Walter James Cain

Private (Pte) 3037 Walter James Cain enlisted in the 21st Infantry Battalion in Melbourne on 28 July 1915. He embarked overseas on 18 November and disembarked in Egypt about four weeks later.

During the reorganisation of the AIF in early 1916, he was transferred and taken on strength of the 59th Infantry Battalion in the 15th Infantry Brigade of the 5th Australian Division at Tel el Kebir, on 15 March 1916.

The 59th Battalion sailed for France on 18 June 1916 and arrived at Marseilles on 29 June. They travelled north by train to Steenbeque, where they undertook training in the use of gas masks and trench mortars.

The battalion moved into the frontline near Fleurbaix on 18 July in preparation for a planned assault the next day. At 7.00 pm on 19 July 1916, the battalion attacked the strong German defences in what would later become known as the Battle of Fromelles – the first action by the AIF on the Western Front. The attack should never have occurred and was the folly of the British commander, General Richard Haking, who had used the same plan a year earlier with similar results – a disaster from start to finish.

In less than 24 hours at Fromelles, the 59th Battalion lost 20 officers, and 674 other ranks killed, wounded, captured or missing, one of whom was Pte Cain, who was killed in action on 19 July 1916. His body was never recovered, and he has no known grave.
