A.I.F.	387	<i>Captain</i> (Lance Sergeant) Lewis Charles CUDDY.	<p>During operations near SAILLY-le-SEC, on 30th March, 1918, this N.C.O. showed conspicuous gallantry in going out alone under heavy machine gun fire to try and get touch with the post on his right, which it was believed had fallen back.</p> <p>He afterwards went out alone to try and locate a sniper which was worrying his Platoon.</p> <p>When this N.C.O. was wounded he carried on in charge of his platoon until relieved the next day.</p> <p>He controlled his Platoon with the utmost confidence and was untiring in his efforts throughout the day and night continuously to ensure that the enemy was kept under the most severe fire whenever he showed himself.</p> <p>His example of courage and disregard of danger in going forward under fire to maintain touch with Units on flank is worthy of regard and was of the utmost value in clearing up the situation.</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><i>Gen.
