AN APPEAL.

"Their name liveth for evermore."

Now that the Great European War has been brought to a victorious conclusion, it is thought advisable to address an appeal to all Old Scotch Collegians, as well as the present boys of the College, to their parents, and to the wide circle of friends of Scotch College, to contribute generously towards a fund that will ensure the fitting commemoration, in the new Scotch College at Hawthorn Glen, of the work and service that has been bravely performed for the Empire's cause by 1200 Old Scotch Collegians.

Words are scarcely necessary to commend this appeal to every individual Old Scotch Collegian or other friend and supporter of the school. The time for the transfer of Scotch College from its present site, where it is uncomfortably situated on two acres of ground, to the 65 acres at Hawthorn Glen, is now drawing near, and it is hoped and anticipated that Old Scotch Collegians and others will establish in memory of Old Boys on active service, a group of buildings of which the central feature will be a great School Hall that will accommodate an audience of from 1200 to 1500. We wish to dedicate these buildings to the memory of those members of the school who have fallen in the struggle, and in honour of those who happily survive and come home victorious. They must be worthy of their sacrifice and service.

At one end of the Hall there should be a great stained-glass window, through which the rays of the morning sun would fall on the assembled school. Under the window would appear, graven in bronze or some other enduring material, the names of all our gallant sons, those of the fallen being marked by a white cross or by the seven-pointed star of Australia. The building would be their Valhalla, where the memory of their deeds would be enshrined. When the tale is complete, there will be some 1200 names to be set down. All these by their deeds have assisted to

shed imperishable lustre on the Old School that nurtured them in former days. Shall it be said that we are so ungrateful, so unmindful of their high endeavours and great achievements that we hesitate to pay them the only fitting tribute in our power by establishing some permanent memorial, which shall adequately mark our appreciation of their heroism and sacrifice? There can be but one answer to such a question. Every friend of the school will feel that it is a privilege to be accorded the opportunity of joining in a movement which has for its object the perpetuation of the memory of those with whom it is an honour for us to be associated under the common name of Old Scotch Collegians.

The mark we are aiming at is £50,000. Towards this several munificent donations have already been offered or given—two for £1000, one for £750, four for £500, several for £250, several more for £100, and a large number of smaller amounts. We have made a good start, but a great deal more money is needed. It is anticipated that every Old Collegian will do his utmost to make some subscription towards such a praiseworthy object. If it is inconvenient for Old Boys to forward ready cash for the full amount, they may extend payments over a period of three years, or may forward war bonds for the amount of their promised subscriptions. Some may be subscribing to the Presbyterian Church appeal for £250,000 as a war thank-offering. Under this larger scheme, amounts may be ear-marked for any specific purpose, and it is our wish that Old Boys ear-mark part at least of their subscriptions for the Scotch College War Memorial Buildings Fund. Those who are desirous of contributing to the War Memorial directly, are asked to forward remittances to the Hon. Mother, thy blessing! before we go.

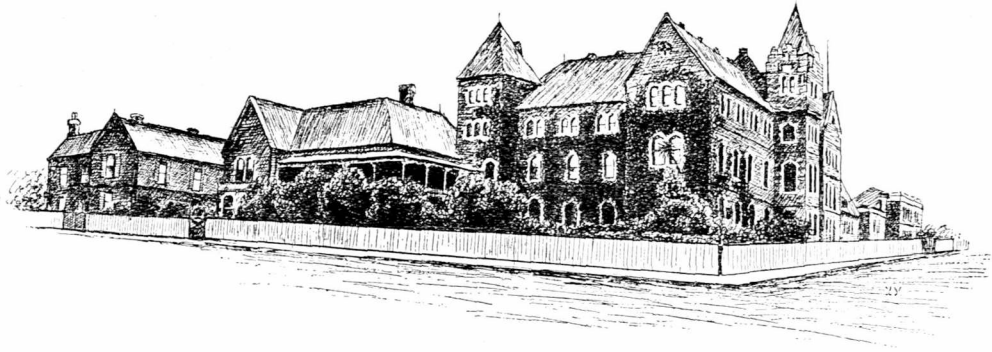
Mother, thy blessing! for life was sweet,

The distinguished war record of Scotch College may be regarded as a noble consummation of over 60 years of the College history. The notable service rendered to the school by the boys and masters in class-room or on playing ground found fuller expression in the service of their country. From the city office and the distant station, from the Uni-

versity classes and the lonely back-blocks, from all vocations and the School itself, men and boys hastened to offer their services to the Empire. Loyalty to the old School and all it stood for expanded into the loftier enthusiasm for and loyalty to country. Never was change more justified than that of the School motto to "Deo, Patriae, Litteris." A Scotch College

boy was the first Public School boy to enlist. Since the fateful 4th of August, 1914, 1200 sons of the College have donned the King's uniform, and played their part with courage in different theatres of war. New Guinea, Egypt, Palestine, and Gallipoli, France and Belgium, Macedonia and the Trentino, Russia, Mesopotamia, Central Africa and the boundless spaces of air and ocean have witnessed the gallant service of these sons of the grand old School.

And not in numbers only, but in brain power also, Scotch College has made a notable contribution to the Australian Imperial Force. The Commander of the Australians in the critical months July to November, 1918, when the Australians won immortal fame by their gallant and successful defence of Amiens, their victory at Villers-Bretonneux (the turning point of the war), their heroic capture of Mont St. Quentin and Peronne with inferior numbers against a fully-prepared foe, the final smashing of the much-vaunted Hindenburg line, compelling the absolute surrender of Germany—the Commander of the A.I.F. was an Old Scotch Collegian, Lieutenant-General Sir John Monash. Lieutenant-General Monash is the only civilian soldier in the war who has risen to the rank of General—a unique distinction. His career is a notable one; he holds degrees in arts, laws and engineering. His wonderful ability was well known, and was fully demonstrated in his organisation of the rearguard at the Gallipoli evacuation. His success with the Third Australian Division, the corps d'élite, was rewarded by the grant of the command of the illustrious Australian Imperial Force. At present, he holds the honourable post of Director of Demobilisation of the Australian Forces.

In England another Old Scotch Collegian, Major-General Sir James W. McCay, had charge of the preliminary training of the Australian troops. Another Old Boy who rose to the rank of General is Brigadier-General Robert

Smith, C.M.G., D.S.O. and Bar, Croix de Guerre, the leader of the Australians in the dashing capture of Lagnicourt.

Another Old Boy, Lieutenant-Colonel N. Marshall, left Australia with the First Division in October, 1914, as Sergeant. He now holds the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel, with the D.S.O. and two bars, and the Military Cross. From the list of commissions on a later page it will be seen that Scotch College can boast of 1 Lieutenant-General, 1 Major-General, 1 Brigadier-General, 5 Colonels, 12 Lieutenant-Colonels, 36 Majors, 116 Captains, 149 Lieutenants—a total of 321. 1 of every 4 Old Boys on active service attained commissioned rank. The honours gained for distinguished and gallant service are inspiring: — 1 G.C.M.G., 1 K.C.M.G., 1 K.C.B., 2 C.B., 4 C.M.G., 2 O.B.E., 22 D.S.O., 2 D.S.C., 2 D.F.C., 59 M.C., 3 D.C.M., 24 M.M. Foreign decorations include Legion d'Honneur 2, Médaille d'Honneur 1, Order of the Crown (Belgian),

1, Croix de Guerre (Belgian) 7—a total of over 123, or more than 10 per cent. of the Scotch College enlistments. These records are not yet

complete, and when the final count is made, it is expected that the record will be still more honourable.

Of the 1200 Old Scotch Collegians who went on active service, 180 have made the supreme sacrifice. Their service and their young lives they gave ungrudgingly in the cause of Righteousness and Justice and Freedom. Some lie sleeping in far Gallipoli, others in shattered Belgium, more beneath the soil of smitten France, and others fathoms deep beneath the sea. Many young and promising lives that would have blossomed into useful or noble or brilliant careers have been blasted by the devastating breath of war, and the high promise of their youthful lives has turned to ashes. But the sacrifice has not been in vain. Victory now rests upon the Allied arms, and the heavy price of blood which this glorious consummation demanded has not been paid in vain. Their patriotism, their valour, and their noble sacrifice are a real

and full embodiment of their beloved School's motto, "Deo, Patriae, Litteris."

Blow out, you bugles, over the rich Dead!

There's none of these so lonely and poor of old;

But, dying, has made us rarer gifts than gold.

These laid the world away: poured out the red,

Sweet wine of youth: gave up the years to be

Of work and joy, and that unhop'd serene

That men call age: and those who would have been

Their sons, they gave, their immortality.

Blow, bugles, blow. They brought us for our dearth

Holiness, lacked so long, and Love and Pain.

Honour has come back, as a king to earth

And paid his subjects with a royal wage;

And Nobleness walks in our ways again;

And we have come into our heritage.

Who lie, our country's debt of honour paying—

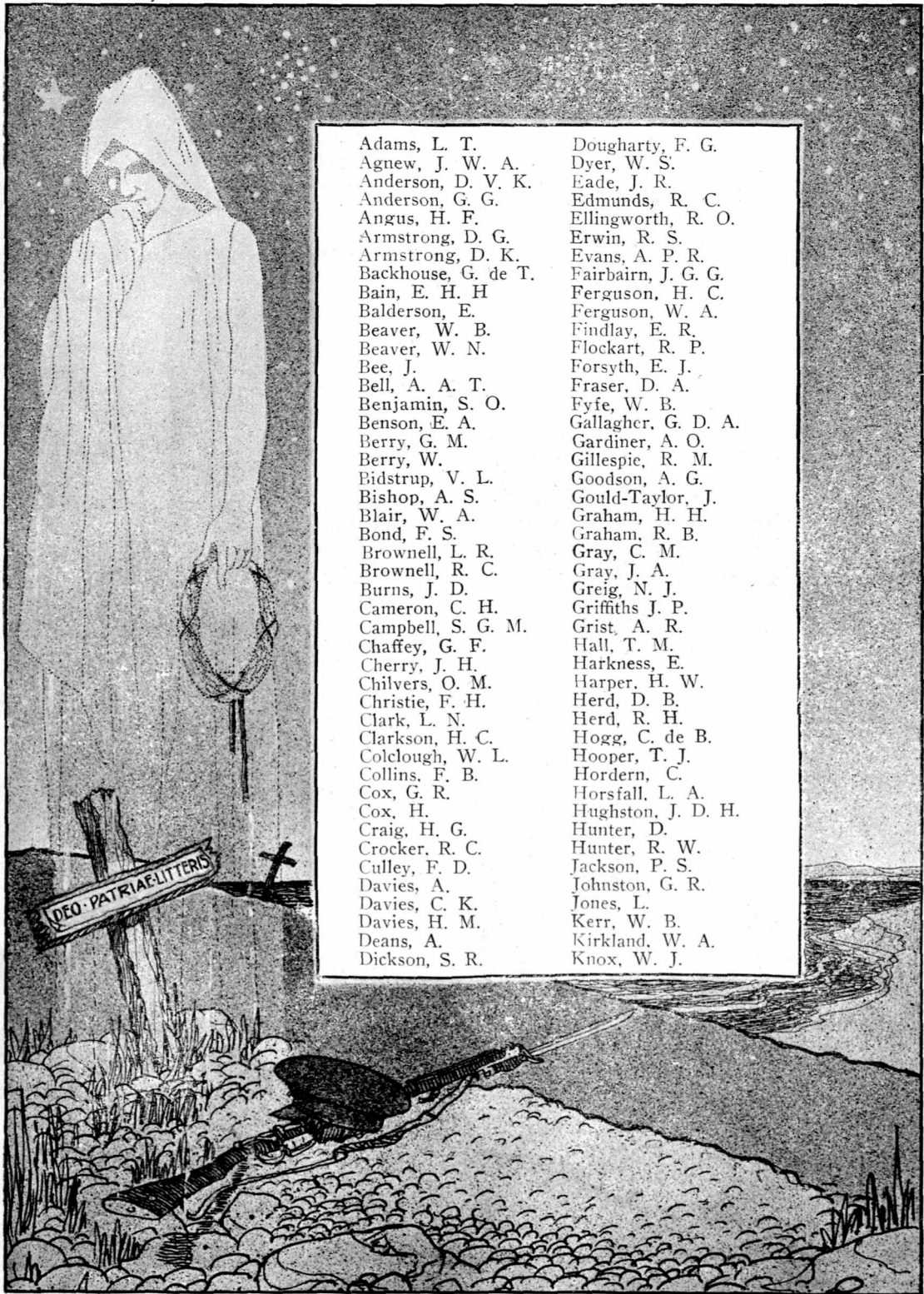
And not in vain—upon a foreign shore,

Till that great Day when at the Throne in Heaven

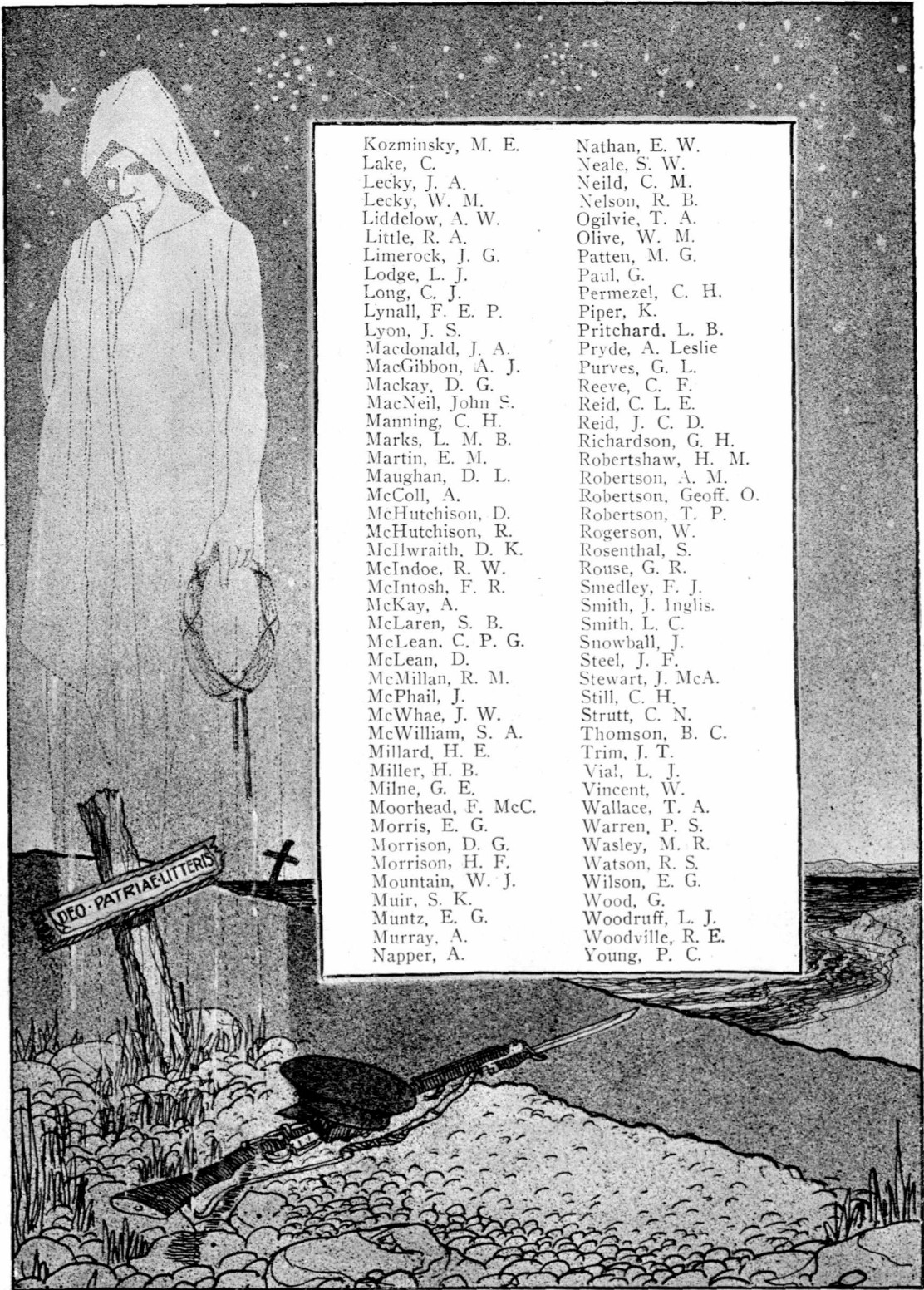
The books are opened, and the Judgment set,

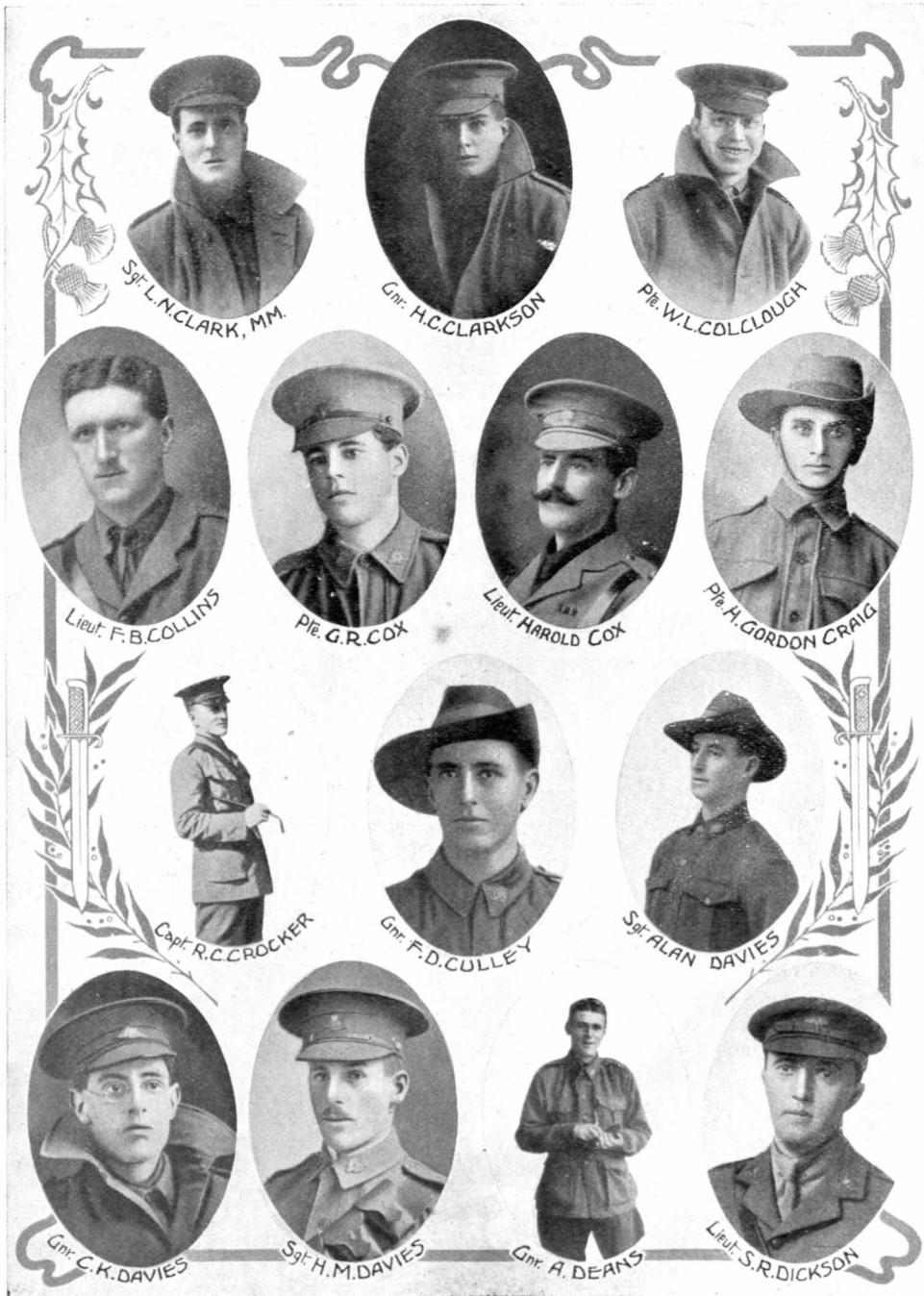

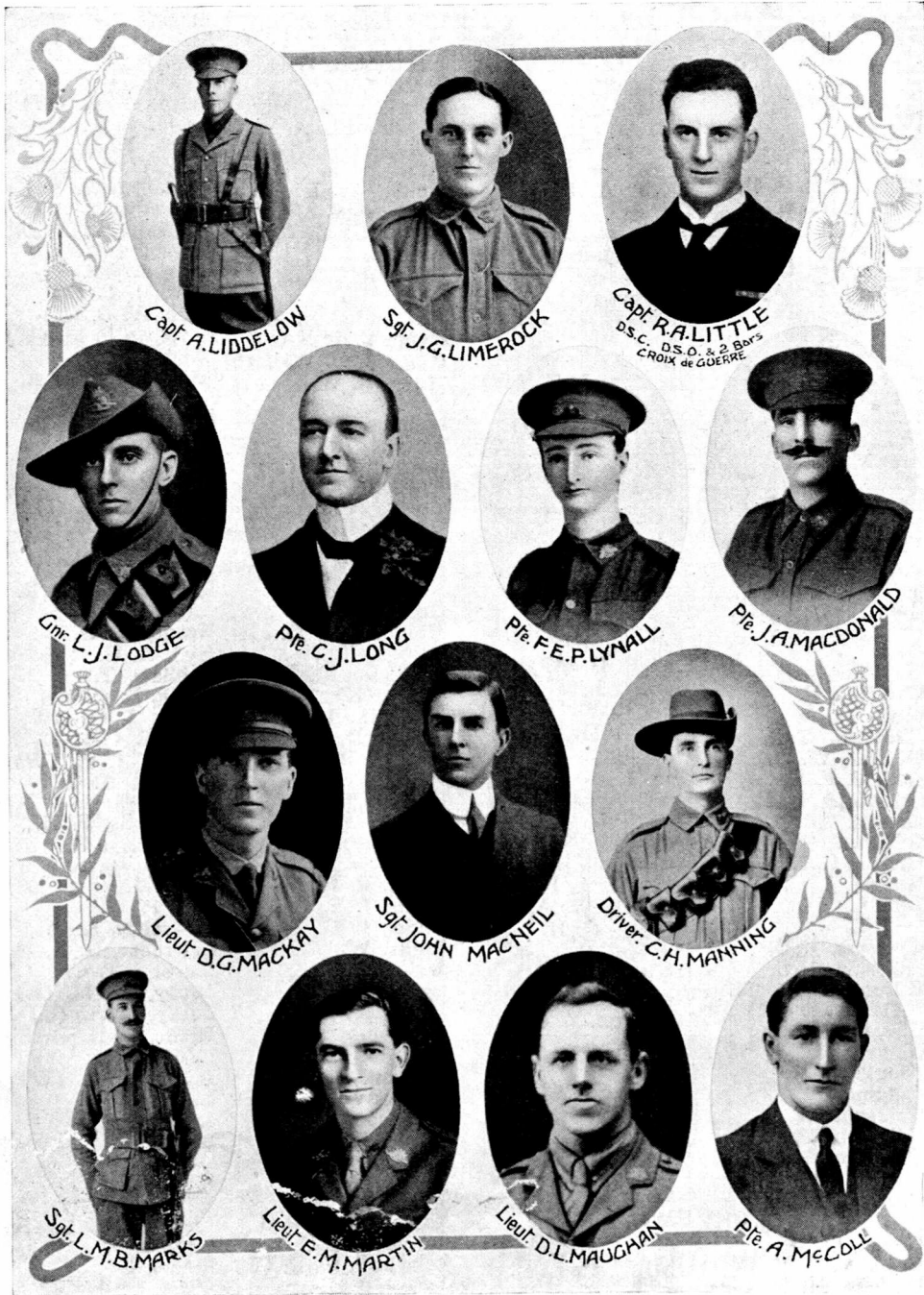

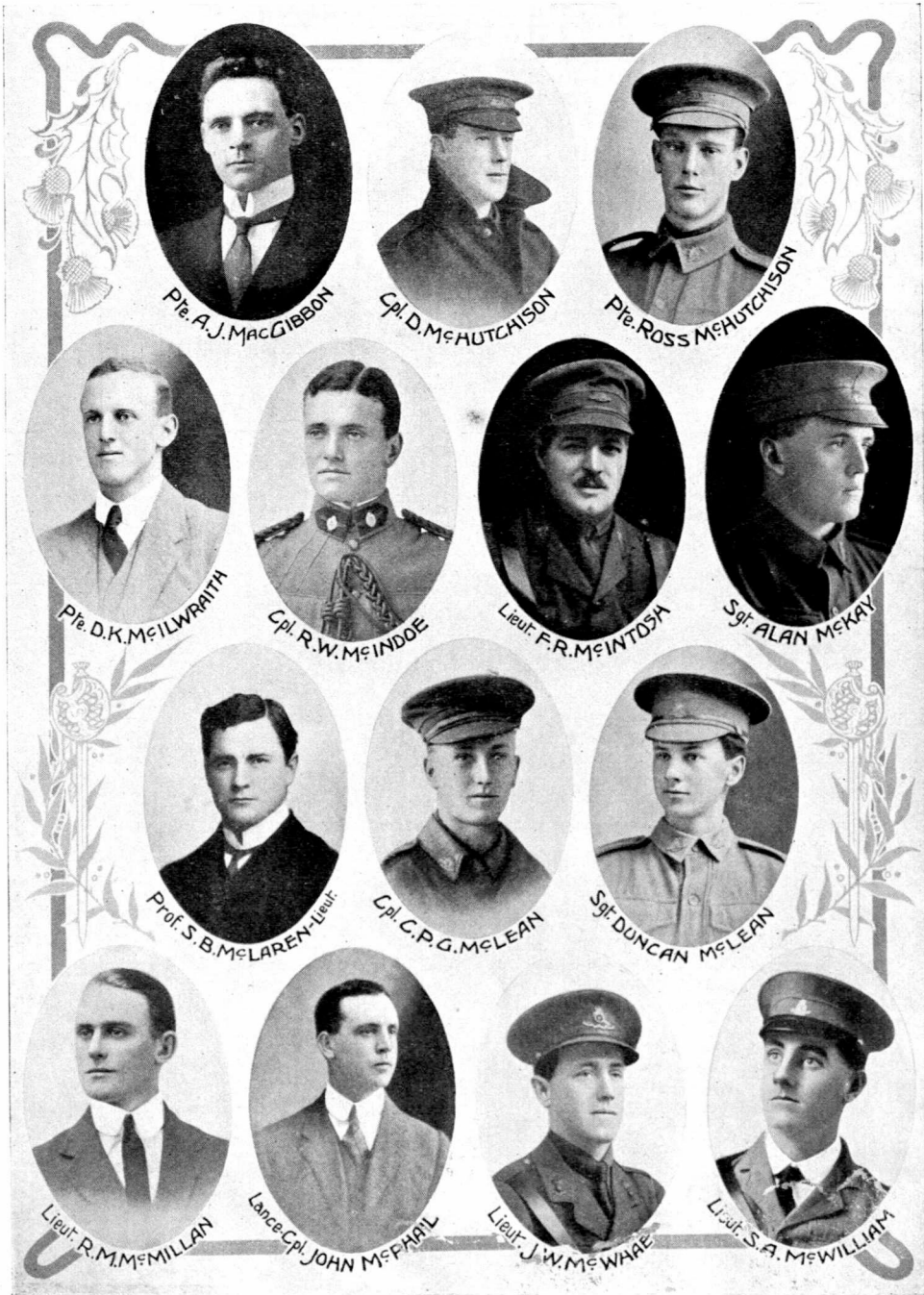

SPEECH BY HON. ARTHUR ROBINSON, M.L.C.,
Solicitor-General of Victoria.

in Melbourne Town Hall, at Scotch College Speech Night, 13th December, 1918.

Mr. W. S. Littlejohn (the Principal) having read the School Report, which mentioned the achievements of Old Collegians in the war, Mr. Robinson addressed the gathering as follows:—

“No Old Boy could hear the Principal’s report without emotion and a feeling of pride that he was once a boy at a school whose war record is so inspiring. Noble as it is, the war record of the College as published in the “Scotch Collegian” is not complete. Recently I found that the name of a close friend who had been 4 years at College, who served with success and achieved distinction in the Imperial Forces, was omitted. We must make the list complete, so that a full record of the College’s part in the great war may be secured.

The war has been won largely by man power and brain power, and brain power was even more necessary than man power. The number that came from the Scotch College showed that it supplied its share of the man power in full and overflowing measure. The positions achieved by Old Boys demonstrate that the Scotch College supplied a lion’s share in brain power to the A.I.F. The total record of the College in man power and brain power is, I believe, unapproached by that of any school in the Dominions. Consider the positions occupied by, and the tasks placed upon, those who sprang from the Scotch College.

The Commander-in-Chief of the A.I.F. is a former Dux of the College. Appointed to this onerous position in the dark days when the Allied cause seemed to be almost at its last gasp, he played a great part in preparing the skilful plans which turned defeat into victory, and drove back the enemy into irretrievable disaster and ruin. Those of us who knew Sir John Monash before he left Victoria, knew that no more massive intellect ever left these shores.

We knew that sooner or later his great talents would carry him to one of the supreme positions where capacity and character are essential. The success of the Australians, the part they played in stopping the rush of the enemy between March and July last, and later in driving him back, were not only due to the fighting qualities of the men, but would have been impossible without leadership of great ability and insight.

The Australian Forces in England were trained under another Dux of the College, Sir J. W. McCay. The deeds of the Australians after this training are proof complete of the ability and character of the instructor.

Commander-in-Chief on the field of battle, Commander-in-Chief in the training field—both Old Scotch Collegians! These old boys—school boys of a generation ago—retain their affection and pride in the College. Their achievements should be a source of inspiration to every present boy, and indeed to all of us in any way connected with the school.

Look at the deeds of the younger generation. It is impossible to refer to all, but some have burnt themselves into our memory in a manner which can never be effaced. Lieut-Col. Norman Marshall, son of the Chairman of the College Council, enlisted as a private in 1914, ploughed his way from rank to rank, achieving honours and distinctions on the way, and adding further glory to an illustrious name.

There are others of whom we can hardly think without risk of break-down, who “poured out the red sweet wine of youth” in the nation’s cause, whose motto was—

“Live a thousand years I shall not
find myself so apt to die
No place will please me so, no
mean of death
As here”

with the Empire forces. Let me mention a couple—though there are scores that should be mentioned.

Bob Little—Flight-Commander R.A. Little. The deeds of no airman in the whole war exceed this Scotch College boy's for valour, for coolness, for daring. In his short life honours were heaped upon him as some small tokens of his country's and its Allies' admiration. He received the D.S.O. and bar, D.S.C. and 2 bars, and Croix de Guerre. But the distinction dearest to us is that he insisted on his favourite airplane being painted in Scotch College colours. And further, and still more touching, which stirs the deepest feelings and must move the most unemotional, are the instructions he left that, if death did befall him, his infant son in due course should become a Scotch Collegian. Bob Little wrote his name in letters of glory in the heavens, and died on the wings of fame. His College was ever in his thoughts—his actions a rich legacy to his old school.

Another whose name will never die with Scotch Collegians I saw at the speech night in December, 1914. I remember Mr. Littlejohn's commendation of this boy just about to leave, one who had been Editor of that best of school papers, the "Scotch Collegian." Mr. Littlejohn told us of his hopes for that boy's future, and those of us present then felt that, if life were permitted, that boy would fulfil his youthful promise. But

"The bugles of England were blowing o'er the sea,

And how could I stay?"

He left the College for the camp, the camp for the field of battle. I know what a shock it was to the School when the dread news came that J. D. Burns, J.D., as he was affectionately called, was killed. His life at the College was manly and clean, his conscience clear, and his courage high. One thinks that the only fitting words are "It was as if the sun had gone out, but sleep on, beloved, sleep, and take thy rest."

One more out the host of brave boys let me speak of—one whom to know was to love. He was midway between those of a past generation and those of to-day, Major W. J. Knox—a former captain of the School. "A man to a man, a lady to a lady, stuffed with all honourable virtues." In many losses which have been sustained in this war none grieved me more deeply than the loss of this dear and intimate friend. He was indeed a captain worthy of the College.

One could speak for hours on the glorious band who represented the Scotch College in the great war. Their doings must be a source of pride and exultation to all old boys, a source of joy and inspiration to all present boys. Fellowship in a College with such a history should stir the pulse of any sluggard, and quicken the imagination of the dullest. It is a heritage to be treasured and preserved.

These are the days when men speak of honour rolls and records. Milton's thoughts occur to us in regard to each brave son:—

"What needs . . . he for his honour'd bones

The labour of an age in piled stones?
Or that his hallow'd relics should be hid
Under a star-ypointing pyramid?

Dear son of memory, great heir of fame
What need'st thou such weak witness of
thy name?

Thou, in our wonder and astonishment
Hast built thyself a live-long monument."

But though their record is undying we can, and we should, raise to them a fitting tribute, a lasting memorial of our appreciation of their imperishable glory—one that every old Collegian would approve, one that would be worthy of those who conferred immortality on the school, one that they themselves would ask for.

That which is nearest the hearts of those who love the College is to remove it to the new site, and have erected there a group of buildings worthy of its traditions and of the men who were nurtured in the College. Let us all, old boys, present boys, parents and relatives of present boys and old boys, make one section at least of the new school our own special task, our memorial of the school's great record, our tribute to the fallen, our testimony to the skill and intrepidity of all who went from the College. Let the erection of one section, at least, be undertaken as a war record and as a peace gift, and let this be the work of those who love the College or are proud of its record. We can raise the funds, and we can raise sufficient to make that section the most important of the whole pile. If we do this we shall see a speedy and complete removal to a new site, and a group of buildings worthy of our College. A large sum can be raised if old boys, present boys, relatives and friends of old and present boys, will all help. What better peace gift can be made? What finer war monument can be raised to the memory of Old Scotch Collegians? What heart can remain unmoved by the noble deeds of these boys? Let us resolve here and now, and start here and now, to get this sum.

Those boys from the Scotch College who fought realised what Pericles told the Athenians—that the secret of happiness is freedom, and the secret of freedom is a brave heart; that the whole earth is the sepulchre of famous men, whose story is not only engraven on stone, but lives on far into the future, woven into the stuff of other men's lives. Let us grave the record of the College in stone, knowing that it will thus be woven into the stuff of the life of every boy at the College, now or hereafter. Every stone will have its message, its lesson, will recall the glorious example of patriotism, self-sacrifice, valour and daring which characterised those warrior sons of the Scotch College.

Others have given large sums to their

schools and with less pressing cause. Shall we not do this for our School? Do we not want to help the School and keep it as an influence for the betterment of National and Imperial life? Let us do so by a peace gift which will provide for the erection of a building as a loving testimony to those who went forth to fight for the good cause. Of such a building it may then be said of those who fell that they

“Sepulchred in such pomp do lie
That Kings for such a tomb would
wish to die.”

For those who were spared it will be the best recompense for their labours. For those who give it will be a proof that their hearts respond to the glorious record of Scotch Collegians.”

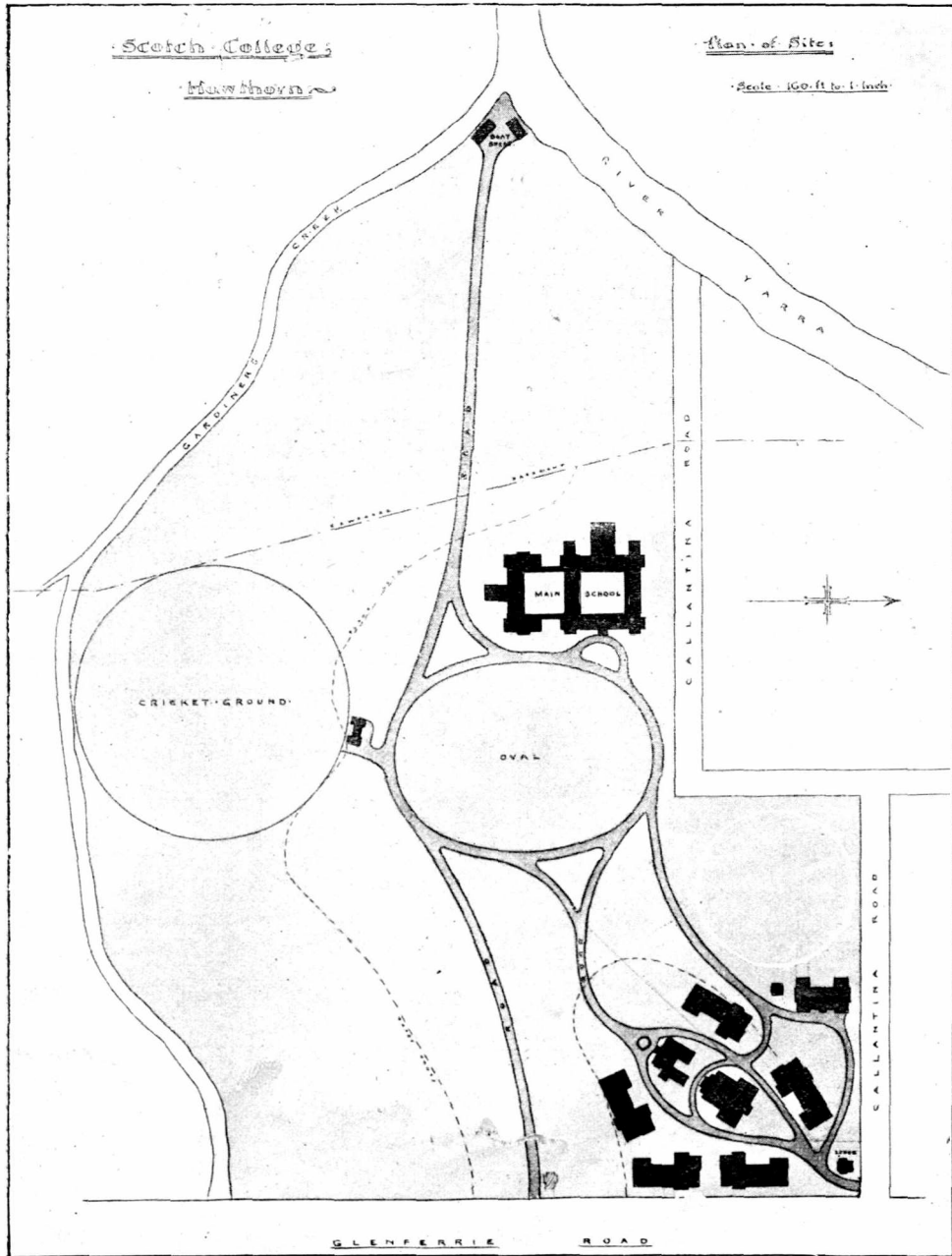

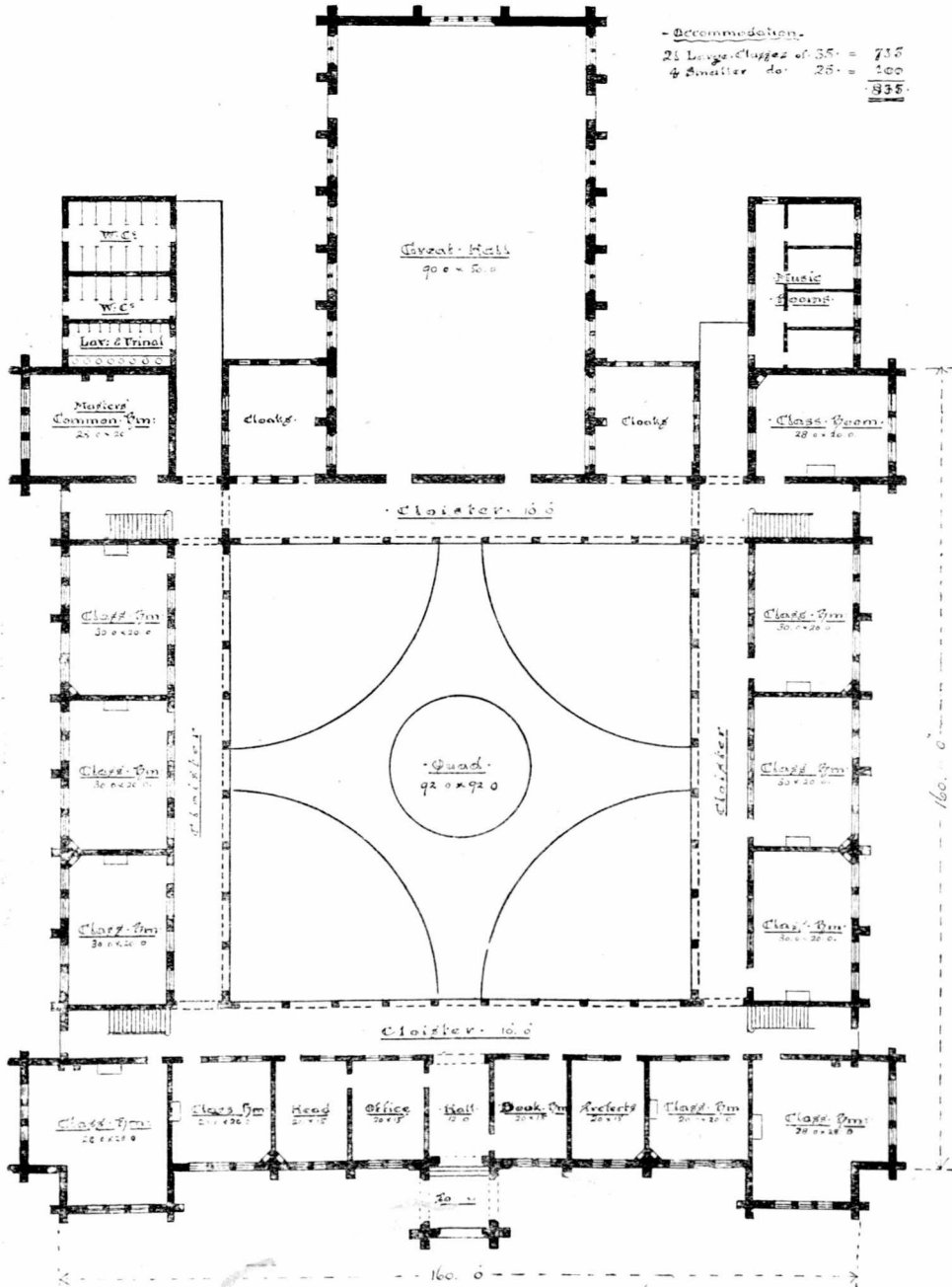

PLAN OF SITE.



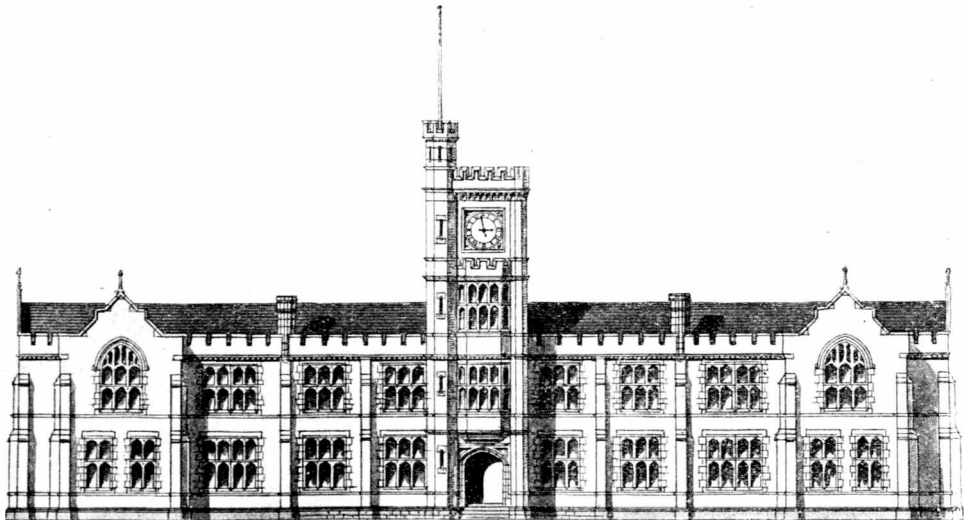
GROUND PLAN OF SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

THE SCHOOL BUILDING.

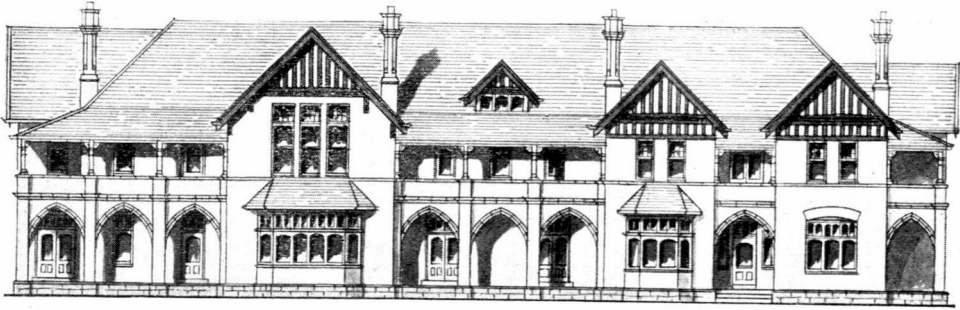


An ideal site for the largest and oldest Public School in Victoria was acquired by the Council in 1915 for the future Scotch College. An appeal addressed to Old Boys and other supporters of the School resulted in the subscription of over £5000 towards the purchase-money of the 65 acres at Hawthorn Glen. The Council opened a Preparatory School in 1916; the attendance was 40 at the beginning of the year, and 67 at the close. In 1917 the numbers rose to 125, in 1918 to 173, while the School year 1919 opened with an attendance of 225 boys. A handsome Preparatory School was erected in the corner of the estate adjoining Callantina Road, and, liberal as the accommodation was, it was found necessary to add 3 large class-rooms. A feature of this School is the spacious assembly room, open on the south side. The cricket ground, which is now in the course of preparation, adjoins this part of the School.

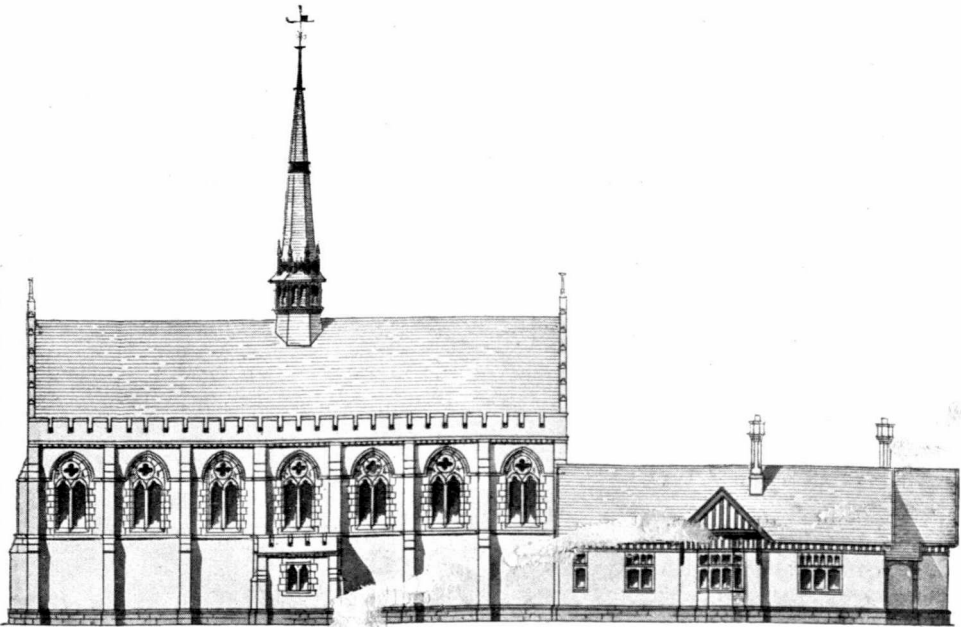
The accompanying plans and illustrations will give some idea of the proposed

buildings at The Glen when the whole School is transferred to Glenferrie. The frontage along Glenferrie Road from Callantina Road to Gardiner's Creek is about 470 yards. The road which leads through the centre of the estate from the lower entrance on Glenferrie Road to the confluence of the Yarra and Gardiner's Creek runs a distance of 853 yards. The circular cricket ground near Gardiner's Creek is 200 yards in diameter; the main oval, situated between the boarding establishment and the School buildings measures 200 yards x 140. The proposed site of the School is on the lower rise, between the main plateau and the Yarra. Provision is made for 21 class-rooms, each 30 feet by 20, for 35 boys, and smaller class-rooms 20 x 30, to accommodate 25 boys. All the rooms on the ground floor open out into a quadrangle 100 feet square. A cloister 10 feet wide runs round the quadrangle. In addition to the class-rooms, there are music rooms, cloak rooms, masters' common room, headmaster's office, etc. The

prominent feature in this block of buildings is the School Hall, the dimensions of which have not yet been finally decided on. The School Hall will contain the magnificent Honour Roll of Old Scotch Collegians who have served in the Great War, and will be decorated with stained glass windows of the finest design. This should be the central feature of the block of buildings which it is hoped will be built as a result of the Scotch College War Memorial Appeal. There is also a Science Block, containing physical and chemical laboratories, each 50 x 24 feet, and a gymnasium 64 x 32.

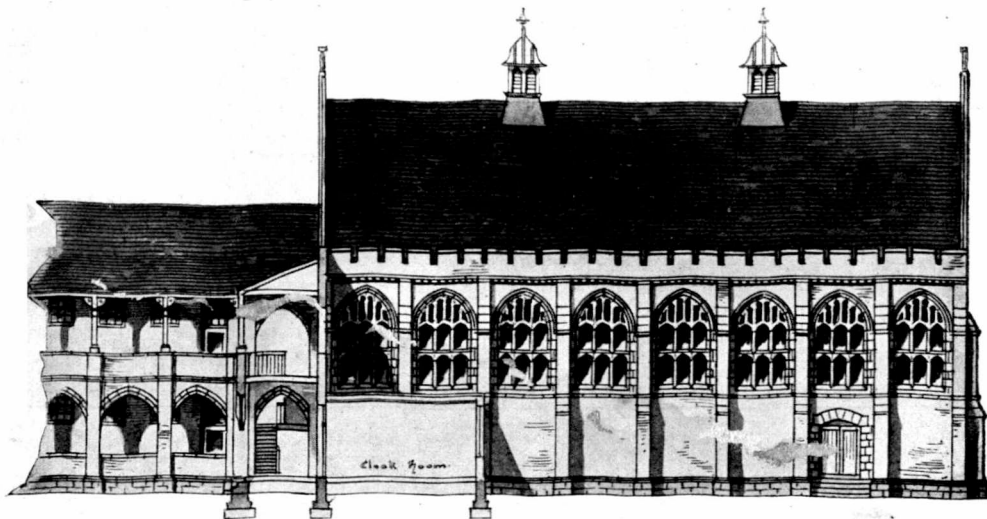
The plateau adjoining Glenferrie and Callantina Roads is about 5 acres in extent, on which the Headmaster's House, 5 Boarding Houses, and a Central Dining Hall will be erected.

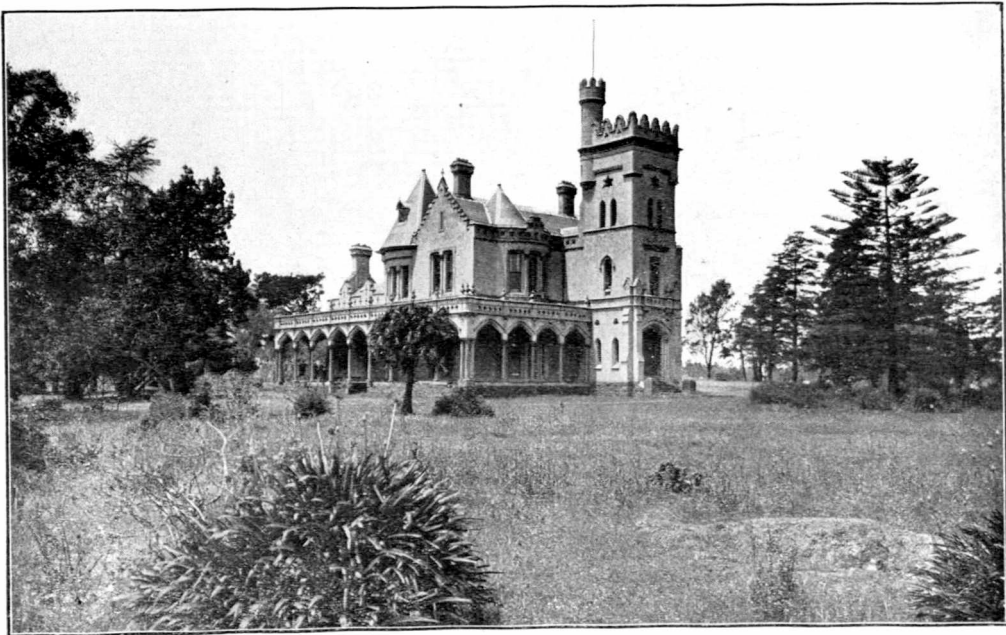
The boarding houses are two-story buildings, with a frontage of 148 feet and a depth of 80 feet, and contain boarders' bedrooms, sitting-room, reading-room, sick-room, and accommodation for a master and his family. Each

house will accommodate 35 boarders. The Dining Hall, 96 feet long, 44 feet wide, will seat 286 at meals.

The plans printed herewith show that provision has been made for over 800 boys in the main school, and for over 250 in the Preparatory School. Present indications point to this accommodation not being sufficient when the new Scotch College is built at Hawthorn Glen. The demand for more room at Eastern Hill is so pressing that steps will have to be taken in the immediate future to set about building the new School. The War Memorial Buildings will form the main part of the new Scotch College. They should be worthy of the magnificent Honour Roll of Old Scotch Collegians. It is confidently anticipated that all friends of the College will accord this movement the hearty financial support it undoubtedly deserves, and will take an active part in assisting to place on an ideal site in the midst of congenial and healthy surroundings the BEST SCHOOL OF ALL.

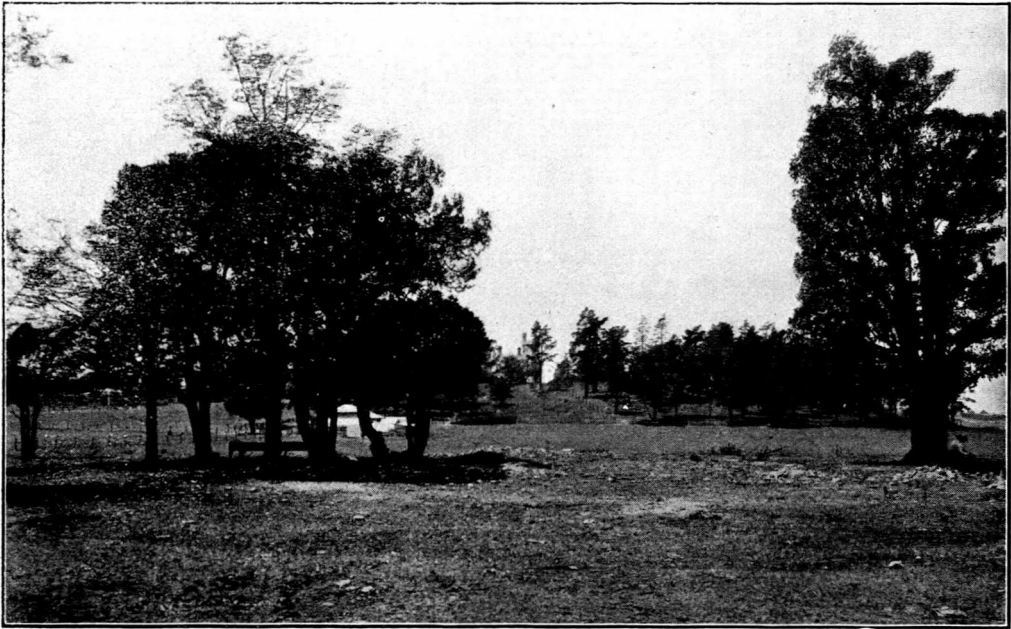




The House on the Hill.

SCOTCH COLLEGE.

HISTORICAL OUTLINE.

“Proclaim then her praise for ever,
For the sake of the years that are done.
For the friendships which nothing can

The foundation of Scotch College is indicated in an advertisement which appeared in the daily papers of October 1st, 1851:—

MELBOURNE ACADEMY.

“The inhabitants of Melbourne and the surrounding districts are hereby respectfully informed that an Academy will be opened (D.V.), on Monday, the 6th of October next, for the training of young men. In the course of instruction the classical and higher departments will be systemically combined; with all other branches of study, which are essential to the education of any young gentleman; whilst such as have a view to the ministry will have the opportunity of fully preparing for the theological curriculum. Until a suitable building such as is now in contemplation has been erected, the pupils will meet in Chalmers' School, Spring Street, Melbourne.”

The first Rector was Mr. Robert Lawson, of Dunoon, Scotland, who is described as of medium height, well proportioned, of fair complexion, and very gentlemanly bearing, with a bold and massive forehead. He was a splendid leader, a strict disciplinarian, and, generally, a great favourite with the boys. The original school was Spring-street north, between Lonsdale and Little Lonsdale-streets, but pressure of numbers compelled Mr. Lawson to remove to more commodious

premises at 61 Spring-street, the site of the present Treasury Hotel. To the east of the Academy was virgin bush and vacant land, where cricket and prisoners' base were played under difficult conditions. The champion runners were William McPherson and John Watson, while Henry Jennings performed some notable jumping feats.

On February 17th, 1853, the Governor-in-Council approved of a grant of a site of 2 acres on Eastern Hill for a Grammar School in connection with the Free Presbyterian Church. The Presbyterians received a grant of £6500 towards the cost of erecting the necessary buildings (£10,000). On Tuesday, January 10th, 1854, the Melbourne Academy was opened in “the buildings recently erected on the Eastern Hill, south-east of St. Peter's Church.” The original buildings were the block of rooms in which the Headmaster's office, the Bookroom, Masters' Common Room are at present. The playground was principally in the reserve now known as the Fitzroy Gardens, while cricket was played on the southerly slope of the allotment. During the first 12 months at Eastern Hill the School was still known as the Melbourne Academy, but this was officially changed to Scotch College some time between June and December, 1855. In the latter month one hundred and fifty boys attended the School. Dr. Macadam was the Science Master during this period, and skilfully imparted instruction to these young

Scotch Collegians in Chemistry, Botany, Geology, and other departments of Natural Science.

For some unknown reason, Mr. Robert Lawson resigned the Rectorship of Scotch College. He subsequently opened a school in Nicholson-street, and from there moved up country. He was some time afterwards lost overboard on a voyage between Australia and England. During the interval which followed on Mr. Lawson's resignation, the College was conducted, not very successfully, by Rev. John Millar. The total number on the roll was only 56.

THE MORRISON EPOCH.

1857-1903.

Dr. Alexander Morrison, Rector of the Educational Institution in Hamilton, was appointed Rector on May 26th, 1857, and arrived in Melbourne in July of the same year. For 47 years he acted as Principal of Scotch College, and during this time the School made steady progress in numbers and efficiency. In 1858 it was found necessary to extend the buildings, as a cost of £1500, and in 1859 4 additional rooms (Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4) were built at a cost of £3600. In 1863 a gymnasium was fitted out with all the newest apparatus; in the following year two rooms were added at a cost of £600. In 1873 a notable increase in the accommodation of boarders took place in the addition of a Principal's house, Boarders' Dining Hall, Boarders' Study, suite of Bedrooms, Bathrooms, etc., at a cost of £10,650. In 1890 it was found necessary to provide further accommodation, and the additions cost £5000.

It is interesting to note the various changes in the curriculum which became necessary to keep pace with examination requirements. New subjects were studied, new methods of classification were introduced, and the work carried to a very high standard of efficiency. In 1876 there were 16 boys in the Sixth, or highest class. In the same year a welcome change was made

in the extension of the summer vacation till the early part of February. In 1873, owing to the inability of the Civil Service Cricket Club to retain their permissive occupancy of the 7 acres of land in Yarra Park, the Government transferred this to the Trustees of Scotch College. The sum of £1000 was paid to the Civil Service Club for improvements effected.

THE LITTLEJOHN ERA.

When Mr. W. S. Littlejohn arrived in 1904 to take over the Principalship of Scotch College in succession to Dr. Morrison, the attendance at Scotch College was 254. Soon after he took up his duties as Principal, he instituted the Prefect System at Scotch, and this has worked with marked success. The Prefects play an important part in the conduct of the affairs of the School. Another important event in 1904 was the institution of *The Scotch Collegian*, a magazine which has no superior among the periodicals of public schools throughout the world. The matter is written entirely by the boys, with the exception of the Old Boys' Column. A distinctive feature of this magazine is the size and excellence of the Original Column.

The earliest College motto of which there is a record is a Greek one, meaning "Education is the Mother of Wisdom and Virtue" (1854); in 1859 this seems to have been replaced by "Palmarum qui meruit ferat." In December, 1868, "Deo et Literis" was adopted as the motto of the School. In 1914, just after the outbreak of the European War, this was altered to "Deo, Patriae, Litteris."

During Mr. Littlejohn's Principalship the School institutions have increased in number and vitality. The Christian Union rests on a very solid basis of numbers, and has been invigorated by the efforts of the Chaplain, Rev. J. C. Jones. The Cadet Corps has had an interesting history, and of recent years has been under the command of Major R. H. Weddell and

Captain J. W. Whyte. The Debating Society has attained a deserved popularity among the senior boys of the School. The Dramatic Society, of recent origin, succeeded in raising over £1000 for patriotic and benevolent funds. The Annual Foundation Day Concerts, in the Melbourne Town Hall, which were inaugurated by late Lieut. George Wood, have proved enjoyable to both boys and parents.

In 1911, the Diamond Jubilee of the School was enthusiastically celebrated in Melbourne, as well as in country centres, other states and countries. The late Lieut. George Wood compiled a thorough historical sketch of the School's history, of which extensive use has been made in this outline. The celebrations took the form of an Old Boys' Rally at the School on Friday, October 6th, a Foundation Day Dinner in the Melbourne Town Hall, a magnificent Concert by the boys in the Exhibition Building, a Ball in St. Kilda Town Hall, a Theatre Night at Her Majesty's, and a series of contests in cricket, rowing, and tennis between present boys and Old Boys. Mr. Littlejohn was not able to be present at these celebrations, on account of an enforced lengthy holiday in the Old Country.

Early in 1915 a movement was instituted to secure donations and subscriptions from Old Boys to enable the Council of the College to purchase the 65 acres at Glenferrie, known as Glen's Estate. The large increase in numbers

at Eastern Hill made a removal to a more healthy and commodious site absolutely necessary. The required sum (£5000) was raised in a few months, and the Council was enabled to borrow sufficient on this amount to purchase the site at Glenferrie. A branch of Scotch College was opened at the new site in a handsome Preparatory School. The success of this venture exceeded expectations, and it was found necessary to extend the building to accommodate the 180 scholars at The Glen. Two ovals are in course of preparation, while a neat ground has been laid out for the use of the Preparatory School.

During the last few years the scholastic record of the College has been especially good. The attendance has increased almost incredibly. In 1904, on Mr. Littlejohn's arrival, the College numbered 237. The year 1919 begins with an attendance of 692 at Eastern Hill, and 223 at Glenferrie — 915 in all, an eloquent tribute to the skill and success with which Mr. Littlejohn has presided over the destinies of Scotch College for over 15 years. Fear was felt that the financial and economic stringency caused by the European war might react calamitously on the School, but fortunately the fears were not realised.

The fateful years 1914-1918 saw the Scotch College in a flourishing condition, while the achievements of its sons in that period demonstrated to the world the spirit which emanates from fellowship in such a school.
