Evidence has been collected to show that the lara dykes are geologically much younger than the reefs, and the only influence they can have on the localisation of the gold shoots is minor and secondary, through the agency of waters passing along the walls of the dyke channel. These waters may dissolve a small amount of the primary gold in a reef cut by the lava, and then re-precipitale it in the immediate neighborhood of the intersected reef. This secondary gold is rare and only found in the neighborhood of primary gold shoots in a reef. It is therefore believed that the lava dykes should be discarded as guides to prespecting.
