, and re-ceived when completed by the corporations and district councils concerned

This survey scheme was adopted some months ago in the areas near Hendon, the local councils helping with the form distribution and re-ception, and voluntary helpers playing their part by inspecting the accommodation offered. These same voluntary helpers have agreed to help in the northern suburbs survey, and any householder who has not received an application form may obtain one from the local poration or district council

office.

Mrs Ohistrom who after her appointment as welfare officer at Salisbury, spent several weeks gaining practical experience of her work at Hendon and at Maribyr-nong, in Victoria, has been preparing for the influx of women workers to Salisbury since she began her work there some months ago. In addition to interviewing and enrolling workers at the National Em-ployment Office in Grenfell street. some of whom are still gaining experience in Melbourne and some of whom have now returned to Salisbury, she has had many problems Catering, hygiene, and dozens of other considerations for the welfare of the workers come into her daily work, but these, she says, are able to be tackled within the fac-tory. It is for the most important problem, that of housing that the co-operation of householders is ac or nousensiders is so urgently required for the benefit of the women and girls who are mak-ing munitions for Australian and the Empire defence. In 1956, Mrs Leonore Ohlstrom gave £300 to the Adelaide University to establish annual prizes in German in memory of her late husband, Patrick Andreas Ohlstrom, the prizes are known at the Weimar - Ohlstrom Prizes.
