

Background

Coinciding with the Centenary of Anzacs our incentive behind the series of biographical publications is the Adelaide University Football and Cricket Club's desire to honour our players who served in the Great War (1914 - 1918). These brave men put on hold their academic, professional and sporting careers for King and Country in the name of peace and freedom. The AUFC/AUCC WW1 Memorial Committee is endeavouring to identify every one of our players who served and prepare life stories on all. This is to ensure their sacrifices and further contributions to society will be recognised by future generations.

Biography

Early Years


William Corin Holland was born on the 1st August 1883, the son of Thomas Corin Holland and Kate Bishop (Adelaide 309/435). (See Appendix 1 for Family Tree)

Schooling

In 1895 William was in the Lower Third Form a Prince Alfred's College, where in September 1898 he passed his Preliminary Exams. He joined the PAC Cadet Corp in July 1900 and was a cadet for three years.



In December 1902 William played in an Intercollegiate Cricket match for PAC versus St Peters and in the same month he passed his Senior Exams.

ST. PETER'S V. PRINCE ALPEED.

EASY WIN FOR THE REDE

A little over half an hour on Wednesday morning, was sufficient time in which to finish the cricket match between St. Peter's and Prince Alfred Colleges. Tuesday's rain had thoroughly soaked the Adelaste Oval, and, in addition to the ruined pitch, the blues, who with 6 wickets in hand required 17 runs to avoid an innings defeat, had to contend against a dead ground, on which the ball would not travel. As a matter of fact, the half-dozen wickets yielded only 17 runs, and the Princes won by an innings and 24 runs. This was a much easier victory than with ordinary weather could have been expected; but the win went to the side that played the better allround cricket. Christoph on Wednesday morning was very destructive, and his lefthand deliveries captured 5 wickets at a cost of 4 runs. Toms, who went in tenth, had a dash at the bowling, and at the third attempt made a fine houndary hit. His other two strokes gave him 2 each, and he was 10 not out when Harvey registered his "pair." University

From 1903 to 1909 William was studying toward a Bachelor of Law at Adelaide University. He completed his Final Certificate in Law in 1909.

Sport

William played cricket for the Stow Ramblers in the East Torrens Association from 1903 to 1909. However, in the second half of the 1909/1910 season William played at least three games for the Adelaide University Club. These games were played in January and perhaps covered absences from team due to university holidays. William had five innings, 2 n.o., high score 38*, total runs 60, average 20. He was considered a "useful" batsman.



The marriage of William Corin Holland, eldest son of Mr. T. C. Holland, the well-known solicitor, of Unley Park, and Lulu, only daughter of Mr. H. L. Hurst (chief clerk of the Post and Tele-Hirst (chief cierk of the Post and Telegraph Department), of Esmond-street, Unley, took place at Stow Church on November 21. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Mr. Rayner. The church was beautifully decorated by the triends of the bride and bridegroom. Professor Knox rendered several musi-cal items before and after the cere-mony. The bride, preceded by the bridesmaids, entered the church accompanied by her father, by whom she was given away. She was attired in a lovely gown of crepe de chene, mounted on glace, handsomely trimmed with scalloped val lace, edged with frills of Milanese lace, transparent yoke, lower part, of sleeves to match, festeons of part of sleeves to match, festoons of orange blossom, one side of front of skirt and on the corsage, a wreath of the same under her beautifully embroidered veil. She carried a white shower bouquet. She wore a pearl and tourma-line pendant (gift of the bridegroom). William and LuLu had three children, LuLu Eileen born 1908, Laurence Corin born 1911 and Cecil Russell born May 1913. In 1911 William and his family were living at Dover Street, Malvern.

Both LuLu and William had a love of horses. Their names were frequently in the newspapers in 1912 and 1913, winning prizes in the pony tandem pairs with their chestnuts 'Princess' and 'Dutchess'.

Career

William worked as a Solicitor for his father's firm, Holland and Lathlean until at least 1912. At some stage William commenced carrying on business as a commission agent. In this capacity he ran into financial and legal problems

which resulted in him coming before the Insolvency Courts between September 1915 and March 1916. William's behaviour was described as dishonest and his financial difficulties stemmed from gambling and share trading. As a result, William was jailed for 18 months.

THE HOLLAND CASE.

INSOLVENT AWARDED 18 MONTHS'
IMPRISONMENT.

In the Insolvency Court on February 25, the adjourned final hearing of the insolvency of William Corin Holland, solicitor, of Adelaide, carrying on business as a commission agent, was concluded before Mr. Commissioner Russell. Mr. R. W. Bennett appeared for the opposing creditor (Miss Julia Augusta Stuckey, of Hyde Park), and Mr. Paris Nesbit represented the insolvent

In delivering judgment, his Honor reviewed the transactions of the insolvent,
and quoted portions of his evidence. He
sa'd he had not the remotest doubt of
the non-existence of the alleged partnership with F. J. C. Whaite. The whole history of it was a pure fabrication by the
insolvent, invented for the purpose of
obtaining the money of Miss Stuckey.
From beginning to end it had no semblance of a reality. After having referred to the way in which the insolvent
stated he met Whaite, and the offer of
employment by the latter, his Honor said
they were the grounds on which the insolvent hased his grossly fraudulent attack
on his friend, Miss Stuckey. Altogether
he borrowed from her £3,255, and each
amount was obtained as the result of claborations of the same wilfully untrue
etatements. Consistent with the absence borations of the same wilfully untrue statements. Consistent with the absence of normal business conditions in the alleged partnership, although the insolvent said he made payments to Whaite for sums amounting to not sume Whalte for sums amounting to £4,000, not one single receipt was taken nor was any payment made by cheque, but all was in cash or notes. Although the insolvent stated he was entitled to £6,700 on a balance between himself and Whalte, with one exception only, no document or signature by Whalte was produced, and that one, purporting to have been written by F. J. C. Whalte, was in pencil. In that connection Mr. Cleland had taken exception to the statement of Mr. Bennett that for ry had been committed. His Honor thought Mr. Bennett was fair and markedly temperate in his address.

"Spurious Documents."

His Honor said he regarded that docu-His Honor said he regarded that document and two others, produced to Alias Stuckey, as obviously spurious. The whole tale told by the insolvent regarding Whaite and the partnership was full of improbabilities, and was unbelievable. He rejected the whole of the evidence of the insolvent felating to the partnership and its transpotions. The evidence of Miss Stuckey to regarded as the true account of the circumstances in which she was induced to make the loans. The creditors and the fourt required to be satisfied regarding how the insolvent disposed of the large sums the insolvent disposed of the large sums of money he borrowed. He said he paid Whaite £4,000 in connection with the partnership. He had set up such an unreasonable, unsupported, and improbable story that it was impossible to believe it. The insolvent's dealings showed that he was a shrewd man of business. He had had a legal training and he was quite capable. a legal training, and he was quite capable of protecting himself from an impertment imposition that he suggested had been practised upon him.

"Huge Confidence Tricks" Scouted.

The insolvent claimed to have been the victim, not of one, but of a series of huge confidence tricks, ranging over 12 months of close contact between himself and Whaite. As related by the insolvent, every act alleged in the partnership was abnormal and absurd as a business proposition, and for the most part inherently improbable. It was unsubstantial and unbelievable. The was unsubstantial and unbelievable. The insolvent had considerable share dealings through his broker. It was certain that a large portion of the money so improperly obtained from Miss Stuckey was used in satisfying indebtedness to that broker, and it seemed probable that instead of the money having been lost in the fictitious partnership, the real losses had occurred in share dealing and gambling. Insolvent's Evidence Rejected.

The insolvent had made many state-ments to Miss Stuckey about Whaite, his partners, and the partnership, all of which were wholly untrue. Though he rejected the insolvent's evidence re-Nos. 4 and 5, he was not prepared to find that the particulars alleged on each charge constituted the full and only facts of the fraud, and that they operated upon the wind of Miss Stucker in infraud, and that the operated Stuckey in inloans. those Therefore ducing the two charges were dismissed. He found that charges Nos. 1, 2, 3, 6, 7, and 8 were substantiated. The case proved was one of the worst instances of the kind that had come under his notice. The insolvent would be awarded a second-class certificate, his protection would be with-drawn, and he would be ordered into cus-tody. On the charges found against him he would be imprisoned for 18 months. Mr. Nesbit made an unsuccessful ap-plication that the warrant be not enforced

pending an appeal to the Full Court.

World War I

On the 28th February 1917 William enlisted as a Private in the 27th Battalion, 20th Reinforcements.

William was described as 33½ years of age, 5'9", 126 lbs of medium complexion with hazel eyes and dark hair. His next of kin was his wife, Louisa and their address was 32 North East Road, Medindie. William embarked on the 30 October 1917 from Melbourne. He served with the 3rd Australian Auxiliary Hospital Staff in the UK. He suffered from appendicitis in January 1918. William returned to Australia as medically unfit on 6 Feb 1919. William was discharged from the AIF on 22nd Feb 1919 and joined the Australian Army Pay Corps on home service on the 6th March 1919. He was discharged from the AAPC on 21st August 1920.

William's three brothers also served in WWI. George Harold (1891) in the AIF and AFC, Frank Bishop (1895) served at Gallipoli and in France where he died as a result of wounds on 22 August 1916 and Thomas Lancelot (1899) who joined up in May 1918 but had not left Australia when the hostilities ceased on 11 November 1918.

Post WWI

After finishing his war service William joined the Real Estate firm, Alfred C. Catt, Son, & Co. at their Pirie Street Office. In July 1922 William was elected a Councillor for the Prospect Council a position he held until he retired from the role in May 1928.

Cr. W. C. Holland, who has represented Nailsworth Ward in Prospect District Council for the past six years, and Cr. H. G. Tossell, M.P., who has watched the interests of St. John's Wood Ward for the past three years, and are not seeking re-election, were the recipients of farewell gifts at the last meeting of the council. In handing Cr. Holland a bridge cabinet and Cr. Tossell a pocketbook, Cr. P. Sandery (chairman) referred to the happy associations of the retiring members with the council, and said that the district would be the loser by their retirement.

From the 14th August 1922 William was the manager of Alfred C. Catt, Son, & Co's new office on the corner of Rose Street and Prospect Road, Prospect. William played tennis at the Prospect Gardens Club (1923) and bowls (1924). In December 1924 William and LuLu's eldest son, Laurence Corin, won a scholarship to Prince Alfred's College, at that time the family was living at Burwood Avenue, Nailsworth. In 1927 William endowed a Form Prize to PAC in memory of his brother who fell during the War.

Clarkson had asked the executive committee to necept £1,000 to endow a scholarship. to be known as the Ctarkson Scholarship. Mr. Clarkson had shown unfailing interest in the school, and his latest gift was to mark his appreciation of what it had done for his five sons, the youngest of whom was captain this year of the cricket team. The scholarship, which would be tenable at the school for two years, would be awarded annually, and would give exemption from all thition fees. The first award, said Mr. Bayly, had been made to G. L. Bennett, the dux of form 5a, and it was hoped he would be the first of a long succession of Clarkson scholars who, by the wise use of the opportunities provided, would endorse, in the manner which he would most value, the thanks which he tendered to Mr. Clarkson for his gift. Mr. Bayly also thanked Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Holland, who had endowed a form prize in memory of a brother, Mr. F. B. Holland, who fell during the war.

In the 1920's William was actively involved in the Prospect Horses-In-Action Society, He was the Secretary for the society for a number of year, showed his harness pony and acted as clerk of the scales and in other stewardship roles at shows.

Present members drank to the health of the visitors, most of whom had been associated with Mr. Whittle at some time since he entered the Prospect Council. Since then the status of Prospect had risen from that of district council to corporation, and more recently to that of city.

Past members present were Messrs. A. McInnes, F. Murdoch, A. W. Poyser, H. L. Allchurch, W. Currle, A. T. Gray, J. A. Murdoch, and W. C. Holland.

In 1939, William was unfortunately involved in a serious motor vehicle accident in which he knocked down a pedestrian crossing O'Connell St, North Adelaide.

Swan died at the Adelaide Hospital on Monday night, Plainclothes Constable M. A. Daly prepared the report for the coroner.

He was at the time suffering from injuries received by him on the 5th day of May, 1939, when he was run over by a motor car driven by WILLIAM CORIN HOLLAND. I find that no blame is attachable to the driver of the motor car."—(C.5411.)

After having previously been a highly active Prospect councillor, he maintained an interest in their affairs. In 1939 he was one of several citizens who opposed the building of a new City Hall.

The letter was received.

World War II

William enlisted for home service on 30 March 1942, Adelaide, SA. He was commissioned as a Lieutenant in the 2nd (Northern Adelaide) Battalion Volunteer Defence Corps. He served as a Liaison Officer for the RSL.

Later Life

William's wife LuLu died at home at 31 Burwood Avenue, Nailsworth on 7th January 1949. William died on the 9th November 1953, aged 70 years and is buried at the North Road Cemetery.

Family Legacy

William and LuLu's elder children (Lulu and Laurence) both studied medicine at Adelaide University. LuLu married fellow medical student Alfred Henry Humphry in 1933. LuLu gained a B.Sc. in 1935 and her husband, MB BS in 1937.



Laurence gained his MB BS in 1935. After completing his residency, he practiced at Snowtown SA. He married Miss Mary Elizabeth (Betty) Hollidge in 1937

William and LuLu's youngest son, Cecil Russell "George" Holland, became an accountant. Although he did not complete his studies, he played some B Grade games for the Adelaide University Cricket Club in the mid-1930s. He served in the Middle East in WWII as part of the Australian Army Pay Corp. In 1942 after his return (through illness) to a position at the 34th Australian Cash Office, he met and married nursing sister, Mildred Grace North in 1945, a Tasmanian who was stationed at the Heidelberg 115 Military Hospital.
