## **Athol Hood Holden**



Private (Pte) 2869 Athol Hood Holden enlisted in the 1<sup>st</sup> Pioneer Battalion in Sydney on 20 July 1916. He embarked overseas on 17 October and disembarked in Plymouth on 9 January 1917, where he joined the Pioneer Training Battalion at Lark Hill Camp.

He spent the period 6 March -11 April in the Fargo Military Hospital with an undiagnosed illness, after which he was transferred to the  $5^{th}$  (Brigade) Training Battalion on 11 July 1917.

After five months infantry training, he left England on 30 January 1918. He landed in France the next day, where he was transferred and taken on strength of the 18<sup>th</sup> Infantry Battalion in the 5<sup>th</sup> Infantry Brigade of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Australian Division, resting at Seninghem, on 5 February.

Following the success of the German offensive on the Somme on 21 March, the 18<sup>th</sup> Battalion was moved south on 2 April but, by the time they arrived, the main enemy assault had already petered out. They remained in the Villers-Bretonneux area for several months, and it was here that Pte Holden sustained a gunshot wound to the head on 24 July 1918.

He was initially evacuated to the American Hospital at Le Treport from 26 July – 9 August, then admitted to the 10<sup>th</sup> General Hospital at Rouen between 10 August – 14 September, after which he rejoined the 18<sup>th</sup> Battalion at Frise on 24 September.

On 3 October, the  $2^{nd}$  Division attacked the German Beaurevoir trench system. Despite strong resistance the objectives were taken, together with 332 German prisoners, for the loss of 116 battalion casualties. They left the line on 6 October and, several weeks later, Pte Holden contracted influenza, for which he was treated locally between 25 November – 7 December. He then proceeded on leave in England from 5 – 21 January 1919.

He returned to England on 11 March and was granted paid leave to undertake employment with Renson Motor Engineering in Chisham between 14 March – 5 September. Shortly after this arrangement ceased, he embarked for return to Australia on 22 September.

Private 2869 Athol Hood Holden disembarked in Melbourne on 12 November, then made his way to Sydney where he was discharged from the AIF on 27 December 1919.
