FALLEN, WOUNDED, MISSING BULLETINS.

Casualty list No. 359 issued by the Defence Department yesterday contains 1166 names, comprised of—Killed in action, 59; died of wounds, 24; died other causes, 1; wounded, 998; missing, 56; sick, 45; injured, 5; prisoners of war, 3. The names of the following Geelong and district soldiers are included in the list:—Spr. Kenneth Fraser Macauley, Geelong West, wounded; Pte. Ernest Walter Ackland, Mt. Moriac, wounded; Pte. Frank J. Hennessy, Newtown, wounded and gassed; Pte. John Phillip Samuel Thomson, Geelong, wounded; Pte. Thos. Henry Hayes, Drysdale, severely wounded; Sgt. Frank Trebilcock, Geelong, wounded; Pte. Abel Edwin Rosewall, Geelong West, wounded; Pte. Thos. Patrick Minogue, Newtown, wounded.

CAPT. JOHN BELL.

A cable received yesterday advised that Captain John Bell, R.F.C., had been wounded. Captain Bell left Australia in 1914 with the First Australian Expeditionary Forces, and served through the Gallipoli campaign on the staff of General (then Colonel) Chauvel. Invalided to England, Capt Bell subsequently joined the Royal Flying Corps. He took part in operations

... subsequently joined the Royal Flying Corps. He took part in operations in Egypt and Palestine. He then returned to England and proceeded to the Western Front, where presumably he was wounded. Same cable advice states that Captain Bell's brother, G. Russell Bell, has received a commission in the Royal Field Artillery.

Corporal Hector Treyvaud, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Treyvaud, of Aberdeen-street, Geelong West, has recently undergone in England an operation to his eyes, which had been bad since he left Gallipoli. He has greatly improved since, and after a spell in the hospital at Dartford, in charge of his brother-in-law, Major Geo. Cole, D.S.O., expects to be able to get back in the firing line. Since gaining the D.S.O., Major Cole has been mentioned in despatches.

Mr. G. S. Warner, 262 McKillop-street, has received a cable from his son, Pte. E. (Flum) Warner, stating he has gone on furlough to England and is well.

Mr. and Mrs. G. D. Arnott, of 84 Upper Hope-street, Geelong West, have been notified that their son, Pte. Les. Arnott, has been admitted to the Kitchener Military Hospital, Brighton, England, suffering from gas poisoning (severe). Pte. Arnott has been on active service from the beginning of the war.
