## **Lewis Henry Martinsen**



Private (Pte) 2715 Lewis Henry Martinsen enlisted in the 29<sup>th</sup> Battalion in Geelong on 24 January 1916. He embarked overseas on 14 March and disembarked at Suez on 15 April.

He left Egypt on 21 June and disembarked in Marseilles on 29 June. He was hospitalised at the 24<sup>th</sup> General Hospital at Etaples with German measles between 4 – 12 August, after which he joined the 5<sup>th</sup> Division Base Details, also at Etaples.

Pte Martinsen was transferred and taken on strength of the 8<sup>th</sup> (Brigade) Machine Gun Company in the 5<sup>th</sup> Australian Division at Fleurbaix, on 22 August 1916. They operated around this area for the next two months then moved south to the Somme in late October.

The company entered the front line around Flers on 22 October, and it was near here that Pte Martinsen sustained a gunshot wound to his left knee on 24 October.

He was initially treated at the 38<sup>th</sup> Casualty Clearing Station from 24 October – 7 November, then transferred to England, where he was admitted to the Voluntary Aid Detachment Hospital at Exeter between 16 November – 2 May 1917.

He then spent two months at the No. 2 Convalescent Depot at Weymouth and was also diagnosed with ankylosis, presumably in the left knee. As a result, he embarked for return to Australia on 21 July.

Private 2715 Lewis Henry Martinsen disembarked in Melbourne on 18 September, where he was medically discharged from the AIF on 9 November 1917.
